TELEGRAPHIC NEWS
Noon Dispatches.
FOREIGN.
Russia Wants to Interfere—France Waiting—Failure of Charles & Co.—Turks Repulse.
PARIS, Aug. 4.—The La Presse publishes under reserve, as not yet confirmed, a statement that France has been advised by Russia to take part with the other powers, in the efforts at mediation; and replied, that it would be better first, that the powers "understand what are to be the points of intervention." Russia, evidently, wishes for immediate intervention in Turkey.
LONDON, August 4.—A heavy gale prevailed on the coast of Scotland and Northern England, yesterday. Several casualties are reported with some loss of life. Messrs. Charlton & Coy. of Stratton Iron Works, Liverpool, have had suspended with liabilities reported at \$9,000. Their assets, subject to realization, are said to be worth much.

WASHINGTON.
House Voting to Table the Silver and Harbor Bill—Committee Report on Resumption Act—In Favor of Repealing It.
WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 4.—In the Senate, a concurrent resolution to adjourn on Monday, was referred to the Committee on Appropriations. In the House, the River and Harbor Bill as it passed the Senate yesterday, was reported. A motion to concur failed. A motion to refer to Conference Committee prevailed. The House is now voting to lay the bill on the table which will not prevail, and the bill will go to Conference. The Committee on the Legislative Appropriation Bill met last night, and met again to-day, with a prospect of agreement. The new Conference on Diplomatic Appropriation, have had no meeting yet.—The Committee of Banking and Currency, met this morning, and by a vote of 6 to 4, instructed the chairman to report a bill to the House, repealing the Resumption act.

FLASHES.
WILKESBARRE, Pa., August 4.—Thos. Coningham, a business man of first family, forged \$200,000, and has fled.
Boston, August 4.—A fire in Granite block, 280 to 286, Devonshire street, this morning, damaged the building and stock of Geo. Frost & Co., to the amount of \$130,000. Fully insured.
DETROIT, Mich., Aug. 4.—The Republican Committee nominated C. A. Craswell for Governor, and Alva Sessions, for Lieut. Governor.
PARIS, Aug. 4.—M. Wolonski, member French Senate, is believed to be dangerously ill.
NEW YORK, Aug. 4.—The Injunction retaining the Brooklyn Bridge Company from completing bridge over East river was refused.

WASHINGTON.
The Alabama Awards—Congressional Matters—The Indians.
WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 4.—The payment of the awards in the Alabama Claims Commission, made since January first, will commence on the sixteenth. Two millions of bonds for this purpose will be put on market on the 11th.
The cabinet meeting was full, except Morrill, who is indisposed.
Hoes—The Postal Route bill, as amended by the Senate, Postal committee, to provide for a renewal of the fast mails.
Ex-Astorian Gen. Williams, was before the whiskey fraud committee and denies that his wife wrote any anonymous letters.
Nominations. Almon M. Clapp was appointed Public Printer. A vote on Banking and Currency, for a bill repealing resumption act associating with it, the resolution, known as Gibson's, for a Commission to report at the next session, ayes, Cox, Hayne, Gibson, Hammond, and Birchard; nays, Wicks, Townsend, Kasson and James, absent, Hubball.
General Sherman, has following:

NEW YORK.
Murder and Suicide—War News—The Porte Orders Enlistment of Volunteers to Fight Against Servia to Cease—News from Crook.
BUFFALO, Aug. 4.—John Klingman, aged 42, put his wife's throat, and then his own. Family trouble is the cause. He leaves 13 children.
NEW YORK, Aug. 4.—The Herald has the following cable dispatch.
LONDON, Aug. 3.—Special correspondence of the Herald at Vienna, telegraphs under date of August 3rd, that the foreign ambassadors have at last interfered, and intend to protest against the present conduct of the campaign in Servia. The dispatch states that several ambassadors have given warning to the sublime Porte that unless the present system of entering volunteers as Crusaders against Christians is stopped, European military interventions is inevitable. As a consequence of this warning the Sublime Porte has ordered that no more volunteers be enlisted against the Servians.
The Tribune has the following:
CAMP ON THE YELLOW STONE MT., WY., VIA HELENA, MT., Aug. 4.—"The report that prisoners were taken during Crook's fight, on the little Big Horn, and afterward murdered, is untrue. The men with Crook all fell fighting gallantly to the last. The command moves to-day, toward the Rosebud valley, which is practicable for wagons. We will give up this stream. Communication has been opened with Gen. Crook. Trails are reported, leading from the Little Big Horn, toward Rosebud."
Commanders Vanderbilt, who suffered relapse yesterday afternoon, and since then has been gradually sinking, was reported to be still alive, at 9 o'clock this morning.

FOREIGN.
Information for Cotton Men.
LIVERPOOL, Aug. 4.—Cotton Bankers Association: Cotton has been active throughout the week. Business on Saturday and Monday was unusually extensive. Quotations generally have been about 1/8 higher. American has been very active with prices mostly 1/8 higher. The better grades being 1-1/8 higher for Sea Island. The demand has been moderate with full rates in futures of our business, and prices have been about 1/8 higher.
CENTRAL AMERICA.
Another Religious War Imminent.
PANAMA, Aug. 4.—Three hundred Conservative Catholics attacked government forces in the city of Palmyra. "Live Religion"—"Down with Government" was the battle cry. After two hours fighting they were repulsed. Ten killed; no prisoners. Several cities are in a state of siege. Conservatives of Tellina and Antioquia reported in league with those of Cana. Crisis imminent.
