

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

Noon Dispatches.

WASHINGTON.

Information Asked Concerning Hamburg—The Belknap Argument Opened—Prospect of Robeson's Impeachment—The Troops Matter in the House, &c.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 20.—SENATE.—Patterson introduced a resolution calling on the President for information regarding the Hamburg affair. Blair is arguing in behalf of Belknap. Committee on Banking and Currency has done nothing with the bill repealing the resumption act. The provisions for preparing the country for it are finding little prospect of action. Glover, Lewis and Oulbertson, of the Real Estate Pool Committee, have signed the report looking to the impeachment of Robeson.

HOUSE.—Banks' amendment was rejected, which according to the decision of the chair carries with it the second section, and the vote upon the adoption of the engrossed bill, simply providing that the President shall maintain two full regiments of cavalry on the border, with sufficient infantry for garrison duty, has been called. The vote is being interrupted by parliamentary questions. A motion to reconsider the vote by which the reading of the engrossed bill was ordered, was negatived, and the bill will pass with only the first section. Permission to follow marauders into Mexico, is refused. The bill has passed; it is simply the first section.

FOREIGN.

Bloody Advance of the Montenegrins—Amiability Between Turkey and Roumania, &c.

The Montenegrins are making bloody approaches to Meduri. The intelligence that the Servians lost their positions around Nisch, is confirmed. An amicable adjustment between Turkey and Roumania is considered assured.

The Khedive has presented the Porte with 25,000 Snider rifles.

LONDON, July 20.—The Post denies that Sir Charles Dilke is going to America with the Parliamentary excursionists.

Sir Percy Burrell, moderate conservative member of Parliament for Shoveham, is dead.

Burcharest, Minister of War, to-day withdrew the bill mobilizing the reserves.

ALEXANDRIA, July 20.—In consequence of the government's refusal to permit the execution of judgments against M. Hackmann, President of the Court of Summary Justice declared in open court to day that he would refuse to hear any action whatever, and that he now closes the court. Great excitement prevails.

LONDON, July 20.—The shooting for the Elcho shield began to-day at Wimbledon. The conditions are that the teams shall be composed of eight men who shall fire fifteen rounds each at 800, 900 and 1,000 yards, using any rifle they may select. The shooting at first range resulted: Scotch 504, England 480, Ireland 479.

FLASHES.

JEFFERSON CITY, MO., July 20.—John S Phelps has been nominated for Governor by the Democratic Convention.

CINCINNATI, July 20.—Hon George E Pugh, is dead.

MILWAUKEE, July 20.—Treasurer Albert Semler, of Washington county, is a defaulter for \$60,000.

DUBUQUE, July 20.—Sam'l Lawton shot his father fatally to-day.

ALBANY, July 20.—The steamer Baltic was burned to-day, four miles below here. The crew was saved.

TERRE HAUTE, IND., July 20.—The Greenback convention nominated O P Davis for Congress.

PORTSMOUTH, N. H., July 20.—The Buckingham Dime Savings Bank has closed.

CINCINNATI, July 20.—A train of cars with an Odd Fellows' excursion from New York, for Yellow Springs, collided with a board car, to-day, killing two employees. Others were bruised but not seriously.

MISSOURI.

A German Nominated on the Democratic Ticket—Shooting Tournament.

JEFFERSON CITY, July 20.—Henry Brockmeyer, a prominent German of St. Louis, has been nominated for Lieut. Governor.

St. Louis, July 20.—The shooting tournament, under the auspices of the St. Louis Gun Club, commenced yesterday. The first prize was for \$300, ten single rises twenty-one yards, shot for by twenty persons. The second prize was for \$250, ten single rises, twenty-six yards, thirty-four entries.

Mid-Night Dispatches.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES.

WASHINGTON, July 20.—For the South Atlantic States, very warm and partly cloudy, weather, continued southerly to westerly winds, stationary or slowly falling barometer, and possibly rain in the Northern portion.

WASHINGTON.

Congressional Proceedings, &c.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 20.—HOUSE.—The House Conference report on the Sundry Civil Appropriation Bill was adopted and goes to the President. The appropriation of \$7,000 for the Joint Chinese Commission passed. Phillips, of Kansas, made a conference report on the bill for the sale of the reservation of the Confederated Oloc and Missouri Indians in Kansas and Nebraska. Bland, of Missouri, opposed the report as part of a policy to transfer all the Indian tribes to the Indian Territory—a policy which he said was a blow aimed at the prosperity of St. Louis for the advantage of Chicago. The report was not agreed to—yeas 68, nays 84. The Committee on Patents reported back Senate bill to punish counterfeiting of trade marks; passed. Senate bill removing the political disabilities of Thos S Williams, of Maryland, passed. A resolution continuing the appropriations ten days longer, passed and goes to the President. Managers Lord and Blair concluded their argument; there are four more speeches. Adjourned.

The President has vetoed the bill amending the post office laws for the reason that a mistake in the title and enacting clause renders imperative its provisions in relation to straw bids. But for this the Post Master General says the bill would have been very valuable in breaking up the vicious system.

NEW YORK.

The Great Dry Goods Sale—Specie Shipments.

NEW YORK, July 20.—The trade sale of flannels and blankets, begun yesterday morning, was continued to-day. The large room was crowded. The following are some of the sales: Sixteen cases of printed figured scarlet r s and p, 1/2 wide, at 19 1/2; 14 cases of printed figured scarlet and blue n s and p, 20 1/2; 3 cases of twilled scarlet suiting, marked c p, 26 1/2; twilled high kind plaid, marked n s and s, 17 1/2; twilled brown suiting, 3 cases s and c, 18; 641 yards of blue suiting flannels, Raas & Co., 18 9 cases 24 inch plaid and white flannel, 14 1/2. All of these goods were taken as quickly as the auctioneer could call out the bidders. Five cases 1/2 wide plain white flannel S & S 16; fifty-nine cases of 1/2 plain white flannel No 39, 16 1/2; forty-six cases of same, No 3 diamond h at 17 1/2; 25 cases 1/2 wide white flannel, O M 17; 147 cases 1/2 wide extra plain white flannel J G were then put up and about 2 dozen sold at 18 1/2 cents, and price then 17 1/2, then to 17; 10 cases 1/2 a white flannel diamond h, at 20 cents; forty cases 1/2 No 3 white flannel W 21; 31 cases more 1/2 wide No 2 W 22 1/2, and 26 cases 1/2 No 1 S C M 22a 22 1/2, 44 cases 1/2 extra Saxony white flannel J G 24; 48 cases 1/2 No 1 white W M, 23; 20 cases 1/2 No 4 white flannel, G & Co at 24; 9 cases 1/2 Saxony white flannel, diamond H, 28; 72 cases 24 inch plain white flannels, S C M 16 1/2; 119 cases 1/2 No 2 white flannel marked S C M, 18 1/2; 22 cases 1/2 wide No 1 white flannel 18 1/2.

Specie shipments, to-day were even one hundred thousand dollars.

NEBRASKA.

A Courier Missing—Quiet at Fort Fetterman.

OMAHA, July 20.—A message was received this morning from the commanding officer at Fort Fetterman, which says a private courier has just arrived from the command in the field, who left on the night of the 17th. The day previous a courier was started with a mail and official matter, but has not yet arrived. All is quiet and well in camp.

THE WEST.

Report of Another Battle.

CHEYENNE, July 20.—Capt Egan with his company left Fort Laramie to hunt down thirty Indians seen twelve miles below that post. A man named Foy, at Sidney, from the Red Cloud Agency, reports that an Indian named Lamé Deer, came into the army Friday and reported that Crook has had a fight with the Indians, losing many.

FOREIGN.

Cable Interrupted—Suspension.

LONDON, July 20.—The cable between Rio Janeiro and Bahia is interrupted. J & G Harris, Australian merchants, who made arrangements with the creditors last year, agreeing to pay in full now announce their suspension. Liabilities \$130,000, assets estimated at \$100,000.

THE HEAT.

Range of the Thermometer in Different Places.

NEW YORK, July 20.—The following shows the thermometer at 1.30 p. m in the cities named: Buffalo, 90, Cincinnati, 96, New Orleans, 92, Baltimore, 98, Washington, 99, Albany 92, New York, 88, Philadelphia, 95, Boston, 93.

RICHMOND, July 20.—This has been next to the hottest day of the season, the thermometer ranging from 100 to 103 in the shade. Between five and six o'clock, a very heavy thunder, lightning and rain storm prevailed, accompanied by considerable fall of hail, the mercury falling twenty-three degrees in a half hour.

UTAH.

Alimony Granted to Ann Eliza Young

SALT LAKE CITY, July 20.—The case of Ann Eliza Young against Brigham Young, for divorce, was before Judge Shaffer to-day. The following rulings were made: That as Ann Eliza claimed to have been married to Brigham Young, which the defendant did not deny, but denied that she was the legal wife, that as the contest was as to the legality of the marriage, the court could properly grant an alimony. During the suit the motion for a personal attachment upon the defendant for contempt of court in not paying \$500 per month alimony was denied. This was an honest measure where milder means would be sufficient. The motion to strike out the amended answer of reference was overruled, and evidence in the main case was ordered to be taken before a commissioner.

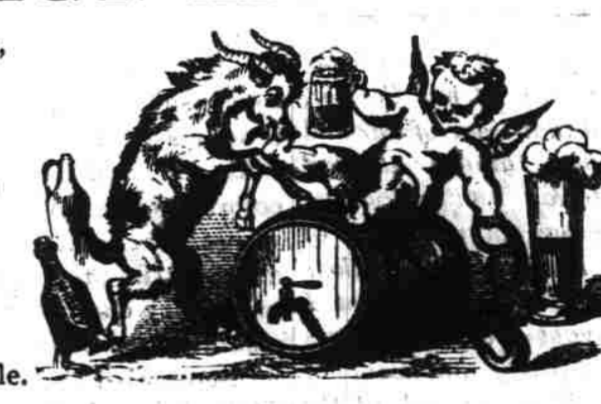
