TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

Noon Dispatches. WYOMING. Another Fight With the Indians. OMAHA, June 30.—A dispatch received at Department Headquarters today from Fort Laramie, says the report from the Red Cloud Agency is that the Indians coming in bring news of another fight with Northern Indians. The troops engaged not being Gen Crook's. A village was entirely destroyed.

MISSISSIPPI. Drowning of Two Young Men. MEMPHIS, June 30.—William C Morgan, son of State Senator Bright Morgan, and Victor Monroe, son of a prominent citizen of Hernando, Miss., were drowned near there yesterday, in attempting to save the life of a companion. Two other young men narrowly escaped a similar fate before the youth for whom Morgan and Monroe lost their lives was rescued.

DOMESTIC INTELLIGENCE. Fires in Indiana and Massachusetts.—Ransom on the Committee for North Carolina. Twelve buildings, including the post office, at Owensville, Ind., were burned to-day. The new mills of the American Linen Company, at Fall River, was partially burned. 400 men and 700 women are ousted.

WASHINGTON. The Hawaiian Treaty Bill Referred.—Bill Extending the Present Appropriations Passed. WASHINGTON, D C, June 30.—In the Senate, Cameron, of Pennsylvania, from the Committee on Foreign Relations, reported favorably on the Hawaiian treaty, and asked that it be placed on the calendar. Mr. Morrill, of Vermont, said the bill affected the tariff, and he moved it be referred to the Committee on Finance. After some discussion the motion was agreed to.

WASHINGTON, D C, June 30.—In the Senate, Cameron, of Pennsylvania, from the Committee on Foreign Relations, reported favorably on the Hawaiian treaty, and asked that it be placed on the calendar. WASHINGTON, D C, June 30.—Major George E Glenn has been assigned to the duty of Chief Paymaster of the Department of the Gulf. The Republican Senators have been caucusing nearly all day, without any known result. They seem disposed to persist in resistance to the House reduction in appropriations bills. There will be a general Cabinet tomorrow to consider the financial situation. Dispatches from New York, Philadelphia, Boston, Cincinnati, Chicago, Louisville, San Francisco, and other prominent cities and towns, state that the Tilden ticket is well received, and in many places salutes of guns were fired. Tilden and Hendricks demonstrations took place in Montgomery, Alabama, and other places in the South, last night. Clubs for the campaign are forming everywhere. At New Orleans and Shreveport, La., great enthusiasm prevails.

LOUISIANA. A Disgraceful Radical Meeting.—Fight on the Stage—Pistols Drawn. NEW ORLEANS, June 29.—The majority report of the committee on credentials came up for adoption. The vote was taken amid tremendous applause and declared adopted. Then came a dead lock. The report was adverse to the Packard faction, throwing out several delegations that favored Packard. Numerous calls were made for a minority report, but without success. In the afternoon, Pinchback declared the Convention adjourned until to-morrow, which created great commotion and cries. An attempt was made to place Stamps, a Packard delegate, in the chair. A struggle took place on the stage and Stamps was thrown into the orchestra. Several fights took place on the floor, and pistols were drawn on all sides, but were not used. Partial quiet having been restored, Col Packard made a conciliatory speech, and the Convention thereafter agreed to take a recess until 10 o'clock to-morrow.

NEW YORK, June 30.—Christian Stien, the great illicit whiskey manufacturer who was brought back from Canada and who charged a number of deputy collectors and ex-Assistant District Attorney Hughes, with having taken from him five hundred dollars per week hush money, plead guilty today in the United States Court to the indictment found against him. He was remanded for sentence.

WASHINGTON. 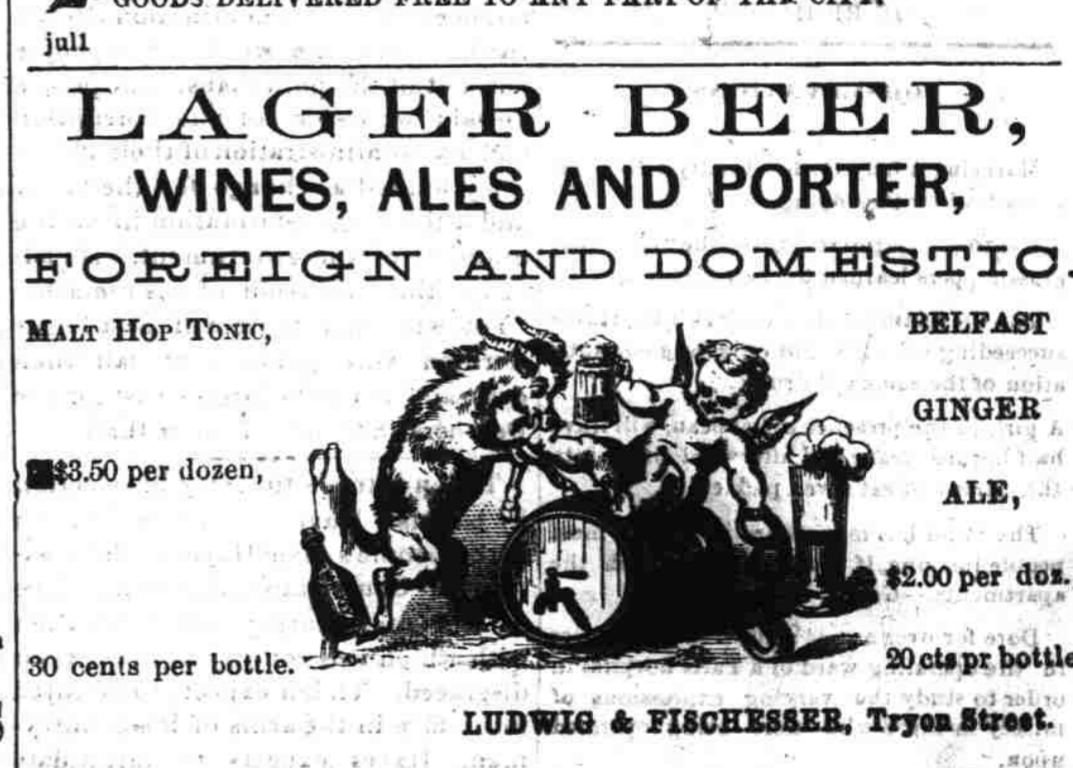
