Noon Dispatches.

FOREIGN

Motion to Expel Jesuits From France

Paris, July 31.—A motion will be made in the Deputies to demand the execution of the unrepented statute of 1821, for the expulsion of the Jesuits. The judgment recently obtained by the Jesuits against the newspapers, will give an impetus to the movement. Twenty countries and ten Paris papers are implicated, and the expense of each will be seventy thousand francs.

London, July 31.—A Standard special from Kalaief says the Turkish army crossed the Serbian frontier at Missa on Saturday, and a great battle is expected. Great excitement prevails at the seat of war among the Christians on account of the proclamation by Devish Pasha, the Turkish commander in Bosnia, prohibiting quarter to Christians.

The Standard's Parastin dispatch says there is a distressing want of medical stores in the hospital and much needless suffering.

A Standard's Ragusa special says Selim Pasha has been killed.

A Standard's Berlin special says the Daily News's Belgrade special says Col Antich, Gen Zach's successor, is bombarding Senitz, which commands the passes between Bosnia on one side and Navis Bazar and the country from whence came supplies and reinforcements on the other. It is of vital importance to both combatants.

The News's Ragusa dispatch says Mautetar Pasha admits losing a thousand men in the fight with the Montenegrins.

The Times's special telegram says the Turks at Urbitz, after two hours' fighting, fled in an uncontrollable panic. A great part of the army was lost. Belak is surrounded. There is a panic at Trebinje. This disaster leaves Herzegovina practically defenceless.

London, July 31.—The Times this morning says the Right Hon and Most Rev Sam'l Butcher, D. D., P. C. Bishop of Meath, who has been suffering from congestion of the lungs and bronchitis, became delirious while his attendants were temporarily absent, Saturday morning, and upon returning they found the floor looked, and when it was burst open, the Bishop was found on the floor in a pool of blood with a razor beside him. A slip of paper on which was written the single word, "Mad," lay upon the table. The Bishop was speechless when found, and expired shortly afterwards.

WASHINGTON.

General Congressional and Committee Proceedings.

WASHINGTON, July 31.—The Senate passed the bill to authorize the increase of 2,500 men in the cavalry regiments, to operate against the hostile Sioux Indians.

Goode is absent from the Committee of Banking and Currency this morning. It is thought the new committee will propose a Commission to enquire into the whole subject and report next session.

The Senate Committee have entirely remodeled the River and Harbor Bill, bringing its expenditures within five millions. It will go to the Committee of Conference.

WASHINGTON, July 31.—Supervising Architect Potter has resigned, by the President's request. It is thought that Mullett will be restored to the place.

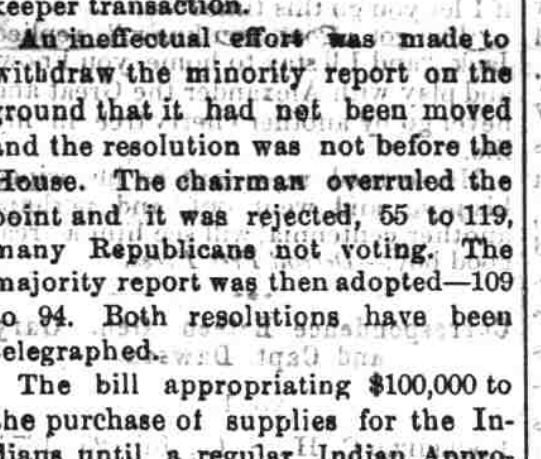
FLASHES.
