TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

Noon Dispatches.

FOREIGN.

Meeting of Cotton Manufacturers—Magazine Explosion—Austria Orders Mobilization—Illness of Cardinal Antonelli—Serbian Advancing—Turkish Spy Captured—Turkey to Issue Paper Currency—Montenegro Victory.

Representatives of 27 cotton firms met to-day at Lancashire, and resolved that owing to the depression of trade they would only work four days in a week.

The government powder magazine at Toulouse, exploded, causing great loss of life.

The Telegraph's Vienna dispatch says that all municipalities throughout Austria, have orders to prepare for mobilization of the army at a moment's notice.

Cardinal Antonelli's life has been endangered for some time from a complication of gout and rheumatism. He is now pronounced out of imminent danger.

The Servians with six cannon have crossed the Timok near Bogora. An engagement is expected to-day.

A disguised Turk was arrested at Gladora. He had several packages supposed to be intended to poison Servian wells. Considerable excitement prevails.

CRETE, GREECE, July 27.—In Roumania, which the Turks were convinced was not to be localized, they expect hostilities with Russia. The Turkish commander Atklek, has a three day's armistice. His offer to surrender with honors of war was refused, also that the retirement of the Montenegrins within their own territory seems confirmed.

The Times' Ragusa and Vienna correspondents conclude that the Montenegrins are withdrawing from Mostar in order to co-operate with the Servians.

The Telegraph's special says preparations are being made to mobilize the whole army.

The Telegraph's Vienna special says: "It is said that the Turkish Ambassador here has confidentially stated that the Porte declares, that some of the most important of the Roumanian's demands are inadmissible, and refuses to discuss the cession of the mouth of the Danube, as that question equally concerned the other powers."

LONDON, July 27.—A dispatch from Constantinople to the Reuter's Telegram Company, says: "It is stated that the government has decided to issue paper currency to the amount of three million Turkish pounds."

RAGUSA, July 27.—Intelligence received here from Solavon sources, announce that 15,000 Turks under Mehmet Hamdi Pasha, attacked the Montenegrins on Tuesday, near Podgoruitza. They were repulsed, and pursued to Podgoruitza. Both sides lost heavily in killed and wounded.

WASHINGTON.

Passage of the Washington Monument Bill in the House—Senate and House Adjourn Through Respect to Caperton.

WASHINGTON, July 27.—Immediately after the reading of the journal, on motion of Senator Bayard, the Senate as a mark of respect to the late Senator Caperton, adjourned until to-morrow at 11 o'clock.

Cox is sick. The Banking and Currency Committee did nothing. The House after passing the bill for the completion of the Washington Monument, with amendment, and adopting the resolution in eulogy of Senator Caperton, adjourned.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES.

WASHINGTON, July 27.
For the South Atlantic States, partly cloudy weather and light local rains, with easterly to southerly winds, stationary or light rise in temperature, falling barometer in the Northern portion of the South Atlantic States and undecided change in barometer.

WASHINGTON.

Military Movements—Trade Dollar Suspended—Faulkner to fill Caperton's Term—Wilson says Grant Stopped Just Before He Caught Babcock.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 27.—The two battalions of artillery, which have been ordered to report to General Pope, at the department of Misouori, will be composed of the following two companies: The 2nd Artillery, from Fort McKensie; one company—The 2nd Artillery, from Charleston, South Carolina, one company, and the 2nd Artillery, from Fort Macon, N. C., two companies. First Artillery, from Fort Adams, Rhode Island a company, 1st Artillery, from Fort Warren, Massachusetts, one company, 1st Artillery,

from Fort Trumbull, Connecticut.—Col Otis is ordered to join his Regiment, the 7th Cavalry.

The coinage of the trade dollar is suspended at all except the San Francisco Mint, where it is confined to actual demand for export.

It is thought that Representative Faulkner will fill Caperton's unexpired term.

The President will not allow the Sundry Civil Appropriation Bill to become a law without his signature.—This will occur simultaneously with the expiration of the extension of the present appropriations, and will postpone its economical features for a few days.

Bluford Wilson, ex-Solicitor of the Treasury, testified before the whiskey fraud committee to-day, to the effect that the President co-operated with Bristow, and him and in the whiskey prosecution, up to the time when Babcock's connection with the frauds became manifest, but then ceased to do so.

NEW YORK.

A Suit Against Uncle Sam—Vanderbilt's Death Looked for—Centenary Church Destroyed—The Turf.

NEW YORK, July 27.—In the suit of the St. Louis, Alton and Terre Haute Railroad Company, against Samuel J. Tilden, and others, for the order heretofore granted, extending the term for the defendants to answer, to the first Monday in October, has been modified by the consent of the counsel, to the first Monday in August. Longer time has not been deemed necessary.

Commodore Vanderbilt passed an exceedingly restless night. It is only too apparent this morning, that his condition was worse, than at any time during his protracted illness. About 9 o'clock this morning, his physician, Dr. Elliott, was summoned and he immediately responded to the call, taking with him two consulting physicians. The patient was found to be in a heavy stupor, and utterly unable to understand any questions put to him. The symptoms are deemed so unfavorable, that the death of the Railroad King may be looked for at any time.

NEWBERRY, N. Y., July 27.—The Second Church is being destroyed, in its centenary year.

SARATOGA, N. Y., July 27.—The weather and attendance was brilliant. In the mile and an eighth race, Missless won. Patience coming in second and Athlone third, 2:03. In the 1/2 mile race, Mattie A won, Yorkshire Lass, coming in second, and Radamantus third, 11.0. In the mile and five furlongs race, Invoice won, Martin coming in second, and Sandy third, 2:57. In the steeple chase, Osage won. Tumble coming in second, Doubtful third.

SOUTH CAROLINA.

A Negro Ravisher Lynched—Highway Robbery—Murder in Hamburg.

AUGUSTA, July 27.—Thursday, the 20th, a negro at Red Hill, Edgefield county, S. C., committed a rape on a little white girl, five years of age, daughter of Louis Prescott, inflicting fearful injuries. Last Tuesday evening a party of men took the negro into the woods and hung him.

Two negroes stopped Mr William Delphmet, of this city, on the highway, nine miles from Augusta, leveled their guns at him and made him give up his money and watch.

Last night the colored constable at Hamburg attempted to arrest two negroes charged with stealing. He caught one, when the other fired at him; the ball struck the prisoner, killing him instantly. The murderer escaped.

FOREIGN.

Valentine Baker Gone to the Turkish Army—The Eastern Situation.

LONDON, July 27.—The Echo as it is stated that ex-Colonel Valentine Baker, who was sentenced to one year's imprisonment, for improper behavior to a lady on a railway carriage, and who yesterday was released from Horsestonger Lane Jail at the expiration of his term, has accepted a commission, and leaves immediately for the Turkish army.

The Pall Mall Gazette, in a special from Berlin says: "The Emperor William, has earnestly impressed the Prince of Roumania, with the importance of maintaining peace with Turkey, and has demanded from Roumania, the observance of strict neutrality, and has complained that negotiations are transmitted to Serbia through Roumanian territory.

The Roman Catholics of Bosnia have subscribed a considerable amount of money for the Turkish war expenses.
