TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

Noon Dispatches.

FOREIGN.

Death of the Earls of Suffolk—Turko Servian War—Turks Advancing—Servian Prospects More Gloomy.
LONDON, August 15.—The Earls of Suffolk and Berkshire, is dead. Aged 42 years.

MADRID, August 15.—Despite statements to the contrary, the ministerial crisis exists. The return of Queen Isabella, bodes no good to the removal of members of the cabinet, who took part in the revelation against her.

LONDON, August 15.—The steamer Menesey, from Mary Point, for Antwerp, is wrecked at St. Devils' Head. The captain and fourteen of the crew were drowned.

VIENNA, August 15.—The Porte's Crown jewels, of Servia, have been sent here as security for a loan of 62,000 florins.

PARIS, August 15.—It is stated that the Balloon containing M. Fregnet and his sons, was torn by trees and fell rapidly. One of his sons was killed and Fregnet was fatally injured.

LONDON, August 15.—A dispatch to the Standard, from Belgrade, says: It is reported that the Turks have advanced beyond Bonja, and that the Servians evacuated that important pass, without firing a shot. It is quite possible the constant rumors of Turkish advances and Servian retreats are exaggerated, but it cannot be denied, that the prospect of the Servians is becoming more gloomy. Rumors of their evacuation of the defiles leading from Gugasoratz to Deligrade, and from Saitchar to Parakin, though unconfirmed is highly probable. If the Turks push forward, it is more than likely that the expected great battle at Alexinantz or Deligrade, will never be fought. Officials continue to assure the public of their ability to beat the Turks; nevertheless consternation prevails and must increase, as the number of runaways increases in the streets.

To-day, owing to the Anniversary of the feast of assumption, it is observed as a holiday, at Paris and Antwerp. Consequently, no markets are held at these cities to-day.

Parliament was prorogued at two o'clock, this afternoon, by Royal Commission.

WASHINGTON.

Senate and House Discussing Bill to Allow the President to Call for Volunteers for Indian War.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 15.—The House passed a bill authorizing the President to raise five thousand volunteers for the Indian war, and appropriated a million dollars for the expenses.

The Senate at an early hour this morning rejected a substitute for the House's amendment to the Constitution, relating to schools—28 to 16. Not two-thirds. Adjourned at two o'clock. Both Houses meet at noon.

The situation of the school amendment is as follows: Blaine's amendment was passed by the House, and was amended in the Senate by a majority vote, and the question being on the proposition as amended, it was rejected for want of a constitutional two-thirds vote. The original resolution falls with the amendment to the Constitution, and is rejected. The Monday night's session of the House continued till six o'clock this morning. Most of the time after midnight being taken up in debating, motions and manuevering, to prevent Cox from resuming his speech, in reply to Kasson. At last, about 5 o'clock in the morning a truce was effected between the opposition forces, and an opportunity was afforded to both Cox and Kasson, to make due apology to the House and each other, for the exhibition of any angry passion, or the violation of any parliamentary decorum that either might have been guilty of. Hewitt, of New York, then took the floor, and in a speech which was rapturously applauded by his side of the House, defended Gov. Tilden from the assaults made on him by Kasson; and eulogized him as the standard bearer of the national Democracy.

The House non-concurred in the Senate amendment to the bill authorizing the President to raise five thousand volunteers. In the Senate an amendment was proposed to raise the cavalry companies to the standard of 100 men. It was shown by the chairman of the Military Committee, that the recent army appropriations bill, gives the President this power, and that the five thousand volunteers was really an addition to the proposition of the Senate that the conference asked.

SOUTH CAROLINA.

Democratic State Convention.
COLUMBIA, S. C., Aug. 15.—The State Democratic Convention, to nominate candidates met at 8 o'clock, this evening. Delegates are arriving on every train, and are enthusiastic for straight out Democratic nominations. Wade Hampton will probably be nominated for Governor.

CALIFORNIA

Favoring the Passage of the Hawaiian Treaty Bill.

SAN FRANCISCO, August 13.—The news of the passage by the Senate of the bill to carry the Hawaiian treaty into effect, was received in change with much satisfaction. Several disengaged vessels in port, will at once be chartered for Honolulu, on account of local refiners.

FLASHES.

CINCINNATI, O., August 15.—The Situation along the track of the Ohio and Mississippi Railroad, is unchanged. No freight trains are allowed to pass. The employees at Flora Illinois, on the Western Division, struck yesterday.

NEW BRUNSWICK, N. J., Aug. 15.—The New Jersey rubber factory is burned. It employed 350 hands. Loss \$300,000.

Mid-Night Dispatches.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 15.

For the South Atlantic and East Gulf States, falling, followed by rising barometer, variable winds, mostly from South to West and shifting to northerly, in North Carolina nearly stationary temperature, partly cloudy weather and rain areas will prevail.

WASHINGTON.

Numerous Bills Passed—Senate and House Adjourn Sine Die.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 15.—The August statistical return of the department of agriculture show an improvement in the cotton crop during July, bringing its general condition nearly up to a full average, usually there is a decline from the July figures. South Carolina, Georgia, Alabama, Texas, Arkansas and Tennessee show an improvement, especially Tennessee, and Louisiana maintains her July average. North Carolina, Florida and Mississippi have declined in some eastern counties, and along the Mississippi river, local drought or excessive rains have injured the plants; the caterpillar has also appeared at numerous points, but it had done but little damage at the date of the returns. Anticipation of serious ravages in August were expressed, but planters were preparing to resist them. The average condition of the cotton States was as follows: North Carolina 96, South Carolina 97, Georgia 104, Florida 89, Alabama 108, Mississippi 92, Louisiana 89, Texas 106, Arkansas 98, Tennessee 120.

The President arrived at the Capitol at noon.

All appropriation bills are signed. The Postal Committee by a party vote agreed to postpone the consideration of the fast mails and franking privileges.

Nominations: John Meredith Reed, the Charge De Affairs to Greece, Benjamin Morgan to Portugal, Horace Rubble to Switzerland, John C Caldwell to Paraguay.

The Senate confirmed all the above, also A M Clapp to be public printer.

SENATE.—A large number of pensions have passed. On motion of Logan, the Senate insisted on its amendments, a clause to reinforce the army for the Indian war. Conference appointed. A bill to promote telegraphic communication between America and Asia, passed. Spencer, Windom and Whyte, were appointed on the commission to frame a permanent government for the District of Columbia. The political disabilities of Jas Argyle Smith of Mississippi, were removed.

A resolution appointing a commission to inquire into the changes of gold and silver passed. A bill for the relief of Mrs James K Polk, passed. A large number of private bills passed.

The report of the Conference Committee on the bill to reinforce the army for the Indian war, was adopted. A resolution to adjourn sine die at half past seven, was adopted. Recess to 7 o'clock.

FOREIGN.

The Turko Servian War—The Montenegrins Defeat—The Turks in a Pitched Battle.

LONDON, August 15.—A dispatch to the Reuters Telegram company, from Zara, the Capital city of Dalmates, announced that an engagement took place yesterday, between the Montenegrins and the Turks near Kuci, lasting the entire day. The Turks were repulsed, and pressed from Fundina to Podgoritz. The Montenegrins captured a quantity of arms, war material and several flags. The Turks lost many, in killed and wounded.
