Noon Dispatches.

FOREIGN.

Duel in Belgium—Turkish Defeat Confirmed—Financial Crisis in Portugal.

PARIS, Aug 19.—A sabre duel took place in Belgium between Perdy and Chardora, well known communist refugees. One received six gashes, and the other eight. Both fainted from loss of blood. They accused each other of robbing the commune.

LONDON, Aug 19.—The Turkish defeat of Birsanski, on the 8th is confirmed. The Turkish loss was 1,100. It is reported that Gen Tchermayeff has issued an order to shoot all Circassians and Bazanks without parley, when captured.

LISBON, Aug 19.—In consequence of the financial crisis there was a general run upon all the banks here yesterday, and they were compelled to close their doors. Several will suspend payment. The bank of Portugal has closed. All suspending banks have assets in excess of liabilities sufficient to prevent embarrassment. It is sadly due to the scarcity of silver coin, supplies of which are expected from London, and it is thought that on its arrival, the crisis will terminate. It is expected that an official decree will be published to-morrow for a delay of two months for the payment of commercial bills.

LONDON, Aug 19.—The Scotch rifle team to compete in the centennial rifle matches, embarked at Liverpool today on the Cunard Line Steamer, Bothnia. William G. Guier's steamer, Idaho sailed from Liverpool on Wednesday, 16th inst., for New York, has on board the Thomas Professionals who are to participate in the International regatta at Philadelphia.

PARIS, Aug 19.—Fresh prosecution has been commenced against Droit L. Homme's newspaper, for publishing articles insulting the Chamber of Deputies.

BERYENTH, Aug 19.—Five hundred persons present at a banquet last night given in honor of Herr Wagner. After making a speech, which was loudly applauded, Herr Wagner was crowned with a silver and laurel wreath.

BERGRADE, Aug 19.—A dispatch from Gen Tchermayeff to Prince Milan, reports that his army is perfectly reorganized, and ready to reassume the defensive.

An extraordinary cabinet council was held yesterday. Prince Milan presiding, at which it was resolved to continue the war to the last extremity. The Prince of Montenegro understanding that the Turks intended to invade Montenegro from Albania, has left his brother-in-law, Vukorich in command of the troops in Herzegovina, and has marched with eight battalions into Montenegro, whence he will invade Albania, where the Catholics promise him support.

ANTWERP, Aug 10.—Monday 21, and Tuesday the 22 being holidays, no market will be opened at this place.

OREGON.

A Letter from Sitting Bull.

ST. PAUL, Aug 19.—Sitting Bull on July 27th, replied to Maj. Mitchell at Fort Peck as follows: "Tell him I am coming before long to his post to trade. Tell him I did not commence the war. I am getting so old that I did not want to fight, but the whites rush on me and I am compelled to defend myself. But for the soldiers stationed on Rosebud, I with my people would have been there before; that if I was assured of the protection of the great father, I would go to Fort Peck for the purpose of making peace. I and other chiefs want the Black Hills abandoned, and we will make peace. Medicine Cloud estimates the hostile Indians at from 8,000 to 10,000 fighting men.—They are living entirely on meat which they had to get away to the close proximity of the whites. The hostile camp is now on Tongue river, South of the Yellow Stone."

WASHINGTON.

Washington Items.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 19.—The President left Washington to-day, for Long Branch. Several members of the Cabinet also absent. Capt. Bancroft Sherard, of the United States Navy has been suspended for two years, for punishing seamen contrary to law. Pay Inspector Spalding, who was on duty at San Francisco, when his clerk Pinney absconded with government funds, has been dismissed from service. Pay Inspector James N. Carpenter of the Navy, having been found guilty of neglect of duty, is suspended from rank and duty for five years.

NEW YORK.

Mr Van Nortwick asks Some Impertinent Questions of Gov Hayes, in Regard to the Canvass.

NEW YORK, Aug 19.—Mr Van Nortwick, a member of the New Jersey Senate, on behalf of an order from the O A U has addressed a long letter to Gov Hayes, respecting the seventh plank of the Cincinnati platform respecting public schools and asks, was the seventh plank inserted to beguile the O A U and similar organizations into the support of certain party nominees, or is it only a delusion, a snare, a lie? were the men who so uproariously greeted its reading in convention only so many cliques hired to get up a cheap demonstration; and says the men of this organization have an interest in understanding whether the seventh plank of the Cincinnati platform means business, or otherwise. If on the other hand it means that the school question is a live issue in the present canvass, then they expect that the word will be passed to make fight along the whole line. Until that word is given and the movement begins in earnest, they will necessarily feel that they have no part or lot in the matter.

TEXAS.

Daring Robbery of a Bank in Dallas.

CINCINNATI, Aug 19.—A special to the Enquirer dated St. Louis the 18th, says a Dallas, Texas special says that about 1 o'clock to-day two robbers entered the office of the State Saving Bank, on Main street, jumped over the counter and commenced an attack on E H Gruber, President of the Bank. After falling him to the floor by a blow on the head with a navy revolver, they helped themselves to what money they could find. When the alarm was raised they ran into an alley where their horses were hitched and rode off. Mr. Gruber states the loss will not exceed \$200. He has offered a reward of \$500, and the citizens have increased the amount to \$1500 for the capture of the robbers.

FOREIGN.

Financial Crisis Ended.

LONDON, Aug 19.—Private advices from Lisbon announce that King Alfonso issued a decree for the suspension of all engagements for 2 months, consequently the financial crisis is over. This arrangement gives embarrassed banking institutions to determine the best cause to adopt. Liquidation, however, seems unavoidable in many cases.

MASSACHUSETTS.

Heavy Failure—Attempt to Throw a Train From the Track.

BOSTON, Aug 19.—The failure of Hon Josiah Quincy is announced. Liabilities \$50,000; assets said to be \$220,000. An unsuccessful attempt was made last night, to throw the express train, on the Fitchburg road, from the track by placing ties on the rails.


