FOREIGN

Servia Makes a Declaration of War.
The Present Situation in the East.
CONSTANTINOPLE, July 2.—A letter from Prince Milan was delivered to the Grand Visir on Thursday last, demanding the incorporation of Bosnia and Herzegovina with Servia, under the sovereignty of the Porte. Negotiations between the Prince of Montenegro and the Porte for an arrangement on the basis of cession of territory failed. Both Servians and Montenegrins are ready to cross the frontier. War is imminent; the Mid Hat reforms are indefinitely postponed. Prince Milan has asked the Prince of Romania to observe a strict neutrality for the present.

FLASHES.

PHILADELPHIA, July 3.—Five of the New York Seventh Regiment struck.

St. Louis, July 3.—Between 40 and 50 Mexican veterans from Texas passed through here for Philadelphia today. The Exchange adjourned to Wednesday.

New York, July 3.—At three p. m., yesterday the thermometer stood 98. A number of sunstrokes; three mad dogs were killed.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES.

WASHINGTON, July 3.—For the South Atlantic and Gulf States, rising or stationary barometer, nearly stationary temperature, southwest to southeast winds, partly cloudy weather and occasionally local rains will prevail.

WASHINGTON.

Conkling Wants an Adjournment—Republican Filibustering—Excursion Party from the South.

WASHINGTON, July 3.—SENATE.—In the discussion of the motion to adjourn, Conkling said it was the duty of Congress to conclude the public business as speedily as possible and adjourn this session of Congress. He expressed the opinion that on Wednesday the difficulties arising out of the appropriation bills would be settled. The Senate would then be ready to go on with the Belknap trial. He hoped that when the hour for that trial arrived, it would be proceeded with and finished. He did not object to the adjournment over to-morrow, but hoped the Senate would reassemble on Wednesday.

The disabilities of Robt Ransom were removed. The resolution to pay Pinchback, was discussed at great length without result. Adjourned to Wednesday.

HOUSE.—The Republicans filibustered all day to prevent introduction of a bill to repeal the resumption act. Consideration of the conference report on the post office bill, was postponed to Wednesday. Adjourned to Wednesday.

Large excursion party from Georgia and Alabama, here to-day, via the Midland road, under charge of W D Chiple, Southern agent, of the line. After viewing the public buildings, they were presented to the President by Hon H R Harris, of Georgia. They have proceeded to Philadelphia by special train over the Baltimore & Ohio road.

WASHINGTON, D C, July 3.—Still no Secretary of the Treasury, but business proceeds as usual. No quorum in either House. No domestic markets to-day.

EGYPT.

Death of Gen. A. W. Reynolds.

WASHINGTON, D C, July 3.—A letter from Alexandria, Egypt, dated May 20th, states that Gen. Alex W Reynolds died suddenly in that city the day previous. Gen Reynolds was a native of Virginia, and graduated at West Point in 1837. He served in the U S Army until the beginning of the war when he resigned and entered the Confederate army. He participated in many battles and attained the rank of Brigadier General.
