## TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

**Noon Dispatches.**  
**FOREIGN.**  
**Turko-Servian War—Fresh Revolts Severe Turkish Defeat! 15,000 Killed, Wounded and Captured.**  
LONDON, Aug. 26.—The Standard's correspondent at Rome telegraphs that a dispatch received from Athens, Aug. 24th, announces that a revolt has broken out in Argyropolis, and that armed bands are forming in Albania, Thessaly, and Epirus.  
The Courier de France has a dispatch from Vienna to the same effect, and adds that the Mussulman Albanians having pillaged the suburbs of Janina, the Russian Consul demanded justice of the Governor, who refused. The Consul and Rich Greeks organized a force of volunteers and a combat took place at Preveza, between the Greeks and Turks.  
A special dispatch to the Daily News from Belgrade, says: Gen Tchernayeff has telegraphed to Prince Milan that the Servians won a great victory on Thursday. Gen Hovatarovich has abandoned the pursuit of the Turks at Treababa, and attacked the rear of the Turkish right wing. Tchernayeff, at the same time attacked the Turks in front. The Turks were routed with a loss, according to Tchernayeff's dispatch, of 15,000 killed, wounded and prisoners. Thirty-one Russian officers were killed in this battle.

FERRIS, COLO., Aug. 26.—The Republican State Convention nominated Jno L Rault for Governor.  
WASHINGTON, Aug. 26.—Col Wm Hemphill Jones resigned as deputy of the First Comptrolership at the request of the President and the position has been tendered to Judge Tarbell, of Mississippi.  
SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 26.—The Grenada has arrived from Panama.  
CLEVELAND, O., Aug. 26.—The Democrats of the 10th District nominated Hon Rufus P Ranney for Congress.  
NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 16.—On motion of Asst Atty General Dibble, the suit on the official bond of ex-Auditor Clinton, for \$22,900, money received and not accounted for, and \$13,000 illegally disbursed, was discontinued. The suit was instituted by the late Attorney General Field.

## Mid-Night Dispatches.

**WEATHER PROBABILITIES.**  
WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 26.  
For the South Atlantic and East Gulf States, higher barometer, cooler, northerly to easterly winds, and partly cloudy weather will prevail, with probably occasional coast rains.

## NEW YORK.

**Serious Accident to a Ship at Sea—Recruits for the Indian War.**  
NEW YORK, Aug. 26.—The Pacific Mail Steamship Colon, which sailed from here on the 20th for Aspinwall, returned to-day in a disabled condition. After being two days out a terrific explosion took place. There was a great rush of steam which completely enveloped the vessel and caused tremendous excitement among the passengers. After some time it was discovered that one of the boilers had burst and that only two men had been killed, John Bunting, assistant engineer, and Jas Ferrill as oiler. Several passengers were burned by the explosion. The vessel hoisted signals of distress which were observed by a tug boat which immediately steamed to the disabled vessel and towed her back to this city.  
One hundred recruits to join the army of Generals Crook and Terry leave here to-morrow for Cheyenne.

## FOREIGN.

**Peace Negotiations, &c.**  
CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 26.—Preliminary negotiations for peace opened last night between the foreign ambassadors in consequence of steps taken by Prince Milan.  
VIENNA, Aug. 26.—It is asserted here that as the preliminary peace negotiations between the signatures of the treaty of Paris, including Russia, it was proposed as a basis of arrangement, that Prince Milan should renounce the throne of Servia and pay the war indemnity, and that Turkey should have the right to place the garrison in the Servian fortresses on the Turkish frontier.

## GEORGIA.

**Destructive Fire in Savannah.**  
SAVANNAH, Aug. 26.—A fire last night, destroyed Kelly's block, four six story buildings, Stoddart's upper range, three five story buildings, Kelly's shed and wharf, main mast, sails, rigging and upper works of schooner H P Simmons, and twenty-five bales of cotton. Loss \$200,000.
