FOREIGN.

Resigns His Peace Commission—The Sultan's Forces Defeated-Cholera -Austria Concentrating Troops-Turkish War Against Christians-Fire at Moscow.

London, June 19 .- The Prince of Montenegro has resigned his post as epresentative of the insurgents in the negotiations with the Porte.

VIENNA, June 19 .- The insurgent eader Galief defeated the Sultan's forces at Petrovaez, killing 200 Turks, and capturing 200 sheep and cattle.

CALCUTTA, June 19-The cholera is raging in Gulwood, a village of 200 inhabitante, and 100 dled in three days

BERLIN, June 19 .- Austria has ordered a concentration of 158,000 regular roops and 169,000 landwehr in the Eastern and Southeastern provinces, for Autumn drill.

London, June 19 .- The correspondent of the Moscow Gazette telegraphs from Celterget that the Turks in Bosnia have unfurled the green flag for a holy war against the christians. It is stated that Servia will send an envoy to Constantinople to propose a disarmment and peace, in return for the cession of territory.

Moscow, June 19 .- A fire here last nigt destroyed over fifty houses. No particulars of the damage have been recieved, but they are believed to be Three-fourths of the town of Kadschory, in Cancansus, including the Bazaar, were burned on Saturday

NEW YORK.

\$400,000 Fire at Hudson.

Hudson, June 19.-Last night a fire broke out in the engine room of the propeller John Taylor, lying at the docket of the Athens & Schenectady Railroad opposite the city. The flames extended to other vessels at the dock, and the depot and two buildings, which were almost totally destroyed. The John Taylor, the bark Hercules, loaded with sugar, the canal boat Stephen Warren, with a cargo of merchandize were burned. The vessel belonged to the line of John H Stovin. The depot, 1600 feet long, build at great expense by Daniel Drew, and known as the "White Elephant," was nearly destroyed, with its contents, including freight. 100 freight cars standing on the track, loaded with flour, corn, oats, and tobacco were totally consumed. The depot belonged to the New York Central & Hudson River Railroad Company. Loss about \$30,-

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 19 .- The Senate is in secret session considering the question of postponing the Belknap impeachment trial until Novem-

A number of delegates from the Cincinnati Convention, including Gov. Kellogg and Marshal Packard, called on the President this morning.

There are no intimations as yet concerning the successor to Bristow.

Louisville, June 19 .- Almost the entire crop on the French Broad River, was destroyed by the recent freshet. There was twenty feet rise up to midnight last night, but is falling rapidly of the crop. There was very slight damage on the Holston River.

WASHINGTON.

Bristow's Probable Successor-Testimony Before Committees - Cox Again Chosen Speaker-The Impeachment to go on in July, &c.

WASHINGTON, D C, June 19 .- The Secretary of War has returned. Hon. Stephen A Huglburt will prob-

ably succeed Bristow. Gen. Reynolds, commander of the Department of Texas, is here. He testifies to-morrow before the War Expenditures Committee.

Mr. Hicks, cable clerk of the Ocean Telegraph Company, appeared to-day before the Judiciary Committee and submitted five telegrams, among them one signed Philadelphia, commencing: "Dispatch received. Cable immediately. To Chairman House Judiciary Committee, Washington." Then follows the precise language which Knott received from Josiah Caldwell. It is

addressed to "Faro, London." House.-Cox was again chosen Speaker pro tem.

Southard asked leave to ask the Secretary of the Treasury why he failed to furnish the list to defaulting col-

Kasson objected.

The Army Appropriation Bill was resumed. The bill passed without important amendments.

District matters were considered. Among the bills passed was one for paving Pennsylvania Avenue. A resolution appointing a commission of two non-residents and one resident to form a government for the District of Columbia, passed. Adjourned.

SENATE.-The Impeachment Court decided to proceed with the trial, July 6th. Adjourned.

It was further ordered that the trial can only proceed while Congress is in session, and that the Secretary shall subpœna such witnesses at the expense of the United States as shall be allowed by the committee, and that subpœnas for all other witnesses for respondent shall contain a statement that the witnesses therein named shall attend upon the trial of respondent for half of their lawful fees.

FOREIGN.

London, June 19 .- By a coal gas explosion on the ship Atlantic, loaded with coal for Hong Kong, six were killed, several injured and the vessel seriously damaged.
