TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

Noon Dispatches.

FOREIGN. Geneva Wants War—Averting the Sultan—Religious Tolerance in Spain—How Buffet was Elected. LONDON, June 17.—The Servian government's decision in favor of peace, opposed the wishes of the whole people. The position of Prince Milan is becoming dangerous. The Porte will complain of Austria allowing volunteers to cross the frontier.

WASHINGTON.

Leave Asked to Postpone Belknap Until November. WASHINGTON, D. C., June 17.—In the Senate, the counsel for Belknap moved that the trial be postponed until the middle of November next. The managers on the part of the House of Representatives asked leave to consult with the House on the question of postponement, and the Senate setting as a Court adjourned until Monday.

FIRES.

Vessel Burned—\$20,000 Fire at Lumberton, N. C. PORT HURON, MICH., June 17.—The Great Western, of the Ferry Union, was burnt at the dock last night. Loss \$80,000. WILMINGTON, N. C., June 17.—A fire at Lumberton last night, destroyed seventeen buildings. Loss \$20,000; insurance \$6,000. Supposed to be the work of an incendiary.

FOREIGN.

Views on Buffet's Election—Romanians Arresting Servians—The Murderer of the Ministers Hanged. PARIS, June 12.—The Republican organs consider that Buffet's election to the Left Senatorialship places the Senate in opposition to the Chamber of Deputies and universal suffrage. The Conservative organs say the election is not a hostile demonstration, but an act of justice.

WASHINGTON.

Bristow Resigned—Grant Recommendations Continued—Plea for the Postponement of the Belknap Trial not Disposed of. WASHINGTON, June 17.—Bristow formally resigned to-day, to take effect on the 20th inst. The President to-day sent a message to Congress calling attention to the embarrassed condition of all branches of the Government, if there should be a failure to pass the necessary appropriation bills before the 1st of July or otherwise provide for the emergency. He recommends an extension of the provisions of all appropriation bills covering the present year to the next fiscal year in all cases where there is a failure to provide for the expenditures of the government by the 1st of July.

WASHINGTON.

The Senate resumed the Belknap impeachment trial. Judge Black, of counsel for the accused, said that after consultation with his colleagues and client, he was satisfied it was outside the limits of physical possibility for the defence were so far away that it was almost impossible to get them here by the 6th of July. There were reasons which must be obvious to the members of the Senate, and were understood by the managers on the part of the House, why the trial should be postponed until about the middle of November. He appealed to the managers to say whether they had any desire to press the trial on the 6th of July. If they would ask a postponement, he would be glad to confide the Senate would accede to the request. He believed that further trial of the case should be continued until some convenient day in November. Manager Lord said a day should be

named, but that could be done hereafter. The managers had concluded to ask leave to confer with the House of Representatives in regard to a postponement of the trial. As to filing the paper offered by the defence, yesterday, he submitted that that could be disposed of whenever a quorum should be present. The request of the managers for Lord to confer with the House was granted and the Senate as a Court of impeachment adjourned to Monday next.

House.—A memorial was presented asking Congress to take measures to prevent accident from careless use of fireworks on the 4th of July; referred. There was considerable debate on the message from the President asking that the present appropriation be continued in force until the adoption of the appropriation bills for the next fiscal year, after which the message was referred to the Committee on Appropriations. Lord, of New York, on behalf of the impeachment managers, informed the House that the counsel of Belknap had made application to the Senate for an adjournment until November, alleging among other reasons the great difficulty of procuring and retaining witnesses here in the month of July, and that the reasons presented were that one of the managers had asked leave to confer with the House. The points which he desired to present were, first: that the question of jurisdiction had been settled, and that the question as to the two-thirds vote will be settled before adjournment of session; and second: that the Senate as a court would not set after Congress adjourned. The plan of the managers had been to induce the Senate as a court of impeachment, to let Congress adjourn and then go on and try the case; but the Senate would not do that, and therefore that plan had been given up. The managers had therefore instructed him to submit a resolution authorizing the managers to consent to a continuance of the trial until the 15th or 20th of November. Opposition was made to this on the ground that, if postponed till November, the trial would encroach upon the next session. Without disposing of a motion to refer the subject to the Judiciary Committee, the House went into a discussion on the Army Appropriation Bill.

SOUTH CAROLINA.

Five Persons Killed by a Railroad Accident. CHARLESTON, June 17.—A special train on the Anderson branch of the Greenville & Columbia Railroad, was wrecked last night on a broken trestle. The engineer, conductor, fireman and one train hand were killed; another train hand was fatally injured. These were the only persons on the train.
