### TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

#### Neon Dispatches.

#### FOREIGN

**Turkish War News—Bark From Wilmington N. C. Abandoned.**  
PARIS, Aug. 22.—In the elections of President of the Council, the general result was 5 Constitutionalists, 41 Monarchists and 38 Republicans. The Republicans gained 7 seats.

LONDON, Aug. 23.—A Bucharest correspondent of the Daily News says, that Mr Baring's report of sixty villages burned, and twelve thousand persons killed by the Turks in Bulgaria does not include the outrages committed in the district North of the Balkans, nor in the Sofia District. Forty villages were burned North of the Balkans.

not completed his investigation, but estimates the killed at sixty thousand in Philippopolis district alone. The regular troops are more cruel than the Bashi Bazanks. There is no doubt that the massacres are committed with the sanction of the authorities. Outrages continue. The Governor of Philippopolis wants cavalry to quell the Mussulman. Mr Schuyler thinks that there is immediate danger of additional massacres; and will suggest to his government the following measures: The hanging of the Truobadort in these atrocities, the disarming of the Mussulmans, and the rebuilding of the burned villages at the government expense.

As these measures cannot be left to the authorities, Mr Schuyler will propose to the foreign commission to see that they are executed.

The brig Sussex, from Wilmington, N. C., for Queenstown, was abandoned in latitude 95, longitude 38; she was totally dismantled and water-logged. Part of the crew were taken off by a vessel bound to New York. The Captain and the remainder of the crew, landed at Queenstown.

LONDON, Aug. 23.—A dispatch to the Daily Telegraph from Vienna says: The Porte is ready, thanks to efforts of the friendly powers, to essentially modify the condition of peace negotiations. Its demands is limited to the war indemnity, and guarantees against breaches of peace by Servia.

#### NEW YORK

**Cornell Declines to Run—Meeting of the Republican State Convention.**  
SARATOGA, Aug. 23.—Cornell having written a letter withdrawing from the candidacy, his friends generally are expected to support Morgan, and secure the latter nomination for Governor. Pomroy will most probably be chosen for the second place. Everts supporters however, do not yet concede his defeat.

The Republican State Convention met in the Town hall at 11 o'clock. Much interest is manifested in the proceedings, and the attendance is large. Hon A B Cornell, Chairman of State Committee, called the meeting to order at 11:30 A. M. McGuire of Heakimer, nominated Wanner Miller of Heakimer, temporary chairman. Mr. Miller on taking the chair said: "The Convention assembled here, had marked omens of success; seldom has any national ticket been received with such universal favor, as that put in the field at Cincinnati. He rapidly sketched the public career of Rutherford B Hayes, whose name was received with enthusiastic applause, as was that of Win A Wheeler, which the speaker said would rally to the support of the ticket, not only every Republican, but all honest and patriotic liberals and independents throughout the State."

#### PENNSYLVANIA

**Railroad Accident.**  
PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 23.—The officers of the Philadelphia, Wilmington & Baltimore Railroad, make the following statement regarding the reported accident and loss of life on their road this morning: "The report of the loss of life is wholly untrue. A freight train going South last night broke an axle below Slowmen's Run, and lamp set fire to a car, and several cars were burned. No one was hurt, except one employe, and he but slightly."

#### CALIFORNIA

**Grange Meeting.**  
SAN FRANCISCO, August 23.—The Grangers Convention to devise means to break up the so-called "Grain Ring," last evening, passed resolutions, to sell no wheat in this market for less than one dollar and a half cents per bushel, and made arrangements for the shipping of grain on their own account.

#### NEW JERSEY

**Methodist Conference.**  
CAPE MAY, Aug. 23.—The Conference of delegates elected by the Methodist Episcopal Church North and South, to effect a reunion of those bodies, has been in session here for several days, and yesterday reached a satisfactory understanding, and agreed on a basis of union which will be made public in a day or two.

### ALABAMA

**Nomination of Garth—Caterpillars Damaging the Crops.**  
MONTGOMERY, Aug. 23.—The Democrats of the eighth district, have nominated Calver Garth, of Madison county for Congress.

The third and most destructive crop of caterpillars have made their appearance in great numbers throughout this section, and the farmers are apprehensive of the almost total destruction of the cotton crop, through the prairie belt. Efforts are being extensively made to stop their ravages by the use of poison, but many are discouraged and think all efforts vain. The next ten days, if the late continuous rains continue, will decide the fate of the crop.

### ILLINOIS

**Battle With the Indians—Coal Dealers Leave for Saratoga Conference.**  
CHICAGO, Aug. 23.—A dispatch received at the military headquarters here says, an Indian who arrived at the Stang Rock agency on Missouri river yesterday, reports a severe fight took place 10 or 12 days since between the troops and Indians, at a point North of the Black Hills. Losses on both sides very heavy, but troops had possession of the field. The Indians broke into bands and dispersed over the country. The troops are in pursuit.

All the principal coal dealers of this city have gone to Niagara Falls to take part in the Conference there tomorrow, for the purpose of compromising if possible the existing difficulties and preventing threatened serious break in prices.

THE New York Express, in the following language, gives Judge Settle a rap which he justly merits:

Mosby, of Virginia, the famed Confederate guerrilla, proposes to be as good a Hayes and Wheeler man as he has been a Grant man. We are not sorry that either he, or Longstreet, or Settle, of North Carolina, have cast their lines upon that side of the ship. Like Holden and others, they did their full share in bringing on the civil war, and are only consistent in the party which proposes to keep it up.

### WASHINGTON

**All the Mints Throughout the Country in Operation Coining the Small Change—Northern and Southern Methodists.**  
WASHINGTON, D C, Aug. 23.—Wm A Knapp, of Ohio, to day was appointed chief clerk of the Post Office Department. The President has appointed Jno Tyler, Jr., U S Attorney for the Southern District of Florida; W B Redmond, U S Marshal for the Southern District of Mississippi.

All the mints are running to their fullest capacity, and it is expected that they will average two and a half millions of dollars in small silver coin per month, which in twelve months more will complete the fifty millions of subsidiary coins authorized by the existing laws. Three hundred thousand trade dollars per month is being coined at San Francisco, to meet the demand for export to China. In order to increase the silver coinage at the Philadelphia mint, probably metals for nickel and bronze coinage be procured from private manufacturing establishments in the form of planchets, ready for stamping.

A special to the Star from Cape May says, that the delegates elected by the Methodist Church North and South, to arrange for the re-union of those large bodies of Christians, have been in session several days here, have substantially agreed on a basis which will be made public in a day or two.

### LIBERAL INDEPENDENTS REJECT OVERTURES OF COCHRANE AND DECLARE FOR TILDEN AND HENDRICKS—EX-GOVERNOR MORGAN NOMINATED BY REPUBLICANS—APPOINTMENTS.

SARATOGA, Aug. 23.—The Liberal Independents representing in part, 18 counties in the State, who refused to accept the invitation of, Cochrane Liberal Republicans to unite with them in support of Hayes and Wheeler, and enter the Republican State Convention, had a conference to-day at which they endorsed Tilden and Hendricks and adjourned.

After the appointment of a committee to confer with the Liberal Republicans, nominations were made for Governor, Ex-Gov E D Morgan, Wm M Everts, Wm H Robertson and Martin J Saunsend, were placed in nomination. Ex-Gov Morgan was nominated on the first ballot.

### FOREIGN

**More About Turkish War—Turks Repulsed—Excitement over Elections in England.**  
CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 23.—It is positively stated in official quarters that Turkey hitherto has made no proposals to any of the Foreign representatives here concerning a basis for peace negotiations.

LONDON, Aug. 23.—A dispatch to Reuters' Telegram Company dated Belgrade, noon, says Gen Tcheusyeff on Tuesday sustained repeated attacks of the united forces of Croub Raeha and Kerim who were endeavoring to take Alexentz. Turks to the number of 50,000 were repulsed in all directions. Battle was recommenced early Wednesday morning and up to present moment Servians maintain their positions.

A close contest is expected at the election in Bucking, Hampshire, to fill vacancy caused by the elevation of Mr Disraeli to the Peerage between Mr Fromankle, a Conservative and Hon Rupert Carington who has just issued an address to Liberals.
