

### Noon Dispatches.

FOREIGN.

Project to Raise Money for Cuba-Mediation Offered Between Russia and England-The Correspondents Alive-Servian Defeat-Servia Reported as About Asking for an Armistice-Unimportant Fighting.

HAVANA, July 11 .- A project is on foot for a forty million loan for the benefit of Cuba. A fifth will be subscribed here, the balance in Spain, the government giving as a special security, the customs of the Island. A merchants' meeting here subscribed three millions.

London, Suly 12.-A Berlin special in the Times says: At the Rechstadt interview, Andrassey offered to mediate between Russia and England. Andrassey seems to have reason to hope that Germany would assist in the mediation. Russia gave no definite answer, and the situation remains unchanged.

BELGRADE, July 12-The correspondents reported killed and wounded, have arrived safely.

VIENNA, July 12-Turkish dispatches eport that Gen Tchernsjeff has suffered a crushing defeat and fled to Servia in disorder. The report is unconfirmed.

London, July 12.-Derby consents to receive a deputation including many members of Parliament who will present a memorial urging complete neutrality on the Eastern ques-

The Telegraph's Vienna special says: Servia in 9 day's fighting, has lost 511 per cent of her forces. We may any day hear of proposals for an armistice."

The Telegraph's Paris special says "I hear on very trustworthy authority that the Servians are about to crave amnesty through the intervention of

RAGUSSA, July 12 .- Turkish advices state. 5,000 Montenegrans have sallied from their fortifications at Padgritza, and 400 killed. The Reuter Telegram Company, however, has a Scrutari telegram stating that the Turks near Padagretza endeavored to re-open the road to Western, but the attempt failed. The fighting at Kernits, west of Scantari, is unfavorable to the Turks.

BELGRADE, July 12-The Turkish gunboat bombarded Novocelan, which had been previously taken by the Servians, . The Servians captured little Servonie, which was held by two battalions.
