Noon Dispatches.

FOREIGN.

Intelligence Upon Various Topics.

A deputation waited on a large meeting of cotton spinners, yesterday, at Manchester, and persuaded them to postpone a reduction of wages one month.

Servia has sent her last reserves, 14,000, to the front. 4,000 Egyptians and 5,000 Serbs have left Salonica for the front. Rumania has mobilized 20,000 men.

The recent earthquake has affected the Danube basin from Pason to Barvaria and to Presburg in Hungary. The Montenegrin march on Mostar is interrupted. The Turks intend meeting them in the field, as Mostar is indefensible.

RAGUSA, July 19.—Despatches from Slavonic sources announce, that the Turks have abandoned Neversing without fighting. The insurgents have invested Gatachko.

LONDON, July 19.—Capt Stoddard, late master of the British bark Skeevyvoore, who was arrested at Plymouth on the charge of attempting to scuttle his vessel while on the voyage from Melbourne to New York, and after a prolonged examination, committed for trial, was acquitted at the Devon assizes, yesterday, the jury saying that although the circumstantial evidence was undoubtedly strong, they were not satisfied about his guilt.

LIVERPOOL, July 19.—Peters Bros., corn merchants, have suspended. Liabilities supposed to be considerable.

WASHINGTON.

Congressional and Committee Work.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 19.—The Senate after the expiration of the morning hour resumed the consideration of the articles of impeachment against the late Secretary of War.

The Senate adopted the Conference report on the Army Bill. There are now left the Legislative, Sundry Civil, Diplomatic, West Point and River and Harbor Bills.

Brown, of Kansas, who has charge of the Platte vs. Goode report, will call it up Saturday. It is supposed that the argument will occupy three days.

The Judiciary Committee will report favorably on the bill placing assignees of awards of the Mexican Claims Commission in the same relation to the government as original owners. These claims, about seven millions, are now held at 30 to 35 cents, and no purchasers. Should the proposed bill pass, they will be worth sixty to seventy cents, because of the great savings, and insurance companies can then invest in them. Large amounts have been sold, contingent upon the passage of this bill.

Mid-Night Dispatches.

WEATHER, PROBABILITIES.

WASHINGTON, July 19.

For the South Atlantic and Gulf States, and Tennessee, very warm and partly cloudy weather, continued with local thunder storms, light winds, mostly from the East and South, and stationary or slight rise in barometer.

WASHINGTON.

Proceedings in Congress—The Defense Closed in the Impeachment Trial—Hayes and Wheeler Flag to Come Down—Think it Best to Let South Carolina Alone.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 19.—HOUSE.—The report of the Conference Committee on the bill declaring forfeited to the United States certain railroad bonds in Kansas, was agreed to, and goes to the President.

The Committee on Ways and Means reported a bill to amend the laws relating to internal revenue; made special order for the 22d of July.

Jones, of Kentucky, from the Committee on Railroads, reported a bill incorporating the United States Central Railway Company for the construction of a passenger and freight railway from Chicago through Indianapolis, Lexington, Kentucky, Asheville, N. C., and Spartanburg, S. C., to Charleston, Port Royal and Savannah, with another branch to St. Louis; referred to the Committee of the Whole.

The bill extending the duration of the Court of Alabama Claims, until the first of January, passed.

The House proceeded to the consideration of the South Carolina contested case, the unanimous report of the Committee being that neither the sitting member (Mackey) nor the contestant (Butts) is entitled to the seat.

The Conference on the Army Appropriation was agreed to and goes to the President.

The Texas frontier was resumed. The amendment to the first section, adopted in committee yesterday on the motion of Hancock, of Texas, providing that no part of the troops shall be taken from any State or service

where the public interest requires their continuance, was rejected by a party vote—yeas 79, nays 98. Without disposing of the bill, adjourned.

SENATE.—The Claims Committee reported adversely on a bill to pay North Carolina certain money for cotton seized; indefinitely postponed.

House resolution regarding the wreck of the Tegumseh in Mobile harbor was referred to the Judiciary Committee.

The impeachment was resumed, John S. Evans on the stand. His business was with Marsh; he did not know Belknap in the transaction.

The Conference report on the Sundry Appropriation Bill was agreed to.

In the impeachment, Maj. Gen'l. W. S. Hancock was sworn and testified that he knew nothing to the discredit of Gen. Belknap as Secretary of War prior to this charge. Mr. Carpenter announced that this closed the case for the defence. Mr. Manager McMahon stated that the managers had nothing to offer in rebuttal. Mr. Carpenter asked that some arrangement be made about serving up the case, and announced that the three counsel for the defence desired to be heard. Mr. Manager Lord suggested that the time for argument be limited. He said only two managers desired to be heard on the question of fact; but if there was an argument as to the effect of the two-thirds vote on the question of jurisdiction, a third manager desired to be heard. Mr. Carpenter said the counsel for the defence would argue all there was in the case, and he regarded that as one of the best points. Mr. Conkling submitted an order that three managers and three counsel may be heard in such order as they may arrange among themselves. Mr. Edmunds moved to amend so as to limit the time of argument to six hours for each side; rejected—yeas 16, nays 29. The order of Mr. Conkling was then agreed to. Adjourned.

The Judiciary Committee in the case of Congressman Hayes, from Alabama, report that while the evidence may not be sufficient to find that he willfully made a fraudulent certificate, it still excites grave suspicion and shows in a possible view a carelessness that should not be tolerated, but taking the testimony altogether, the committee recommended that no further action be taken in the matter.

The Secretary of the Treasury has advised the removal of the Hayes and Wheeler flag from the Custom House at Norfolk.

The clause repealing Federal supervision over registration and voting was stricken from the civil sundry appropriation bill by the Conference Committee in obedience to a caucus held last night.

Gov Chamberlain, of South Carolina, arrived here this morning and leaves for home to-night. He called upon Secretary Cameron and Attorney General Taft. The views of the officials are that South Carolina should execute her laws and bring the parties implicated in inciting the recent riot and murders to trial and punishment. Prompt action by the State authorities is regarded by them as absolutely necessary.

THE WEST.

Indians Intercepted and Driven Back.

CHICAGO, July 19.—Sheridan has received the following:

FORT LARAMIE, July 18.—A courier who has just arrived from Red Cloud, reports that on the 16th inst., Col Merritt intercepted the eight hundred Cheyennes and Sioux who had left the agency to join the hostile bands against Gens Crook and Terry, and drove them back to the agency. NEW YORK.

Large Sale of Dry Goods.

NEW YORK, July 19.—One of the largest sales of dry goods that ever took place, was begun to-day at Messrs Faulkner, Page & Co's. The goods were from many leading mills in the country, and consisted of flannels, blankets, chevots, dinims, &c. Some 18,000 packages were offered at an aggregate value of fully two million and a half dollars. The sales room was thronged with buyers from every house of standing throughout the country. The stock to be disposed of comprised four hundred and fifty styles of flannels of every color, width, style and quality, known to the market; 10,000 packages of blankets, robes, tweeds, ladies' sackings and similar goods, and is said to be the largest and most important ever offered at auction in this country. The prices obtained were about twenty per cent. below the regular market prices, and about 25 per cent. below the manufacturers' cost prices. They will be duplicated to-morrow. It is said by every dry goods commission house in the city that wool is now 10 cents a pound less than it was one year ago. The bulk of the purchases was made by the Western houses. The following are some of the sales: 873 yards of plain scarlet flannel, for 101 cents; 625 plain c. flannel, at 18 cents; 229 yards of 24 inch flannel, for 181 cents; 649 yards of No. 5 flannel, for 181 cents; 741 yards of b. flannel, for 201 cents;

653 yards of No 5 1/2 plain scarlet; for 20 cents; 754 yards of 24 inch No. 4 flannel, 21 1/2 cents; 553 yards of 1 No 1 plain scarlet flannel 24 cents; 7101 yards of 1/2 plain scarlet flannel, for 22 cents; 842 yards of 4 1/4 plain xx scarlet flannel 31 cents; 6,800 yards of plain x scarlet flannel, 29 cents; 761 yards of 1/2 plain orange flannel, xx, 201 cents.

Hon. John Manning and J G Rencher and T B Womack, Esq., are stump-ing Chatham county in the Convention question.

A J Loftin, of Lenoir, who was the Grant Elector in the Second Congressional District, in '72, has left the Republican party, in view of this campaign.

The Democrats of Lumberton raised a flag, last Monday, on a pole 140 feet high. There were several patriotic speeches and a great deal of enthusiasm.

Ike Young, the Radical candidate for Congress in the Fourth District, says: "The only thing the Radicals have to do during the campaign is to lie like a—"

Messenger: Goldsboro sends greeting to her sister cities and towns in North Carolina, and challenges any of them to show a more glorious fathering—in point of earnestness, patriotism and beauty—than that which assembled on the portico and in front of the Humphrey House, Saturday night, to hear the gallant defender of Civil Liberty, our standard bearer, Zebulon B Vance.

Vance, Busee and Scarborough, addressed a large crowd at Smithfield, Johnston county, last Saturday, and awaking a sweeping enthusiasm.—Thence Vance went to Goldsboro, and at night spoke to 400 people in front of the Humphrey House, which was illuminated from top to bottom. The correspondent of the Raleigh News speaks of the enthusiasm as unbounded.

The county canvass opened in Iredell last Thursday, with speeches at Mooresville by Messrs Sharp and Clegg, candidates for the House and for County Treasurer. The Landmark says that the burden of the canvass has thus far fallen upon Mr. Sharp. He confines his speeches to the constitutional amendments and is doing good service in that cause. He will be joined in the canvass to day by Col. Armfield and C L Summers. Sheriff Watts makes an eloquent speech at every meeting to the tax payers and in behalf of Honesty, Morality and Reform.

The New York Tribune, which supports Hayes and Wheeler, says: Republicanism in Louisiana is a sham, and worse than a sham. It has no claim upon the confidence of honest men, and deserves only defeat. The party is stronger without than with it. It will be well to have it understood that the support of the Republican Presidential ticket does not by any means include responsibility for or sympathy with the Pinchback-Packard alliance in Louisiana.
