FOREIGN

More About the Turkish War and the European Conference.

LONDON, Aug. 1.—

The Standard this morning has a special dispatch from Widdin, stating that Hafiz Pacha entered Servia on the 20th of July, at Gramada. He encountered 4,000 Serbians, and after a four hours fight the Serbians fled, leaving many killed and wounded. Hafiz Pacha joins Ahmed Eyub Pacha at Derbent on the 20th, where he again attacked the Serbians. A great battle occurred which raged all day. Result not known. The Turks under Sultan Pacha entered Servia near Pandisala where they encountered eight Serbian battalions with 12 guns. After a sharp battle the Serbians fled, throwing away their guns. The Turks continue their advance. Sixty Russian officers are expected at Nissa to enter the Serbian army. The Standard's Berlin special states that Austria seems determined to annex Bosnia. Count Andrassy admits the necessity of the policy. Russia will object. It is believed that Russia has resolved to be unrepresented at Constantinople. The Standard's Constantinople telegram says the issue of paper money is to begin immediately. The measure is regarded with dismay. The Standard's Vienna dispatch says the abdication of the Sultan is imminent. It is expected that the Abdul Hamed will be proclaimed to day. The Times' Berlin despatch says it is stated from Slavonic sources that the Russian General Von Kauffmann, well known as conqueror of Khiva is going to the Serbian court. Ex-Marshal Bazaine, of the French army directs the Turks at Severitz. PARIS, Aug. 1.—The Aix Neuvenna Seicle, the organ of the left centre, says it is able to state that the European Congress upon the Eastern question has been decided upon, and it will shortly meet at Brussels. COSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 1.—Official dispatches state that the Turks have assumed the offensive. They have captured the Serbian entrenchments at Derbent and penetrated into Servia and are now advancing upon Gurgusa Eratz. They have also assumed the offensive in the direction of Widdin. Official dispatches received here from Podgaritz announce that the Montenegrins have been defeated in the neighborhood of Anterari. Four hundred Bulgarians who were imprisoned at Philippoli have been released.

WASHINGTON.

Senate Agrees to Military Academy Appropriation Bill—House in Senate Chamber Awaiting Verdict—Belknap Acquitted on First and Second Articles for Want of Jurisdiction—Not Two-Thirds Vote in the Affirmative.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 1.—The Senate agreed to the report of the Conference Committee on the Military Academy Appropriation Bill, and it now goes to the President for signature. The House Bill on coin, silver dollars, and to make them legal tender for argument came up in order. Every disposition is to talk it over till morning hour, when it must give way. Commons—nothing of importance—most of the members in the Senate Chamber awaiting the verdict. The Senate at 12 o'clock to-day proceeded to vote upon the articles of impeachment against W W Belknap, late Secretary of War, in accordance with the order adopted yesterday. Mr Belknap was not present to-day, but was represented by Mr Carpenter of counsel. Upon the first article of impeachment 35 Senators voted guilty and 25 not guilty, for want of jurisdiction. Those who voted guilty were Bayard, Booth, Cameron of Pennsylvania, Cockrell, Cooper, Davis, Davies, Dennis, Edmunds, Gordon, Hamilton, Harvey, Hitchcock, Kelly, Kernan, Key, McCreery, McDonald, Merrimon, Mitchell, Morrill, Norwood, Oglesby, Randolph, Ransom, Robertson, Sergeant, Saulsbury, Sherman, Stevenson, Thurman, Wadleigh. Those voting not guilty were Allison, Anthony, Boutwell, Bruce, Cameron of Wisconsin, Christiancy, Conkling, Conover, Crogin, Dorsey, Eaton, Terry, Frelinghuysen, Hamlin, Howe, Ingalls, Jones, Logan, McMillan, Paddock, Patterson, Spencer, West, Windom, and Wright. Mr Jones of Florida, declined to vote on the ground that the Senate had no jurisdiction. The presiding officer announced that two-thirds of the Senate have not voted guilty, therefore the respondent was acquitted on the first charge in the first article. Nearly all those voting not guilty made brief statements that they did so through want of jurisdiction. His acquittal on charges is certain. The Senate then proceeded to vote upon second article, when 38 Senators voted guilty, 25 not guilty. Mr Maxey, who did not vote upon second article. Those Senators who voted not guilty reported their reason for doing so being for want of jurisdiction as stated upon the first roll call.

Mid-Night Dispatches.

WASHINGTON.

Belknap Formally Acquitted, &c.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1.—In answer to a Senate resolution asking information regarding the Hamburg riot, the President transmits a letter from Goy Chamberlain, to him and the answer thereto, and the report of the Attorney General, of South Carolina. In his letter of transmittal the President says: "These enclosures embrace all the information in my possession touching the late disgraceful and brutal slaughter of unoffending men at Hamburg. My letter to Gov Chamberlain contains all the comments that I wish to make on the subject. An allusion is made in that letter to the condition of other States, and particularly to Louisiana and Mississippi. I have added to the enclosures letters and testimony in regard to the lawless condition of a portion of the people of the latter State. In regard to the Louisiana affairs, murders and massacres of innocent men for opinion's sake, or on account of color, have been of too frequent occurrence, to require recapitulation to testimony. All are familiar with the horrible details, the only wonder being that so many of them apologize for them. But recently a committee of the Senate of the United States visited the State of Mississippi to take testimony on the subject of frauds and violence in elections. The report has not yet been made public, but I await its forthcoming with a feeling of confidence that it will fully sustain all I have stated relating to fraud and violence in the State of Mississippi."

SENATE.—The Chair laid before the Senate a message from the President concerning the Hamburg affairs. Ordered to be printed. The Chair appointed West and Cockrell commissioners on the part of the Senate to consider the re-organization of the army. Impeachment resumed. Belknap not present. He was represented by Carpenter. Those who voted guilty were Messrs Bayard, Booth, Cameron, of Pennsylvania, Cockrell, Cooper, Davis, Dawes, Dennis, Edmunds, Harvey, Hitchcock, Kelly, Kernan, Key, Marcy, McCreery, McDonald, Merrimon, Mitchell, Morrill, Morton, Norwood, Oglesby, Randolph, Ransom, Robertson, Sargent, Saulsbury, Sherman, Stevenson, Thurman, Wadleigh, Wallace, Whyte and Withers, 37. Those who voted not guilty were Messrs Allison, Anthony, Boutwell, Bruce, Cameron, of Wisconsin, Christiancy, Conkling, Conover, Craig, Dorsey, Eaton, Ferry, Frelinghuysen, Hamlin, Howe, Ingalls, Jones, of Nevada, Logan, McLellan, Paddock, Patterson, Spencer, West, Windom, and Wright, 25. As each vote on each article was announced the presiding officer, Mr Ferry stated that two-thirds of the Senate not having voted to sustain the article, the respondent was acquitted on that charge, and after the announcement of last vote he directed, that a judgement of acquittal be entered in accordance with the 22nd rule for the government impeachment trials. Adjourned sine die.

Legislation was resumed. A Bill for the sale of the Osage Ceded Lands, passed. The River and Harbor Bill was taken up. Considerable progress was made, but before reaching Southern terms, the death of Jas Y Parsons of Kentucky, was announced. The political disabilities of Resben Davis, of Mississippi, were removed. Adjourned.

HOUSE.—The Coining Silver Bill was filibustered over the morning hour. Glover of the Real Estate Pool made a report with resolution referring the evidence of the judiciary against Robeson to the Judiciary Committee, with power to take additional testimony and report.

(Signed) Glover, Lewis, and Culbertson. The report was adopted.

The Election Committee reported in five contests declaring setting members Hyman, of North Carolina, Lynch, of Mississippi, Morton, of New York, Freeman, of Pennsylvania, duly elected and entitled to seats. Adopted. A resolution was received from District Committee directing the clerk to certify to the Attorney General and grand jury against members of District ring with a view of criminal prosecution, adopted. Eulogies upon the late J Y Parsons, of Kentucky, and Lawrence of Ohio. Adjourned.

The President issued a proclamation declaring Colorado admitted as a State into the Union.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Aug. 1.—Jacob Nijmewacker, convicted of frauds on revenue, whom the President recently pardoned, was released from prison to-day on paying his fine of \$10,000 and the costs of three trials.
