TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

Noon Dispatches.

FOREIGN.

Seach's Army Destroyed—Proceedings of the Conference of Emperors Servians Entered Bulgaria—5,000 Servians Killed so Far—Massacre of Christians—The Bulgarian Insurrection Spreading—Pierrepont Arrived at St. James—Vessel Ordered Home.

LONDON, July 10.—The Standard's Berlin special says it is said the following points were discussed at the Reichstag: The Danube question; Austria's demand approving the formation of a great Servian power, and interference at the proper time in favor of the armistice.

BELGRADE, July 10.—260 more wounded have arrived. There are alarming reports that Gen Seach's army is almost entirely destroyed. War Minister Nichalich had taken Seach's command in person.

The Morning Post's Berlin dispatches say Prince Gortschokoff and Count Andrassey have telegraphed Prince Bismarck the result of the interview of the Emperors at Reichstadt. Austria is opposed to the aggrandizement of Servia, and Russia demands the free passage of Dardanel.

The rumor of the capture of Neve-signa, is contradicted.

A dispatch to the Times from Zeimony reports that 5,000 Servians have succeeded in crossing the river Timoh, and have entered Bulgaria. All is quiet in Herzegovina.

A dispatch to the Daily News, from Belgrade, summing up the operations of the last eight days, says the Servians have fought 10 actions and lost 5,000 men. During the attack of Gen Olimpic on Belina, the Turks massacred all the christian inhabitants.

The Bulgarian insurrection is reported to be spreading widely.

A Vienna dispatch to the Daily Telegraph says it is asserted that the results of the Reichstadt interview, are as follows: common intervention is possible under certain circumstances; the idea of preserving the same statutes as before the war, under all circumstances is abandoned, and Russia formally renouncing the idea of separate action.

LONDON, July 10.—Mr Edward Pierrepont, the new United States Minister has arrived here, and will be presented to the Queen at Windsor Castle tomorrow.

The Standard says it understands that the foreign office has received a report of the preliminary enquiry into the proceedings of the British war vessel Barracoon, in connection with the recent affairs at the Samoan Islands, and it has been considered desirable to order the vessel home.

WASHINGTON.

No Vote in Committee on Resumption—Committee Adjourned to Wednesday—House Adjournment—The Appropriation Extension Passed Both Houses.

WASHINGTON, July 10.—The Committee on Banking and Currency met, but without action or discussion of resumption adjourned to Thursday its regular day of meeting. The Committee on Commerce will report the bill introduced by Cox regulating Coolie immigration. The sub-Judiciary Committee adjourned to Wednesday, pending a decision whether the committee will continue the Blaine branch of the \$64,000 bond investigation. The House will probably adjourn from Thursday to Monday, during the impeachment trial. The bill extending the appropriations ten days, has passed both Houses.

WASHINGTON, July 10.

For the South Atlantic States, very warm, southerly winds, partly cloudy weather, slight changes in barometer and in the northern portions local rains and slight fall of temperature.

WASHINGTON.

Blaine Goes Higher—Money Received—Dyer Not Removed—Bristow Recusant—Not an Ontrage After All—The Distribution of Troops—The Lie Given in the House, &c.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 10.—Blaine's resignation, taking effect to-day, was read in the House.

Three million two hundred thousand dollars, were received at the redemption bureau to-day, being the accumulation of a week.

Attorney General Taft says that if District Attorney General Dyer has been removed, as reported, he knows nothing about it.

The Star says the Elections Committee have decided to refer the case of Platte vs. Goode back to the people.

was overcome by the heat, but is better this evening.

Ex-Secretary Bristow before the Whiskey Committee, said that whatever he knew that was of any importance he must have heard and learned as a member of the Cabinet. For reasons of public policy he could not answer any of the questions put to him. The committee has taken no action on this refusal.

The papers in the case of the taking of ex-Minister of War Villa DuVa, from the steamer Tyben, at San Domingo, have been received at the State Department. It appears that the authorities violated no international law in their proceedings.

The Elections Committee have taken no final action in the Platte vs. Goode case, from Virginia, and the election will not be referred back to the people.

HOUSE.—A resolution was adopted calling for full information regarding the Indian War.

Faulkner offered a resolution referring Chinese immigration to a select committee.

Objection by Townsend. Mr. Banning submitted the following statement, showing the distribution of United States troops: There are at present in the army 26,979 troops, located as follows; 4,216 belong to the detachment at West Point; 7,936 located in the Territories; 3,718 in Texas, 8,334 in other Southern States, while in the field operating against the Indians there are under Gen Terry only 1,123, and under Gen. Crook 1,990; making in all 2,913, and the remaining 4,000 are located in Northern cities and forts.

During the discussion over the report that the Conference Committee on the Diplomatic Bill could not agree, the following occurred: Singleton expressed the surprise which he and the other members of the Appropriation Committee felt at hearing that the gentleman (Foster) opposed in the House the propositions to which he had given his assent in the Committee.

Foster—When the gentleman makes that statement he mistakes purposely. Singleton—Do you mean to charge me with a lie.

Foster—I do; if the gentleman makes that statement, I say that it is absolutely untrue. Singleton—Very well, sir; something can be said about that after awhile.

The Speaker pro tem—Order, gentlemen! order.

NEW YORK.

Suit for \$200,000—Hot Weather—Guilty of Distilling—Sentence for Illicit Distilling.

NEW YORK, July 10.—Suit has been commenced against the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company in the United States Court, by the Government, to recover \$200,000 due.

The extreme heat continues. It is thought that there is a slight abatement in the oppressiveness. Many cases of sunstroke, a number of which are fatal, are reported.

Christian A Stern pleaded guilty to-day to illicit distilling, and was sentenced to 16 months and \$1,000 fine.

Thos Corridor, Charles Conklin and George White, the three National Bank note counterfeiters who were captured some time ago in Brooklyn, pleaded guilty to-day and were sentenced, Corridor to the penitentiary for ten years and a fine of \$750; Conklin to 5 years and fine of \$750; White, 67 years of age, an engraver who was arrested in Philadelphia, to ten years and a fine of \$1,000.

FOREIGN.

Another Fight—Failure, &c.

RAZGUA, July 10.—Intelligence received here from Slavonic sources, says that in an engagement between the Turks and Servians on the 6th, the Turks captured 450 muskets and 40 boxes of cartridges. Seven Turkish battalions participated in the fight. Turkish Gen Mehmed Ali Pasha is at Graniza on the Servian frontier in half an hour's march from Yaror. The Servian Gen'l Jaepis said to have been wounded in the late engagement.

GENERAL, July 10.—The statement published in the Gibraltar Guardian that the officers of the garrison at that place who were absent on leave have been recalled, is incorrect; on the contrary, the officers are still proceeding on leave for the Summer.

LONDON, July 10.—Edward Cooke, stock and share broker, has failed—Liabilities \$680,000; assets \$420,000.

At the close of the debate, Foster, rising to a question of privilege said: "In the heat of the moment I applied epithets to the gentleman from Mississippi, (Singleton,) which after reflection I wish to retract, and withdraw them. I do not believe that he intended to charge me with falsehood and deceit, as I at the moment thought he did." I do not wish to have any personal unkindness with the gentleman or to violate in any way the points of debate.

Singleton—I am very glad indeed to hear what the gentleman says; he and I have been on the best footing with each other, and never have had any

misunderstanding. The gentleman pitched into me pretty strongly, and I came back at him in the same way. He withdraws the offensive language and we are quite as before. I desire no difficulty with any gentleman, but always do my duty and maintain my rights. The report was accepted, and a new conference committee appointed, consisting of Singleton, of Mississippi, Springer, of Illinois, and Monroe, of Ohio. The latter are members of the Committee on Foreign Affairs.

Holtman, of Indiana, moved to suspend the rules and adopt a resolution instructing the Committee on Banking and Currency to report for consideration and amendment, a bill to define so much of the resumption act as provides for the redemption of the United States notes, with coins, negatively, years 105, says 98—not two-thirds in the affirmative. Adjourned to Wednesday.

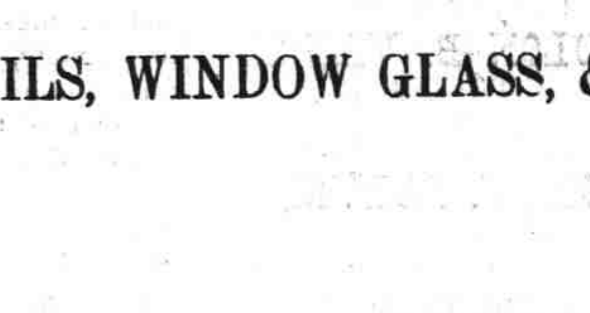
