FIRST BALLOT.
 CINCINNATI, 12:10 P. M.—The Chairman, McPherson, of Pennsylvania, announced the total vote on first ballot 752. Necessary to a choice 379. Of the votes cast Blaine received 285; Bristow 113; Conkling 99; Hartranft 58; Hayes 65; Jewell 11; Morton 124; Wheeler 3. This is the official announcement from the Chair, and the same as bulletined all over the country.

 CINCINNATI, June 16.—There was great confusion over the ruling of the chair during the proceedings. McPherson said, referring to Mr. Carwalt, of Pennsylvania, his colleague from Pittsburg had dishonored himself by his remark. Thompson, of Indiana, severely denounced the chairman for bringing into the area of their Convention his personal differences. Subsequently the chairman disavowed any intent to abuse his powers and confessed his colleague had irritated him into a retort, but he withdrew his remarks.
 CINCINNATI, June 16.—The nomination of Hayes was made unanimous. Wm A Wheeler, of New York, was nominated for Vice President.

When South Carolina had been called, Wheeler having already received 366 votes, Kollogg, of Connecticut withdrew the name of Hawley and moved that Wheeler's nomination be made unanimous; agreed to. Wheeler's nomination was so declared.
 After the usual resolution of thanks, the Convention adjourned.

FOREIGN.
Fair in England—Conflicts in Ghent—Murders of Turkish Ministers—Danger of European War Over.
 LONDON, June 16.—The weather is fair.
 GHENT, June 16.—There are conflicts between the police and people. The windows of the Alcantara Hotel have been broken.
 LONDON, June 16.—A Renter's telegram from Constantinople says the Ministers assembled in council recently, when a dismissed officer entered with a revolver and killed the Minister of War and Foreign Affairs and seriously wounded the Minister of Marine. The assassin was arrested. His motive is supposed to be revenge for dismissal.
 A dispatch from Berlin to the Daily News affirms that the danger of a European war is over for the Summer; furloughs are freely granted.
 Russian men-of-war are assembling at Sebastopol.

 WASHINGTON, D. C., June 16.—SENATE—The Indian Appropriation Bill was reported with amendment; calendar. The impeachment was resumed; no quorum was present and the court adjourned to-morrow.
 The House considered the Army Appropriation Bill; no quorum. Adjourned.
 Official information reached the Cabinet to-day of Winslow's release. The conclusion was reached that the act abrogated the extradition treaty.
 It is stated that Bristow will certainly resign before the 1st of July. New and Chandler are spoken of as his successors.

FOREIGN.
The Turkish Murders Confirmed—Tea Burned—Operatives Out—Heligoland Not to be Ceded—Buffet Elected.
 LONDON, June 16.—The killing of the Turkish Ministers is confirmed.
 Forty thousand chests of tea were burned at Brooks wharf, Belfast, to-day.
 The failure of the linen manufacturers has thrown out between 3,000 and 4,000 operatives.
 Disraeli said in the House that there is no foundation for the report that Great Britain would cede the Island of Heligoland to Germany.
 PARIS, June 16.—Bruffet was elected to the Senate by a majority of 3.
