FOREIGN.

The Turkish War.

London, Aug. 7 .- A dispatch from Widden to the Standard says that the news of the capture of Gurgusoratz by Erjah Pacha's army, which continues its march Northward, caused Osman Pacha to defer his attack on Sartichar

where he awaits Erjah's arrival. The main Servian army has proba bly retired and Sartchar is only held by a guard.

Erjah should join Osman Pacha in two days and their united forces wil then march on Paratchar. Osman Pacha's soldiers are impatient of delay Little more fighting is anticipated. The Servians never face the Turkish troops. The latter are now moving. I expect to hear soon that Servia has sued for peace. The war is virtually finished. At Nissa the entire Turkish army is in the field, excepting the forces at Sophia, and in Bosnia and Albava. They number 92,000 men with 50 squadron of cavalry.

A special dispatch says: "The cap ture of Gurgusovatz was a splendid victory. Both sides fought well. The population fled to Baratchin with three wounded which have been taken.

The Daily Telegram to the Vienna Telegram says: Monkhata Pacha is in a desperate situation at Trebije, and is expected to surrender. The Widdin army is operating against the Servian General Leschjanin.

PARIS, Aug. 7 .- A correspondent of the Times announces that the people are surprised that England and France have not sent military attaches to watch officially the Eastern war. Ow ing to the absence of official informa. tion it has been possible to fabricate telegrams for financial operations.

Congressional Proceedings.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 7 .- Bout well's Mississippi Committee made their report in view of the condition of affairs which they represent exists in Mississippi. They suggest in conclusion three remedies. First, laws may be passed by Congress for the protection of the rights of citizens in the jority in the Legislature. repective States. Second, States in anarchy or wherein the affairs are controlled by bodies of armed men should be denied representation in Congress. Third, The constitutional guarantee of a Republican form of government to every State will require the United States if these disorders increase, or even continue-and all milder measures shall prove ineffectual to remand the States to a territorial condition through a system of public education and kindred means of improvement, change the ideas of the inhabitants and reconstruct the government upon a Republican basis.


