

The Servians Unfortunate Russia Excited ..

London, Aug. 8. - A dispatch to Reuters Telegram Company from Constantinople says. Private telegrams from Widden dated yesterday, announce that in consequence of the capture of Gurgosoratz the Servian General Nischjanin had abandoned Saitschar and marched to join General Tchnernayeff The Turks occupied Baitschar unopposed.

A collision occurred last night on Somerset & Dorset Railway near Radstock, between a London train and an empty excursion train. Twelve persons were killed and thirty injured.

BUCHAREST, Aug. 8.-In the chamber of deputies to-day, the Prime Minister explained foreign policy of the new cabinet; he stated that its policy would be one of strict neutrality, maintaing, however public security and vigilantly guarding national frontiers.

London, Aug. 8 .- The Gazette's Berlin dispatch has the following: "The National Zeitung says Servia despairing of a successful issue of war has requested other powers to mediate in favor of peace. The Servians' attempt to raise war loan in Russia has proved to be a failure.

The Standards Vienna dispatch asserts that the Servians met the Turks at Gurgusoratz. As the Turkish troops march into the interior the villages are deserted by the inhabitants. The Servians lost 3,000 men at Gurgusoratz. Reinforcements were sent them by Tchernayeff, consisting of 4 battalions of Militia and three of volunteers, but arrived too late for the battle and were cut to pieces, 2,000 men being killed Accounts agree that the Russian government is making the utmost exertions to spread a feverish feeling among Russians in behalf of Servia. Russian troops in Bessarabia are constantly receiving reinforcements. A large purchase of arms has been made for Servia in Berlin for which Rou-

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 8 .- A Bismarck dispatch says steamer Carrall from Terry's camp with the wounded and sick was attacked by the Indians. A running fight of two hours and a half took place. One soldier was wounded. Wagons for the West with provisions for Terry's camp overloaded-left the wheat on bank and returning for it, found that the Indians had destroyed it. Col. Moore with three companies of armed Indians bantered to come out to fight. A few shots from a small cannon scattered the Indians, when threee scouts who went to reconnoitre were cut off. Moore refused succor. The captain of the boat called for volunteers, and with eight soldiers rescued them. Neither Crook nor Terry are comfortably situa ated. The Bulgarian Massacre-Great Excitement in the House of Commons. LONDON, Aug 8 -An animated debate in the House of Commons on

Bulgarian atrocities.....

says: "Once more massacres in Bulgaria have occupied the attention of the House of Commons. In a few days the members will have separated: but for this we might expect a series of debates, in comparison with which that of last night would be gentle and subdued in tone, for there can be little doubt that we are on the verge of revelations surpassing anything the imagination of civilized man could have conceived. The barbarities of Tartar conquerors, the wild and ceaseless destruction of human life which the modern students of history have been disposed to look upon as fabulous, find a parallel in the deeds perpetrated within the last few weeks at a few day's journey from our shores. In our own age we must turn to Ashantee or Dahomey for anything similar to the ghastly spectacle now presented by a Turkish province, according to the testimony of which there can be no reasonable doubt that the helpless inhabitants of the District about Parter Bazardik and Philippali. men, women and children, have been slaughtered by thousands, and their towns and villages utterly destroyed. It seems likely that those whom huthane incredulity has led to suppose that the accounts were exaggerated, will have to abandon that supposition. The testimony of witnesses and the admissions of a member of the British embassy charged with investigation of these massacres, give reason to beleive that there has been nothing less than a general massacre of the population, against which the Turkish government let loose its bands. Furthermore there is the strongest evidence that these atrocities have not been the work wholly or even principally, of Caucassian settlers, but of Turkish irregular troops, commanded by duly appointed officers, sent into the country expressly to strike terror in the

population. What passed last night in the House of Commons shows the astonishment and horror these deeds have aroused. Mr George Anderson, a liberal member from Glasgow, introduced the subject, and one member after another rose to express his indignation and to protest against the attitude of indifference on the part of the British government and against the tone of apology which has been detected in official
