TELEGRAPHIC NEWS
Neon Dispatches.
FOREIGN.
Heavy Servian Loss at Alexinat.—Duel With Sabres—Spanish Loan for Cuban War Expenses—England Able to Effect a Mediation Between Servia and Turkey—Steamers Foul-ed.
 LIVERPOOL, Aug. 29.—As the White Star steamer Germanie was leaving her dock, to-day, she fouled the Allen Line steamer Circassian, at anchor. The Germanie lost her boats, and davits from waist to quarter, and sustained extensive damage to her upper works. The Circassian lost her bowsprit and figure heads.
 MADRID, Aug. 29.—The amount bargained for in the convention and concluded upon by the government with Spanish capitalists, for the advance of money to pay the expenses of the war in Cuba, is from 15,000,000 to 25,000,000 piastres, not "piasters."
 LONDON, Aug. 29.—A letter to the Standard from Santander says; 24,840 men, all armed with Krupp and Placencia guns, will embark at Santander and Cadiz for Cuba before November 1st.
 Maximilian Joseph Childs, the celebrated physician and surgeon of Heidelberg, is dead.
 The latest advices from the fighting around Alexinat, is unfavorable to the Servians. Tchernayeff's accounts of his victories are not generally credited. A letter sorter between Hollyhead and London has been arrested for stealing letters containing bills of exchange on the United States. A correspondent of the Daily News with the Servians at Alexinat, says; "Their losses for the first five days fighting, are ten thousand.
 A Belgrade dispatch to the News, reports a duel between a correspondent of the Prague Politick, and a cavalry officer, with sabres. Both were wounded.
 The News publishes Mr Schuyler's preliminary report of enquiry into the Bulgarian intrigues, confirming the worst that has been told. Much slaughtering has been done by the regular Turkish soldiers.
 The Times editorially says: "The realization of the promise of peace, depends upon ourselves. All influences affecting the decision, are favorable, except those controlled directly or indirectly by ourselves."

CALIFORNIA.
Catholic Church Mobbed in China.
 SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 29.—The Gorlic which left Hong Kong on the 8rd, has arrived. It reports Governor German suicided—obedience of orders from Pekin. The Governor takes this method to check further inquiry.—Foreign officers are making renewed efforts to conciliate England.
 The Catholic church at Wing Knobber has been mobbed. Combustibles were thrown among the congregation, and a number slaughtered as they attempted to escape the flames.
 Heavy transaction in silks at high prices.

NEW YORK.
Hardy Solomon Arrested for Fraud—Released on \$20,000 Bail.
 NEW YORK, Aug. 29.—Hardy Solomon, late President of the South Carolina Bank, of Columbia, has been arrested on the complaint of ex-Gov. Robt K Scott, of South Carolina. The charges, are fraudulent management of the Bank, to place his money beyond the reach of creditors, and convert the loans of bonds to his own use. Solomon was released on \$20,000 bail.
FLASHES.
 WHEELING, Aug. 29.—Ex-Gov, Sam'l Price, of Greenbrier county, has been appointed to the Senate, to fill Carpenter's vacancy.
 SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 29.—The block bounded by Brannon, Townsend, Third and Fourth sts., burned. Loss half million; 200 families are houseless. A fireman broke his neck in a fall from a ladder.
 SELMA, Aug. 29.—Gen C M Shelly was nominated for Congress by the Democrats of the Fourth District.
 TROY, N. Y., Aug. 29.—Marcellus Groats' hosiery mills at Amsterdam, N. Y., was burned to day. Loss \$115,000.

 PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 29.—The London Club beat the Yale a half length. These crews made the best time yesterday. The races have now narrowed down to Beaverworks, London and Watkins Clubs. The deciding race will be run to-morrow. The best time Wednesday, 8:51, made by the London Club.

 WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 29.
 For the South Atlantic States, slight changes in pressure, easterly to south, early winds, and generally warmer clear or partly cloudy weather are probable.
WASHINGTON.
Special Agents of the Treasury Retained—Cameron and Sherman on a Tour of Inspection—National Bank Securities.
 WASHINGTON, D C, Aug. 29.—Chandler returns to-morrow. Cameron will be here a few days after the 1st of September.
 The special agents of the Treasury retained are Bingham, Carter, Ayer, Kinzella, Barney, Tingle, Evans, Spaulding, Louis G Martin, H S Martin, Adams, Fallock, Moore, Kimball, Brackett, Hinds, J B Morris, W G Morris, King and Williams. These agents hereafter act under the direction of A K Tingle, Supervising Agent, subject to orders of the Secretary of the Treasury.
 Cameron and Gen Sherman leave the 12th of September, on an inspection tour, extending to San Francisco. Assistant Secretary cannot act during Morrill's absence.
 The Secretary of the Treasury decides new four and a half per cents may be deposited as securities for National Bank circulation on same terms as other United States securities.

NEW YORK.
Cornell, Chairman of the New York State Republican Committee—Intense Excitement and Great Confusion Among Coal Dealers.
 NEW YORK, Aug. 29.—The Republican State Central Committee organized with A B Cornell as Chairman.
 A great coal sale took place to-day, and an immense amount was sold. Prices trembled from 100 to 200 per ton on all trades. The excitement at the offices of coal dealers down town is intense; scarcely any dealer is alone; consultations and conferences are holding in almost every office. Never before has there been so much interest taken in the price of coal. Mr. Sam'l Sloan, President of the Delaware and Lockawana Company, said prices obtained are much lower than expected, but they are a peace offering to the public. A S word said that the object of coal combination had been to diminish the supply by taking measures to prevent overstocking of the market, but that now the same effect had been brought about. Production would be stopped, because coal could not be gotten out of mines and delivered at the present prices. Other retail dealers expressed similar opinions, and while acknowledging that the price of coal would come down, added that it could not keep down, because it could not be supplied at these rates.

FOREIGN.
Turko-Servian War—Conference of Great Powers—Germany Backward—Turkish Deat.
 LONDON, Aug. 29.—A dispatch to the Telegraph from Vienna says: "The great powers are constantly interchanging telegrams concerning the proposed mediation. A general agreement has been reached touching principal features of policy to be adopted, but the details are unsettled. Germany is the most backward of the powers and it is believed that great difficulty will be experienced in determining steps, but several days will probably elapse before the powers submit their proposal."
 The Pall Mall Gazette's Berlin special says that Austria will be invited again to take initiative steps in submitting mediatory proposals to Turkey. Negotiations commenced by guaranteeing the powers that are for the present restricted exclusively to obtaining the suspension of hostilities. Great divergencies of opinion are feared when the details are discussed. The conference is considered the only means of adjusting them.
 BELGRADE, Aug. 29.—Official advices state that the Turks attacked the Servian left on Monday, but were repulsed with heavy loss left killed, and a large quantity of arms and ammunition on the field. A Turkish attack on Little Zevornick was likewise repulsed.
 VIENNA, Aug. 29.—A special dispatch from Constantinople to a political correspondence, says: "A cabinet council at which all the grand dignitaries were present resolved to expose the present Sultan Murad and proclaim Abdul Hamed. A change will occur shortly; certainly before the beginning of the next "Ramadan," the great annual feast of the Mohammedans."
