### Noon Dispatches.

#### FOREIGN.

**Honor to the King of Greece—Turkey Landing Asiatics—Yellow Fever at Liverpool—The Servians not Hopeless—Bombardment of Towns.**

LONDON, July 13.—Victoria has invested the King of Greece with the garter.

Turkish steamers disembarked five thousand Asiatics at Weddin Tuesday. Vessels have arrived at Liverpool from the West Indies, with yellow fever.

PARIS, July 13.—The tenor of the dispatches shows the Servian situation not so critical.

RAGUSA, July 13.—The Servians are bombarding Nisch, Navi, Bazar, Widen and Bjilina. The frontier is entirely clear of Turks. Tchernajeff having secured a line of retreat, the marching is toward the Balkans.

#### THE INDIANS.

**Raid on Ranches—Horrible Mutilation of Custer and Demonic Rejoicings—Crook's Fight a Canard.**

CHEYENNE, July 13.—Two ranches, fifty miles North of here were raided on, and 22 horses stolen. A large number of Indians camped at the head waters of the Dismal Swamp, 40 miles North of Birdwood.

CHICAGO, July 13.—Specials from Sioux City say the Indians there from the scene of Custer's fight, give barbarous accounts of the treatment of the dead. An Indian named Rain-in-the-Face cut out Custer's heart, put it on a pole and a grand war dance was had around it. The Indians are jubilant and boastful, and hope to make better terms on account of their success.

OMAHA, July 13.—A dispatch from Fort Fetterman last night, says there is no word of truth in the rumor of Gen Crook's fight with the Indians, and defeat. That all sorts of rumors are afloat, which are contradicted by officers, and nothing has been heard from Gen Crook, for the past ten days. A courier is expected daily.

#### WASHINGTON.

**The Impeachment—House Discussing Resumption.**

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 13.—The Senate sitting as a Court of Impeachment, at 12:40 adjourned until to-morrow on account of the absence of witness John S. Evans, post trader at Fort Sill. The legislative business was then resumed.

The Banking and Currency Committee have reported the Silver Bill to the House which is now discussing it. The Democratic members of the Banking and Currency Committee have agreed to construct a bill in complete accordance with the St. Louis platform. It will repeal the present resumption act, but inaugurate definite methods for preparing the Treasury and the country for resumption.

Leading Democrats are sustaining General Gibson in his opposition to the simple repeal, regarding that as the only partial compliance with the spirit of the platform.

#### MARYLAND.

**Educational Association Adjourned—Railroad Meeting.**

BALTIMORE, July 13.—The National Education Association adjourned *sine die* after an important and interesting session of three days.

At the monthly meeting of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, President Garrett said the Cincinnati Southern Railroad would be opened one hundred and sixty miles from Cincinnati to a point South of Danville, Ky., by January the 1st next, and that it was expected of the Trustees that the entire line from Cincinnati through Kentucky to Chattanooga, 338 miles, would be completed by July 1st, 1877.

#### NEW YORK.

**Republican Ratification Meeting.**

NEW YORK, July 13.—A ratification of the Cincinnati platform and no names took place last night at Cooper Union Hall. A number were unable to gain admittance. The meeting was called to order by Spencer. E. W. Stoughton was President. There were two hundred Vice Presidents, and a hundred Secretaries. The speakers were Gov. Solomon, Gen. Kilpatrick and Judge Dillehouffer. Letters of excuse from Gov. Dix and R. H. Dana, Jr. were read.

#### MISSISSIPPI.

LOUISVILLE, July 13.—Watson will make the race for Congress. It is rumored that the Republicans will run Bristow.

PHILADELPHIA, July 13.—Englishmen and Irishmen fought, yesterday, with knives over the Orangemen's parade, and both were terribly cut. Six or eight participated in the fight, which lasted several hours.

### MID-NIGHT DISPATCHES.

#### ILLINOIS.

**Republican Victory in Chicago.**  
CHICAGO, July 13.—The total vote for Mayor was 30,000; Heath's majority over McGrath was 15,788; over Kimball 11,618; over both, 8,250. Heath carried 17 out of 18 wards. The Tribune claims this as a straight out Republican victory.

#### PENNSYLVANIA.

**Book Association Adjourned—Centennial Visitors.**

PHILADELPHIA, July 13.—The American Book Trade Association adjourned *sine die* after electing officers for the ensuing year. A number of members of the National Educational Association, which adjourned yesterday in Baltimore, arrived at the Centennial Exhibition grounds to-day.

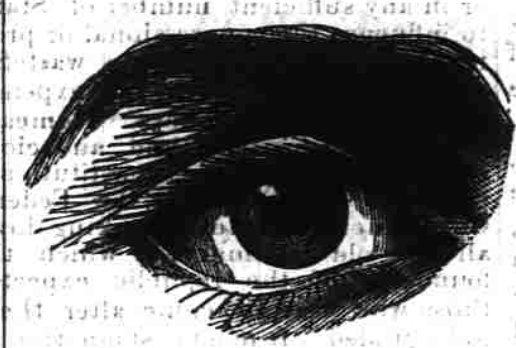
