Noon Dispatches.

FOREIGN.

Turko-Servian War—Russian Officers Continue to Arrive—The Servians Claiming Victories That Never Were—Turkish Success.

LONDON, Aug. 28.—The Standard's Belgrade dispatch says: While Prince Milan is trying to negotiate peace, Russian officers continue to arrive, Tohranayeff, by repeated attacks upon the Turkish lines is doing his best to render the negotiations abortive.

A Reuter telegram from Belgrade, reports that the discontent among the people against the negotiations, is becoming more intense.

A dispatch from Vienna reports that the Porte demands that Prince Milan shall address the propositions for peace directly to the Turkish government. The Servian victories on Thursday are confirmed, but Alexinatz is still threatened on three sides.

Mr. Wilson, Conservative, was elected to parliament for Donegal, to fill a vacancy.

The Standard's correspondent with the Turkish army, telegraphs under date of Nissa, Sunday afternoon, as follows: Yesterday and to-day's severe fighting were everywhere driven back, and their losses must be very great.

This is later than any intelligence from Servian sources, which claim the victory on Thursday.

NEW JERSEY.

Destructive Fire.

ELIZABETH, Aug. 28.—Last night Pier No. 6, Central Railroad docks, city, was destroyed by fire. 75 loaded coal cars were on the dock, and were all destroyed. 350 tons of coal was burned or thrown into the water; two canal boats were also burned. The loss is between \$40,000 and \$50,000.

PATHWIDE, Aug. 28.—The Molly McGuire prisoners, Munley, McGehan, Carol, Rossity and Boyle, recently convicted of the murder of policeman Yost, at Tamaqua, were sentenced to death this morning.

RAYMOND, KAN., Aug. 28.—A keg of powder exploded in a Republican meeting, killing two.

NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—The co-operative counsel reported to the Board of Aldermen that their body had no power to pass ordinance requiring parties selling goods by sample in this city to pay license, and if such law existed it could not be constitutionally enforced.

SAVANNAH, GA., Aug. 28.—Jacob Friest, a well known merchant, was found dead this morning. The cause was an overdose of laudanum.

MILFORD, PA., Aug. 28.—An extensive incendiary fire is raging in the mountains on the Pennsylvania side of the Delaware river.

PORT JERVIS, N. Y., Aug. 28.—There are forest fires in the Northeastern portion of this town. A ship has been destroyed and several dwellings. A large number of men are fighting the fire without avail.

Mid-Night Dispatches.

OHIO.

United States District Court Judge Refuses to Interfere Between Rival Telegraph Companies.

COLUMBUS, Aug. 28.—Judge Bingham in the District Court declined to grant injunctions asked by the Western Union Telegraph Company, restraining the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad Company from transferring its telegraph wires between Columbus and Wheeling, from Western Union Company's poles to Atlantic & Pacific Telegraph Company's poles, and from receiving commercial messages at stations where none but railway telegraph operatives are employed, by which means profits of such messages are engaged by Atlantic & Pacific Telegraph Company, instead of by Western Union Telegraph Company as heretofore.

FOREIGN.

Severe Editorial of the London Times on Turkish Atrocities—Charges of Undue Influence in the French elections.

LONDON, Aug. 28.—The Times has an editorial on the Bulgarian atrocities which concludes: "Mr Baring's report and the testimony of other official witnesses will have much practical value during the negotiations which must follow the close of the Servian war. They will give this country a good opportunity of clearly defining the position it holds with respect, both to Turkey and other great powers. It has been said that Turkish ministers are careless of English remonstrances, because they think that England will and must support Turkey, however flagrantly she may be misruled, and hence it is argued that she is indirectly accountable for Bulgarian massacres; but it is difficult to believe that so baseless an idea can mislead shrewd men who direct the Turkish empire. They know little of this country, if they think it could condone such atrocities as these of Bulgaria. Like some other States, it has an interest in Turkey, and it would be desirable to see her strong, but she cannot be strong without being well governed, and she will never be well governed until she has reversed many parts of her present system. Turkish misrule means weakness, recurring rebellion and foreign war—it carries with it a menace to the whole of Europe. This country will be ready to join other States in devising such reforms as will protect the christian part of the population, without regarding the convenience of the Porte."

PARIS, Aug. 28.—Count Mun, whose election to the Chamber of Deputies was invalidated by that body, July 13, on account of undue clerical influence has been again elected, over Routing, the Republican candidate for the Chamber. M Huion has been elected from Guingamp, over Prince De Luinge.

WASHINGTON.

Hayes to Visit the President—Grant Arranging for a Tour Around the World—Morrill Electioneering in in Maine—Appointments—Bonds Soon to be Ready—Employees Requested to Resign.

LONG BRANCH, Aug. 28.—The President invited Hayes to visit him at his cottage at Long Branch. Hayes accepted.

Grant is arranging for a trip around the world on the conclusion of his term, with Mrs. Grant.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—Secretary Morrill has gone to Maine on an electioneering tour.

Col. Robert J Stevens will not be disturbed in his place as clerk of the House Committee on Appropriations.
