Spanish Cabinet Crisis—Turkish Excesses at Jerusalem, &c.

MADRID, June 20.—There is a Cabinet crisis, it is rumored, in consequence of the two per cent increase on land tax.

WASHINGTON.

To Print or Not to Print—Favorable Report on the Bill to Exchange \$10,000,000 of Silver—Clymer's Committee's Work.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 20.—In the Senate, during the morning hour, a lengthy debate occurred on the question of printing a list of persons indebted to the government.

The Senate Finance Committee agreed to report favorably on the bill exchanging ten millions of silver for legal tenders.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 20.—Kerr will spend some time at the Red Sulphur Springs, Virginia.

Lot M. Morrill, is mentioned for Secretary of the Treasury.

At a full cabinet to-day Secretary Bristow took formal leave.

Belknap to-day erased fifty names from the list of witnesses.

Nominations: Jas A. Williamson, of Iowa, Commissioner of the Land Office; Mrs. Estaine Vern, Post Master at Jefferson, Texas.

In the sub-committee of the Judiciary Committee, experts failed to identify the hand writing of the dispatches sent from Philadelphia, to Caldwell, dictating to him what to telegraph back regarding Blaine.

A bill directing Judges of the Circuit Courts to appoint commissioners in every county, who shall give a hearing to any person arrested for viola-

tion of United States laws when he is entitled to such hearing, passed.

Douglass, Chairman of the Committee of the Freedman's Bank, made a report regarding frauds practiced by the Freedman Bureau in obtaining money due colored soldiers and sailors, and charges Gen. O O Howard and G W Ballock with filing fraudulent vouchers and other false evidences of settlement in the Second Auditor's office.

The Speaker pro tem laid before the House a message from the President in relation to the extradition treaty with England. The refusal of that government to comply with its provisions in the cases of Winslow and Brent, was based on an act of parliament passed in 1870, and the setting at liberty of both these captives from justice.
