TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

Noon Dispatches.

FOREIGN

Anti-War Outbreak Apprehended in Serbia—Greece Neutral—Disaffection Among the Serbian Generals—Tactical Defeat Confirmed—Change in the Turkish Government—Serbian Position Growing Worse—The War Spirit in Russia—The Sultan Ill.

Prince Milan was to have left the front for Belgrade yesterday. An anti-war outbreak is apprehended in Serbia, and Milan's friends wish to place him within safe distance of the Hungarian frontier.

Placards of Retendu Karagorgonetch, declare the deposition of Milan as necessary, because of his treachery. Karagorgonetch offers to save the country.

The Greek embassy at Berlin state that Greece intends to maintain a strict neutrality, but that events may arise, requiring action.

The Serbian Generals, in a council of war, accused each other of incapacity.

The repulse of 15,000 Turks, while attempting to cross the Timok at Werschgaretz, has been confirmed. Seach, will send one of his own physicians to Belgrade, to attend the wounded. Many Odessa ladies have started for Serbia to superintend the hospitals.

The blockade of Dahomey was declared on July 1st. Vessels in port will be allowed to depart within thirty days.

VIENNA, July 28.—The Tag Flatt says, the change in the rule of Turkey is an accomplished fact.

Abdul Mamed Effendi, a younger brother of Murad Effendi, is regent of the empire.

LONDON, July 28.—The Financier today says: "Private advices from Middlesborough state that the arrangement of Thomas Vaughan & Co's affairs is progressing satisfactorily. The liabilities of the concern are to be provided for under the joint stock scheme, of about four million dollars."

PARIS, July 28.—The Journal Des Debates published a special dispatch from Semlin, dated yesterday, saying: "The general political position of Serbia is growing more serious, and the positions of Karagorgonetch, becomes threatening every day."

Sixty thousand Chassepot rifles sold by Germany, have arrived in Serbia by way of Roumania.

Prince Milan will return to Belgrade, and endeavor to bring about the mediation of the powers, between Serbia and the Porte.

The Times' Ragussa dispatch says: "The Montenegrin campaign is regarded as a failure. The loss, however, is only 300 killed. The troops are indignant at the fiasco, which is attributed to the incapacity of their commander."

It is stated at Paris, that General De Cissey, is about to marry Miss Billings, an American lady.

HALFAX, July 28.—Arch Bishop Connolly is dead.

LONDON, July 28.—A dispatch to the Times from Paris, reiterates that the object of ex-Queen Isabella's return to Spain, is to arrange for King Alfonso's marriage with Infanta Mercedes, a daughter of the Duke of Montpensier.

The ex-Queen leaves Paris to-day, with her entire family, and household, the Spanish ambassador, accompanying the party to San Juan De Lae.

The Pall Mall Gazette, in a Berlin dispatch, says: "The defeat of the Montenegrins, occasioned much discomfiture at the Russian court, where Prince Nicholas has been ostentatiously petted. Some of the Russian diplomatists assert, that it will be impossible for the Czar to repress the war spirit in Russia, if the Turks invade Serbia. A knowledge of this fact probably accounts for the hostilities of the Turks."

VIENNA, July 28.—The New Free Press asserts that the Sultan of Turkey is dangerously ill.

NEW YORK

The Shooting Cadet in Limbo—Counterfeit Convicted

New York, July 28.—J. L. Rothelin, a West Point cadet, who shot a hack driver a few days ago, was brought here this morning and committed for examination by United States Commissioner Osborn. Judge Benedict sentenced him.

Jno H Hill, was convicted for passing counterfeit money, and was sentenced for three years and six months. Charlotte Thompson was convicted for the same crime two years ago.

FLASHES.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 28.—The Treasury shipments to China, to-day, aggregated \$65,1905.

New York, July 28.—The Cornell University has organized for representation at the International Regatta.

DETROIT, July 28.—A fire in the basement of the Ford Block, Grand Rapids Company, burned the upper stories. Loss, \$50,000.

Edward Pariss, was arrested and is dead. His room mate, O. H. Thompson, a telegraph operator, is badly burned, and cannot live.

WASHINGTON

Private Bills—River and Harbor Bill Resumed—Platte vs Goode Before the House.

WASHINGTON, July 28.—The Senate during the morning hour, passed a number of bills of a private nature, and then took up the River and Harbor Bill.

The Banking and Currency Committee adjourned till Monday.

The New Orleans Committee closed all its evidence to-day, and will consider the report on Monday.

The committee investigating Representative Farman, of Florida, report the evidence without any resolution.

HOUSE—The navy report gave way for Platte vs Goode. Judge Harris is now speaking. The vote will be close, but the friends of Goode claim the result.

WASHINGTON, July 28.

NEW YORK

Hon Geo Wm Curtis not a Candidate for Governor—He Declares in Favor of Everts — Fire—Yacht Race.

New York, July 28.—The Hon Geo Wm Curtis emphatically declares that he is not and will not be a candidate for the gubernatorial nomination. He indicates his preference for Hon W M Everts, as the Republican nominee.

ALBANY, N. Y., July 28.—F K Dedericks & Co's Hay Press Manufactory, was destroyed by fire this morning. Loss, \$50,000.

SANDY HOOK, July 28.—The New York Yachts rounded Benton Reef in return run for the Bennett Cup, at 6:30 this morning in the following order:—Idler, 1st; Tidal Wave, 2nd; Wanderer, 3d; Countess, of Duffin, 4th, and America, 5th.

FOREIGN

Milan Holds a Council of War—A General Superceded—Concentrating for Battle, &c.

LONDON, July 28.—A dispatch to the Reuters Telegram Company, from Parakin, dated to-day, says: Prince Milan will hold a council of war, to-day, with General Tchetzeff, and other Generals, and M Bistice, Prime Minister. His headquarters will be transferred to the neighborhood of Alexinita.

General Leschyaniir will probably be superseded on account of his incapacity.

The forces under charge of Colonel Antech, are concentrating at Slenitz, where a decisive battle is expected.

The engagement on the Timok, yesterday, was unimportant. Fresh fighting is anticipated there to-morrow.

WASHINGTON

Goode Retained in His Seat—Cutter's Father not Pensioned—Debate on the Steamboat Bill.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 20.—Kimball is detailed as acting Chief Clerk, of the Treasury Department.

The Diplomatic Conference is unable to agree upon the nomination of H F Finley, as District Attorney, for Kentucky.

Cuthbert Jones, of Louisiana, is the Consul to Tripoli.

Lieutenant Charles Larned, of the 7th Cavalry has been appointed Professor of Drawing at West Point.

HOUSE—The discussion of the contested election case continued until 2 o'clock, when the vote was taken, on a resolution reported by the minority of the Committee, that Goode, the sitting member, was entitled to the seat. The resolution was adopted—yeas, 105; nays, 90. A second vote, as required by parliamentary law, on agreeing to the resolution as amended, that is, by the substitution of the minority resolution for it, was taken, and resulted as follows, yeas, 107; nays, 90. So Mr Goode retained his seat as Representative from the Second District of Virginia. Among the Democrats who voted "no," were Durand, Ely, Holman, Kehr, Newand, Wilshire. Several other Democrats voted "no" on the first vote.

SENATE—The bill pensioning Cutter's widow, father and mother was amended by striking father out, and was reported favorably. Calendar.

The Steamboat Bill was reported, a conference being unable to agree. It was moved that the Senate further insist on its amendments and agree to a further conference. A long debate ensued, the Republicans showing a determination to adhere to their position, in the course of which Mr Hamlin, of Maine, said that looking at the thing fairly it seemed to him that the time had

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arrived when the Senate should adhere to its amendments. There had already been three conferences on this bill, and the Senate had carefully considered it. As the bill came from the House, it was one of great injury to the commerce of the country. The consular part of the bill had been dealt with by men who knew nothing about it. They were like angels of destruction, scattering ruin around them. There had been a recklessness in the treatment of our consular affairs which challenged the attention of the Senate. Should this bill time after time go to a Conference Committee headed by two men who might be denominated the Titus Oats and Wm Bedloe of to-day? He did not see why the Senate should not adhere to its amendments, and let the enormity die the death of the unrighteous and thus let the House understand what the Senate would do when a bill which would become the dignity of our nation in foreign lands could be originated in the House and sent to the Senate. He would not make the motion to adhere now, but if the bill came back from another conference he gave notice that he would make it. Mr Edmunds, of Vermont, said he agreed with much said by the Senator from Maine. The distinct issue on this bill was whether the Senate of the United States should be compelled to change the laws of the United States as a price of having the money of the United States appropriated for any purpose at all. A further conference was agreed to.
