THE WEST.

Heavy Indian Fight Reported and Denied.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 29.—A special from Leavenworth, Kansas, says: A story comes from Sidney, Nebraska, a recruiting station on the Union Pacific Railroad, near Cheyenne, that the Sioux attacked Crook's camp, on Goose Creek, killing nearly three hundred and that the entire command was driven across the creek.

The story goes, that on Wednesday evening, A. T. Fray, a post sutler at Camp Sheridan, arrived at Sidney, stating that Lame Deer, a friendly chief, came into Camp Sheridan, thirty-six hours from the battle-field, as a courier, stating that Crook had more men killed than Custer had. Lame Deer says the Indians now have full sweep in the Northern country, and propose, after driving the miners from the Black Hills, sweeping the agencies, and attacking the railroad stations.

The reported attack it appears was made on Monday last. The report was regarded last night at Sheridan's headquarters, in Chicago, as preposterous. General Drum, Adjutant General says, had Lame Deer struck for Sidney from Crook's camp, he would have passed the Red Cloud and Spotted Tail Agencies.

CHEYENNE, July 29.—There is no authority for the report of General Crook's fight. Fray's report was made by him, at Sidney, two weeks ago, and contradicted from here by later dates.

FOREIGN.

Release of Serbian Prisoners—Serbians Commanded by Russian Officers—Fatal Duel—Prince Nikatos Outfanked.

Several prisoners captured by the Turks, say they were recently released from the Russian army. The Serbians are commanded by Russian officers.

The Serbians' plan of operations is changed. Prince Milan commands the Western army in person. The Serbians are marching in the valley of Moravia persistently.

Dr. Walker, nephew of the German Field Marshal, and Von Fisher, officer in the Empire Guards, fought a duel, and Von Fisher was mortally wounded.

It is stated that troubles have occurred at Belgrade, and that Bistich, Prime Minister, has gone to the front to entreat Prince Milan not to return to the capital.

The death of the Sultan is momentarily expected.

Monkatar Pasha outfanked Prince Mikatos and reached Bilek. Prince Nikatos' army is in a critical position.

LONDON, July 28.—Sanford has proposed a match between Preankness and New Holland, the winner of the Goodwood cup, yesterday.

FLASHES.

BELVIT, WISCONSIN, July 29.—John Thompson & Co's plow and wag on works were burned, to-day. Loss, \$60,000.

PHILADELPHIA, July 29.—Jno Keenan whipped James Callins in the grounds. Time, one hour and thirty minutes.—Both were badly punished.

HAVREHILL, MASS, July 29.—A tenement house, with Mrs Long in it, was burned to-day. Two other women jumped out at the windows.

ELIZABETH, N. J., July 29.—Elizabeth Shelton, colored, was committed to jail, for murdering her infant, by throwing it into a well. The child had four arms and three legs. The well had been constantly used. The child has been missing since September.

NEW YORK.

Result of the Yacht Race—300 Men off for the West.

NEW YORK, July 29.—Two of the yachts, belonging to the New York Yacht Club, which left for Sandy Hook, Thursday afternoon, in the race to and around Benton's Reef, and return, for the Bennett challenge cup, arrived at Sandy Hook this morning. Idler won the race, arriving at 5:25 this morning, Wanderer coming in next at 6:40.

Four companies of United States Troops, numbering 300 men for the Indian frontier, leave Jersey City to-morrow morning.

WASHINGTON.

The Officers of the House Form a Club.

WASHINGTON, July 29.—The officers and employees of the House, had a preliminary meeting last night to organize a Tilden and Hendricks Reform Club. A committee was appointed on permanent organization, to report on Monday.

Mid-Night Dispatches.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES

Washington, July 29.

For the South Atlantic States, heavy local rains, easterly to southerly winds, veering to westerly in the South Atlantic States, slight changes in temperature and stationary or falling barometer from North Carolina northward to New York.

WASHINGTON.

Recruits Ordered to the West—Fears of Money Giving Out on Account of Grant's Obstinacy—House Proceedings—Sheridan Recommends an Increase of Companies.

WASHINGTON, July 29.—One hundred and sixty-five recruits have been ordered to various commands in the far West.

If the President persists in withholding his signature from the sundry Civil Appropriation Bills, and Congress makes no provision, there will be no money for Tuesday's operations. All the departments have submitted lists of the employees they can spare with the least inconvenience. Nearly all complain that they will be crippled.

The Conference Committees made little progress to-day.

House.—Hill, of Georgia called up the bill passed by both Houses, extending the time for the redemption of lands sold for direct taxes, in order to have it amended so as to exclude the possibility of its being construed to affect National cemeteries. The bill, so amended, passed. The House proceeded to the discussion of the reports of the Committee on Naval Affairs, the Speaker pro tem holding that the matter pending at the previous adjournment took precedence of the business of the morning hour, which is the consideration of the bill to utilize the products of gold and silver mining. At the conclusion of a very long debate, the previous question was seconded and the matter went over to Monday, when a vote takes precedence of all other business. There is a night session for debate.

SENATE.—No session.

The Secretary of War has sent to the House a letter from General Sheridan, recommending an increase of the companies of the second, third, fourth fifth and seventh cavalry regiments, to a hundred men, as was done for two regiments on the Rio Grande. The number of men, required will be 2,500, and the additional expense \$1,684,700. Gen Sheridan says in his letter: "The events which have occurred to the troops, and my best knowledge of the strength of the Indians and affairs at the agencies, and in the field, will not warrant me at the present time in asking for volunteers. I have no objections to asking for them as soon as I conscientiously believe their services are necessary, but I do not, from the disaster which came to Custer, from a divided command, care to take the responsibility of asking for volunteers now. If Congress will increase the companies, as was done for the regiments on the Rio Grande, we can fill them up at once, and they will be sufficiently large to meet the wants of the service and relieve the public mind of the constant fear of disaster to our present insufficient force in the Indian country."

THE WEST.

Crazy Horse Alive and Kicking, and Coming into the Agency—He Wants to be "Friendly Indian"—Indian Views on the Proposed Change from Civil to Military Law.

OMAHA, July 29.—On official telegram from Fort Laramie says a courier has just arrived from Red Cloud Agency, and says Red Cloud told him that Crazy Horse was coming into the Agency in person and that his band was now on the way there. Twenty lodges had already arrived. Crazy Horse sent word to Capt Egan that he would see him, shake hands, make a treaty, and be friendly Indian. The Indians lately arrived will not talk about the fight, and pretend to know nothing about it. A council was held at Cheyenne Camp, and while the courier was coming he was detained there to talk over the change from the civil to the military authorities. Many expressed their satisfaction at the change. Fears are entertained that any attempt to deprive the Indians of their ponies and arms will meet with resistance. They can muster a large force and well armed, while the number of troops at the post is very small. It is thought they will not allow themselves to be disarmed without opposition.

ILLINOIS.

Wheat in the Elevators in Good Condition.

CHICAGO, July 29.—The committee appointed by the President of the Board of Trade, to investigate the condition of the wheat in the elevators, report it in good condition, with the exception of about a dozen bins, which contain warm wheat.

NEW YORK.

Fatal Stabbing—Idler Ahead in the Bennett Cup Race.

NEW YORK, July 29.—In the Bennett challenge cup race, Idler passed the quarantine station, bound in, at 5:20 A. M., the Wanderer coming next at 6:45 A. M. The Comptess of Dufferine is now, 9 A. M., outside the bar. Nothing has been heard of the America, or Tidal Wave.
