Noon Dispatches.

FOREIGN.

Turke-Servian War News-Some Hopes of Mediation-Turks Defeated.

LONDON, August 16.-The war party at Belgrade are gaining strength on account of recruits from Russia and other points, and the prevailing impression is that one great power at least will adhere to Servia's fortune. The Turks are delaying operations to give opportunity for peace propositions, but they will have to win another battle. The Czar has telegraphed that he will stand Godfather by proxy, for the young Prince. The Montenegrins defeated the Turks at Kuci. A special dispatch to the "Daily Telegraph," reports that the English Consuls at Belgrade and Constantinople, have been directed to inform the Servians and Turks respectively, that if they will consent to the mediation of the powers, England is willing to assist.

PARIS, Aug. 16.-It is stated that General Beothant, will shortly be appointed minister of war vice General DeCassey.

LONDON, Aug. 16.-The Pall Mall Gazette publishes a despatch from Berlin, which says: Mediation by the powers on the Basis of re-establishment of Statues quo Ante Bellum, is considered as imminent. It is reported that the Czar is anxious for a speedy termination of the war, and has personally besought the Emperors of Austria and Germany, to offer their good offices to the belligerents, for the purpose of securing peace. News received here from Constantinople, contradicts the reports that separate negotiations have been entered into with Montenegro.

A despatch to the Daily Telegraph from Constantinople, says that Turks are inclined to issue a decree for the deposition of Prince Milan, and nominate a successor. England has protested against this course, through her ambassador.

Belgrade, Aug. 16.-The Turks have reached Jablanitz. The Servian Colonel Antitch, is gathering strength to demand the surrender of Krucevatz, from which place the roads lead to Krugerzevatz. The fall of this place would open the Morava Valley to the South of General Theodoroff's position, which would thus be turned.

LONDON, Aug. 16.-A despatch from Belgrade to the Daily Telegraph says: Madam Merks who established a hospital at Shabatza, a town in Servia, forty-four miles west of Belgrade has been arrested for expressing republican opinions to wounded Servians. She was taken to Belgrade, with a view to her expulsion from Servian Territory.

The Times has an Athens despatch which says that in consequence of Portes refusal to grant the demands of Cretan assembly, great excitement prevails, and a rising has been imminent. The Cretan's sought the advice of Greece, and the latter urged them to appeal to the great powers and await the result, which they will probably do.

A despatch to the Reuters Telegram Co. from Semla says: The report is untrue, that Lord Lytton contemplates resigning the Governor Generalship of India next year.

WASHINGTON.

Fight With Indians-Terry's Loss 300-Indian Loss 700.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 16.-A Bismarck special says: A party arrived from the Black Hills, they had skirmish with the Indians, losing one killed, and one wounded. Nothing has been heard of Terry's fight, except what Capt. Weston from Benton heard. Terry fought the day before he left, losing 300 killed; Indian loss, 700 killed. The President leaves for Long Beach on Friday or Saturday.

FLASHES.

WESTPORT N. Y. Aug. 16.-A Fire here last night, destroyed all the business portion of the town. Loss \$75,000. The work of an incendiary.

EDINBURGH, Aug. 16.-The Statue of Dr. Livingstone the African explorer, was unveiled here yesterday.

COLUMBIA, S. C. Aug. 16.-W. W. Harlie was elected permanent president of the State Democratic Convention last night. In the Secret Session to-day there is no action as yet. Tilden and Hendrick's ratification meeting to-night.

WASHINGTON.

Recruits for the Army-Speaker Kerr No Better-President's Letter to Gen Sheridan.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 16.-Sixty recruits have been ordered to the Fourth and Ninety-Ninth, and eighty to the Fourteenth infantry, to rendezvous at Cheyenne.

The Star says Mr. Gorham, the Secretary of the Senate, was yesterday removed. R. G. Blaine, is the petition clerk of the Senate. Mr. Blaine is a brother of the ex-Speaker and now one of the Senators from Maine. Mr. Gorham was an active member of the Conkling combination at Cincinnati, and is understood to be personally hostile to Senator Blaine. Senator Gorham was notified by Mr. Blaine, that he would accept his resignation, but gave him permission to have it take effect on the 1st of December next.

Speaker Kerr's son telegraphs from Rock Alum Springs this evening; Father's condition is unchanged since yesterday, our hope is weakening, all of it is in the timely arrival of Dr. Pope, and his power to give him instant relief, otherwise my father's time is short. He is wonderfully calm and resigned. Speaking only of his death in its effects upon those he loves.

WAR DEPARTMENT.

WASHINGTON, D. C. Aug. 16, 1876.

To General W. T. Sherman commanding the United States Army.

Sir: The House of Representatives of the United States on the 10th inst. passed the following preamble and resolution, viz: (Here follows as part of the order, the preamble and resolution.) The President directs, that in accordance with the spirit of the above, you are to hold all the available force under your command, not engaged in subduing the savages on the Western frontier, in readiness to be used upon the call or requisition of the proper legal authorities for the protection of all citizens, without distinction of race, color, or political opinion, in the exercise of the right to vote, as guaranteed by the fifteenth amendment, and to assist in the enforcement of certain and effectual punishment upon all persons who shall attempt by force, fraud, terror, intimidation or otherwise, to prevent the free exercise of the right of suffrage, as provided by the laws of the United States; and have such force so distributed and stationed as to be able to render prompt assistance in the enforcement of the law. Such additional orders as may be necessary to carry out the purpose of these instructions, will be given you from time to time after consultation with the law offices of the government.

FOREIGN.

LONDON, Aug. 16.-A despatch to the Times from Belgrade says: While war preparations continue active, and while even the peace party consider any fate preferable to the deposition of Prince Milan, and the annexation of any part of Servia to Turkey, or even a period of Turkish rule here, at the same time a depression of spirits, and a desire for peace among the moderate party and Servian people, generally make intervention of the powers to be anxiously looked for, in the hope that it would bring peace without any of the above conditions, which it is feared the Turks desire to impose. Rather than accept of those, the moderate party will support the government to continue the struggle, until Servia conquers or cannot fight longer. They say the deposition of Prince Milan, would occasion a dynastic civil war, which would retard the progress of the country twenty years. As for Turkish rule here, the foremost men of Servia and even the opponents of the war, say it is better that all the Servians perish in this struggle, than submit to that. If the intervention of the powers does not bring peace, no agreements between the belligerents themselves is likely to be made.

SOUTH CAROLINA.

Wade Hampton Nominated for Governor.

COLUMBIA, S. C., Aug. 16.-The State Democratic Convention in secret session all day, decided to nominate the State ticket. Doors were opened at 6 p. m., and Wade Hampton unanimously nominated for Governor. The Convention adjourned until to-morrow. An immense and enthusiastic torch-light procession ratification of Tilden and Hendricks, is now passing.

ILLINOIS.

Crook Expected to Engage the Indians

CHICAGO, Aug. 16.-Assistant Adjutant General Drum, has just received a dispatch from Fort Brown, Wyoming Territory, stating that a Shoshone Indian just came in who had left Gen. Cook on the 10th inst. well down on the Tongue river, said he thought Gen. Crook would strike the Indians the 11th or 12th.

FLASHES.

BOSTON, Aug. 16.-A heavy hail storm prevailed in some parts of Maine, yesterday. Two inches of hail fell, and the crops were badly damaged.

MEMPHIS, TENN., Aug. 16.-On Sunday and Monday last, Tallahatchie county

Mississippi, was visited by a terrible rain storm, destroying crops along the creeks and bottoms, and sweeping away levees and bridges. Many farmers lost their entire crops. The damage is estimated at \$50,000.

BOSTON, Aug. 16.-In the kettle room of the Merrimac print works at Lowell the lime kettle exploded with great force, going through the roof and throwing the timber in all directions. Only four persons were in the room, and all but Thos Campbell, escaped injury. Campbell was badly scalded. The explosion causes a temporary suspension of the print works.

CINCINNATI, Aug. 16.-The Republicans of the Sixth Ohio District, nominated Charles Foster for Congress. The greenbackers of the Fifth Indiana District, nominated Mr. Huges, of Dearborn county, for Congress.
