Noon Dispatches.

FOREIGN.

France Inactive on the Eastern Question—The Turks Shut Up in Weddin—A Narrow Passage for Turkish Reinforcements.

BERLIN, July 14.—The closing of the port of Klek compels Turkey to send reinforcements to Bosnia and Herzegovina through a narrow strip of Bosnia territory between Montenegro and Servia.

WASHINGTON.

Unimportant Congressional Proceedings.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 14.—In the Senate, Jones, of Nevada, is speaking in opposition to the report of the Committee on Conference on the Silver Bill.

THE WEST.

Supplies Sent Crook.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 14.—Sheridan telegraphs Sherman that a supply train with five companies of infantry have been sent Crook and are expected to reach him on the 12th.

Mid-Night Dispatches.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES.

WASHINGTON, July 14.

For the South Atlantic and Gulf States, partly cloudy weather, continued high temperature, southerly to westerly winds, and stationary or slight rise in barometer, with rains and slight fall in temperature in the Northern portions of the first named district.

FOREIGN.

Petition for the Abrogation of Treaty Money Pressure—Change of Headquarters.

LONDON, July 14.—In Commons numerous petitions were presented by members of both sides in favor of the abrogation of the declaration of the treaty of Paris.

PARIS, July 14.—The Figaro publishes a special dispatch from Simlin which says: "The Serbian General Tichernajeff is near Nisch. The Turkish General Abdul Kerim has made Weddin his base of operations, and is threatening General Tichernajeff's rear. The latter's headquarters have been moved back to Agoodia."

NEW YORK.

Liberal Republicans Called to Meet—Death of a Convict.

NEW YORK, July 14.—A meeting of the Executive Committee of the Liberal Republican State Committee has determined to call a Convention of Liberal Republicans at Saratoga, August 23rd.

AUBURN, July 14.—While a gang of fifty convicts were being transferred from Sing Sing, en route to Auburn, Thomas Egerly, a 15 year old boy from New York, leaped through a window while the train was running forty miles an hour and was instantly killed.

MASSACHUSETTS.

Honors to the Southern Military.

BOSTON, July 14.—The Southern military visitors are enjoying a grand fete to-day at the farm of Mr. Baker, at Wellesley. An excursion train, with numerous distinguished guests, went out from this city at 11 o'clock to-day.

WASHINGTON.

Jewell Off—Italy Sends Money to North Carolina—Committee's Report on the Bankrupt Bill as it Passed Both Houses—Committee Report on the Silver Bill Adopted—River Appropriations.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 14.—Jewell leaves to-morrow for Connecticut. There was no Cabinet meeting to-day.

Col. Pennypacker is assigned to the command of the Department of the South temporarily with the rank of Major General.

Italy has \$100 in gold for distribution among the families of the life-saving crew on Currituck Beach, N. C., who were lost in their endeavors to save the Italian bark Mucra Quaiya.

The House Committee on Naval Affairs, reported a resolution reciting that the wreck of the monitor Tecumseh, sunk in Mobile Bay, has been sold, and directing the Secretary of the Navy to prevent the breaking up or destruction of the wreck, and if necessary to purchase back the said wreck; adopted. The report of the Elections Committee seating Abbott and ousting Frost, from Massachusetts, was adopted. The Conference Committee on the bill to amend the bankrupt act, was adopted. Adjourned.

SENATE.—The Conference report on the Silver Bill was adopted. It goes to the President. The Impeachment Court adjourned to Monday. The River and Harbor Bill was resumed. Amendments increasing the appropriations for James and Cape Fear Rivers, were agreed to. Norwood moved to non-concur in all the committee's amendments striking out appropriations. Mr. Windom, of Minnesota, said the title of this bill was "making appropriations for the construction and repairs for the preservation and completion of certain public works on rivers and harbors, and for other purposes." He thought "for other purposes" meant to make smooth and easy the way to congressional honors from the various districts of the country. It was to remove obstructions in the way to Washington, rather than to remove obstructions from the rivers and harbors.

The Senate then non-concurred in the various amendments of the Committee on Appropriations, to strike out the provisions in the House bill as follows: Appropriating \$2,400 for the improvement of Acquia River; \$3,000 for Acquia Creek; \$1,000 for Nominee Creek, and \$1,000 for Accotinck Creek, in Virginia; \$15,000 for French Broad River, and \$25,000 for Pamlico River, N. C.; \$12,000 for Church River, \$10,000 for Hiwassee River, \$10,000 for Powell River, and \$35,000 for Cumberland River, below Nashville, in Tennessee; \$30,000, for dredging Cypress Bayou, \$60,000, for Sabine Pass, \$12,500 for Trinity River, where it enters Galveston Bay, \$13,950 for the Tombigbee River, in Alabama, \$3,000 for Perquimans River, in North Carolina; \$23,000 for the Cumberland and Rock Castle Rivers, above Nashville, Tenn.; \$25,000 for the improvement of the Ocmulgee River, between Macon and the seaboard, of Georgia; \$5,000 for Port Dorus, Ga.; \$25,000 for the improvement of New River; \$10,000 for the Mattafong River, and \$6,000 for the Pamunkee River, Va.; \$15,000 for the Warrior and Tombigbee, and \$3,000 for the Cheochee-Whatchie River, Ala.; \$5,000 for the Apalachicola River, Ala.; \$15,000 for the improvement of the French Broad River, in Tennessee; \$10,000 for the Missouri River, at the point where it is cutting into the Kansas shore above St. Joseph for the protection of St. Joseph; \$5,000 for the improvement of the Wisconsin River, and \$25,000 for the Big Santee.

The Conference report on the Bankrupt Bill was adopted and it goes to the President. Adjourned to 11 to-morrow.

The conference report of the Committee on the Bankrupt Bill, adopted by both Houses, is as follows: See § 5108. The revised statute is hereby amended as follows: At any time after the expiration of six months from the adjudication of bankruptcy, or if no debts have been proved against the bankrupt, or if no assets have come into the hands of the assignee at any time after the expiration of 90 days and before the final disposition of the cause, the bankrupt may apply to the court for a discharge from his debts.

NORTH CAROLINA.

Vance, Leach and Fowle Address an Immense Audience at Raleigh—The Superintendent of Schools.

RALEIGH, July 14.—Oak Square, near the Court House, swarmed to-day with people, and the houses on all sides were packed with men and women at the window, to hear Vance's campaign speech. He began at 11 A. M., and spoke two hours and a half. Leach, Fowle and other distinguished speakers addressed the assembly.

TR Funnell was the choice of the Governor for Superintendent of Public Instruction, and it is generally understood that he was appointed, but the Governor holds back the appointment and it is thought that J. C. Carson, the Republican nominee will get it.

FLASHES.

BALTIMORE, July 14.—Dr Richard S Stewart is dead, 78 years of age; he was connected with the Maryland Hospital for the insane, 45 years.

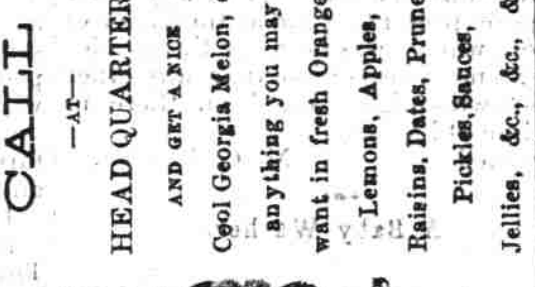
