TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

Noon Dispatches.

WASHINGTON.

Speaker Kerr Exonerated by the Committee on Expenditures—Congressional Proceedings.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 10.—The Committee on Expenditures of the War Department have agreed without dissent to report that the charges made by Harney against Speaker Kerr are false. It is regarded as a case of impudent, and bold perjury.

In the Senate, Morrill, of Vermont, is speaking on a resolution returning thanks to the State of Vermont, for the statue of Ethan Allen, contributed by that State, for National Statuary hall.

LOUISIANA.

Condition of the Cotton Crop in the Southwest.

NEW ORLEANS, June 10.—Thirty three parishes in Louisiana indicate ten per cent decrease in the acreage of cultivated land, equal to one per cent whole in the State, rendered useless by inundation. Cotton is small and grassy.

In twenty-three counties in Arkansas the decrease in acreage is eight per cent. The damage from overflow is confined to three counties and ranges from 10 to 40 per cent. The crop is ten days late, condition good.

In forty-eight counties in Texas, there is a decrease in acreage. The average acreage is about the same. Condition, average, about same but irregular.

In eighteen counties in Middle Tennessee and North Alabama, decrease average three per cent. Stand good ten days to two weeks later.

FOREIGN.

The Winslow Extradition Case—Peace Reigns in Warsaw.

LONDON, June 10.—Sir Henry James, Liberal member of Parliament, for Taunton, has given notice in the House of Commons that on Monday he will ask Mr. Bourke, under Foreign Secretary, whether Secretary Fish's dispatch of 22d of May relating to the case of Winslow reached the Foreign Office on sixth of June, and whether there is any objection to laying it on the table of the House. It is certain that the Government will not again ask for Winslow's remand unless it be desired to have the whole matter argued before a full Bench of which there is some probability.—Failing this, Winslow, on next Thursday, the 15th inst., will either be released or surrendered.

LATER—The solution of the case is resting on a contingency of an agreement between the government of the United States and Great Britain, upon terms of a new extradition treaty.

Dispatches from all sources indicate that the peace of Europe is assured.

NEW YORK.

Reduction in Passenger Fares from New York—Heavy Suspension.

NEW YORK, June 10.—The Pennsylvania Railroad Company announces a further reduction in passenger fares; from New York to Cincinnati, twelve dollars, Chicago fourteen, Indianapolis thirteen, Louisville sixteen, St. Louis eighteen, and corresponding reductions to all points west.

Gilbert & Weaver, dealers in woolen goods, suspended yesterday. Liabilities \$150,000; nominal assets \$109,000.

Mid-Night Dispatches.

WASHINGTON.

Mr. Blaine's Gush, (whatever that is)—The Blaine-Conkling Imbroglio—More about Mr. Kerr—Blaine Refuses to give up the Mulligan Letters—Congressional Proceedings.

WASHINGTON, June 10.—There is general comment on the behavior of Mr. Cox in the Chair, yesterday. He could not control the gush of Mr. Blaine, which kept the House in an uproar all day, but he kept his temper, and by subtle thought, and legitimate rulings defeated Mr. Blaine in every phase of his efforts to get possession of the floor.

SENATE—No quorum—adjourned. Morton says that any insinuation that he instigated, directly or indirectly, the investigation of Blaine, is infamously false. The reported correspondence be-

tween Conkling and Blaine, looking to reconciliation is officially contradicted.

Governor Chamberlain visited President Grant to-day. Wm. F. Scanks, city editor of the Tribune, testified that Harney told him the whole story about getting Green's position, as far back as May last. Harney did not then claim that he gave Kerr money, but that he obtained the position for Greens, from Mr. Kerr by his social influence alone.

HOUSE—In the sub-Judiciary Committee Mr. Hunton said, Mr. Blaine, the committee desire me again to request the production of the letters taken from Mr. Mulligan.

Blaine—You know the grounds on which I claim the possession of them.

Hunton—Yes sir.

Blaine—I have not changed my mind.

Mr. Lawrence, a member of the committee said he did not concur in the demand for the letters.

Hunton—The committee also direct me to ask you to produce the memorandum accompanying the letters.

Blaine—I have the same reason against producing that.

Hunton—Then I understand you decline to give them up.

Blaine—Yes Sir.

Adjourned to Monday.

HOUSE—The bill amending the bankrupt act, passed.

The bill reducing the staff and medical corps of the army passed.

The committee on banking and currency reported the following: Cox, of New York, chairman of the committee of banking and currency, having called Taylor, of Ohio, to the Speaker's chair reported the following bill:

That the Secretary of the Treasury under such limits and regulations as will best secure and adjust a fair distribution of the same, throughout the country may issue the silver coin now in the Treasury to an amount not exceeding \$10,000,000 in exchange for an equal amount of legal tender notes, and the notes so received in exchange shall be kept as a special fund, separate and apart from all other money in the Treasury, and be reissued only upon the retirement and destruction of a like amount of fractional currency, received at the Treasury in payment of dues to the United States, and the fractional currency so substituted shall be destroyed, and held as part of the sinking fund, as provided in the act approved April 17th, 1876. Passed without division. The same committee reported the following:—

That in addition to the amount of subsidiary coin authorized by law to be issued in redemption of the fractional currency, it shall be lawful to manufacture at the several Mints and issued through the Treasury, and its several offices such coin to the amount \$20,000,000.

SEC. 2. That the silver bullion required for this purpose shall be purchased from time to time at market rate by the Secretary of the Treasury with any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, and the resulting coin may be issued in the ordinary disbursements of the Treasury, or in exchange for legal tender notes, at par, but no purchase of bullion shall be made under this act when the market rate for the same shall be such as will not admit of the coinage and issue, or exchange as herein provided without loss to the Treasury, and any gain or shrinkage arising from this coinage shall be accounted for and paid into the Treasury as provided, under existing laws relative to the subsidiary coinage; provided that the amount of money at any one time invested in such silver bullion exclusive of such resulting, coin shall not exceed \$1,000,000.

SEC. 3. That the trade dollar shall not hereafter be a legal tender and the Secretary of the Treasury is hereby authorized to limit from time to time the coinage thereof to such an amount as he may deem sufficient to meet the export demand for the same.

Reagan, of Texas, moved to strike out of the second section, the words "or in exchange for legal tender notes," at par also to strike out the words—"or exchange."

The amendment was agreed to and the bill as thus amended was then passed without a division.

The Elections Committee reported Abbott from Massachusetts, was entitled to his seat.

Levy of Louisiana, offered a resolution instructing the special Committee on Louisiana affairs to investigate the outrage alleged to have been recently committed in West Feliciana, in that State. Adjourned.

FLASHES.

NEW ORLEANS, June 10.—The steamship New Orleans passed the jetties without difficulty.

PORTLAND, Me, June 10.—Monongahela sailed for Norfolk to-day.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES.

WASHINGTON, June 10. For the South Atlantic States, stationary barometer and temperature, southeast winds and partly cloudy weather will prevail.

NEW YORK.

A Fatal Duel in Colorado—The Sunday Liqueur Law in Gotham.

New York, June 10.—A dispatch received says Albert Jessup was killed in a duel at River Bend, Colorado, Thursday. He was the son of a prominent New York banker. The duel was fought without seconds. The parties met quietly and proceeded to shoot at each other.

The police commissioners have given strict injunctions for the enforcement of the excise law. To-morrow the police are, if necessary, ordered to force the doors of saloons, where liquors being sold and arrest offenders. The police reserves are ordered to hold themselves in readiness, for any trouble that may arise.
