### TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

#### Noon Dispatches.

##### FOREIGN.

**Gloomy Prospects for the Servians—They are Gaining Nothing—Hot at St. James for the Russian Minister—Turkish Defeats—Atrocities Continuing—Turkey not yet on the Offensive.**

Osman Pasha's camp is 25 miles from Weddin. The Servians remain on the Servian side of the Timok river. Cannon shots are occasionally exchanged. The Turks will probably not attack until a general advance is made along the line.

The irregulars attacked the Servian camp at Bregova, Saturday, and the fighting continues. The Turkish gunboats are between Weddin and Florentine, on the Danube. It is stated that nowhere are the Servians more than a march outside of their frontier. They have nowhere improved one step on their positions at the beginning of the month. The Servian prospects are gloomy; their victories are merely in the repulse of attacks, in other words avoidance of defeat. Not a foot of ground is being gained.

LONDON, July 24—It is stated that the Duke of Marlborough will succeed Duke Alenconi as Lord Lieutenant of Ireland.

It is said that Schovaloff, the Russian ambassador to Great Britain insists upon being recalled, as his position in London is intolerable.

The Reuter Telegram Company learns that Lord Derby and United States Minister Pierrepont have commenced negotiations for a new extradition treaty.

BERLIN, July 24.—An official dispatch says: "The Turks attacked on the 21st inst, the Servian redoubt at Little Servov, which commands the Turkish bank of the Drina and renders communication difficult between Belina and Great Zvodic. They were repulsed. The Turks were also routed on the 22nd, on Timok river near Royetniza."

PARIS, July 24.—The *Figaro* publishes a dispatch from Constantinople which says the atrocities in Bulgaria continue, and numerous Bashi Bazanks are arriving in that country from Asia.

The Sultan's health is unimproved. MANCHESTER, July 24.—The Guardian has a dispatch from Kalafalo, a walled town on the Danube, nearly opposite Weddin, dated Saturday, saying: "Have just returned from Isner. The Turks are unable to take the offensive until reinforced, but have a sufficient number of troops to hold their position and repulse Servian attacks. The Turkish losses for the past ten days are 300 killed and 550 wounded. The Servians have lost fully 2,500 men, with 5 cannon."

### WASHINGTON.

Proceedings in Congress and Committee.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 24.—The Senate proceeded with the impeachment trial at twelve o'clock, and manager Jencks spoke on the side of the prosecution.

The Banking and Currency Committee adjourned to to-morrow, when some conclusion will be reached if possible. The Legislative Appropriation Conference report good progress towards adjustment.

The House is full. The reading of every bill is demanded by the Republicans to prevent motions by individual members on the money question during the morning hours.

### NEW YORK.

Heavy Tornado—Damage to Property

NEW YORK, July 24.—Yesterday afternoon a tornado swept over Rockaway Beach, the like of which has not been known there for 30 years. Several steamboats lying at wharf were more or less damaged, and some of the restaurants were unroofed. No loss of life is reported.

### Mid-Night Dispatches.

#### WEATHER PROBABILITIES.

WASHINGTON, July 24. For the South Atlantic States, areas of rain, winds mostly from North and East, with slight rise in temperature and barometer during Tuesday.

### VIRGINIA.

Recruits for the West. FORTRESS MONROE, July 24.—Orders have been received by Gen Barry, to get in readiness one hundred recruits, which were attached to the artillery school for instructions in May last. They will be assigned to other batteries now under orders for the West.

### WASHINGTON.

#### Various Items—Indian News.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 24.—Blufford Wilson is here to testify before the Whiskey Committee. The Comptroller of Currency has declared a final dividend to creditors of the First National Bank of Washington, paying them in full. The President has signed the Silver and Army Appropriation bill; also the resolution removing Gen. Boeaugard's disabilities. Frost Thomas whose body was recovered from the Mohawk disaster, completes the list. He leaves a wife and two children.

### WYOMING, July 16th.

Gen. Sheridan, Chicago: I send in a courier to-day, to carry duplicates of my dispatches to Gen. Merritt, for fear the originals may not have reached their destination. I send a courier to Gen. Terry to-night, to inform him that I will co-operate with him and where to find me, also giving what information I have in regard to the Indians. My intention is to move out after the hostiles as soon as Merritt gets here with the fifth, and shall not probably send in any other courier, unless something special should occur requiring me to do so. I am getting anxious about Merritt's ability to reach me soon, as the grass is very dry, and the Indians are liable to burn it any day.

### CHICAGO, July 23.

To Gen. W. T. Sherman:

The following dispatch from Gen Crook is transmitted for your information: Gen Merritt will reach Gen Crook's camp on August 1st, with ten companies of cavalry, instead of eight as first contemplated. Gen Terry has moved his depot from North of Powder River, to Big Horn, on Rosebud, and has notified me of his intention to form a junction with Crook.

### FOREIGN.

A Banker Drowns Himself—Wheat Crops, &c.

LONDON, July 22.—A letter from Rome says a well known banker named Baldwin, drowned himself in the Tyber. Liabilities £450,000, assets £296,000.

The Emperor of Brazil has gone to Brussels.

Silver is very firm at 45 1/2.

The Mark Lane Express says the prospects for a good wheat crop now seem certain. Hay has been gathered in excellent condition, though not quite as plentiful as it would have been with a more favorable spring. Root crops are now suffering for rain. The French and German wheat crops are satisfactory, both in quantity and quality. The local trade exhibits a continued depression. Wheat has declined 1 shilling per quarter, and will probably go lower. Floating cargoes have shared the general depression and declined 1 shilling, but the number offering has been steadily reduced. The current low rates must check shipments.

### FOREIGN.

Extradition in the House of Lords, England.

In the House of Lords this afternoon Earl Granville called attention to the extradition question. He said the act of 1870 could have no effect on the '42. The only advantage to be derived from the Earl of Derby's cause, was the estimable enjoyment of the society of certain American citizens, until they are arrested for cheating, robbing or murdering. Some one here hoped the government would soon find an issue from the dead lock. He also advised remedial legislation.

### NEW YORK.

Burial of the Victims of the Mohawk Disaster—Shoemaker's Strike.

NEW YORK, July 24.—The funerals of Commodore and Mrs. Garner and Frost Thomas, victims of the Mohawk disaster, took place this afternoon from the Garner mansion at New Brighton, Staten Island. There was a large attendance of friends and members of yacht clubs present. The remains were interred in Greenwood Cemetery.

Two hundred employees of Banister & Sickenor, shoe manufacturers of Newark, struck against reduction of wages.

### FLASHES.

St. JOSEPH, Mo., July 24.—James Cross was boating with five girls on the lake near the city to-day; one girl reaching for water capsized the boat and all were drowned but Cross. They were Germans aged from 7 to 16.
