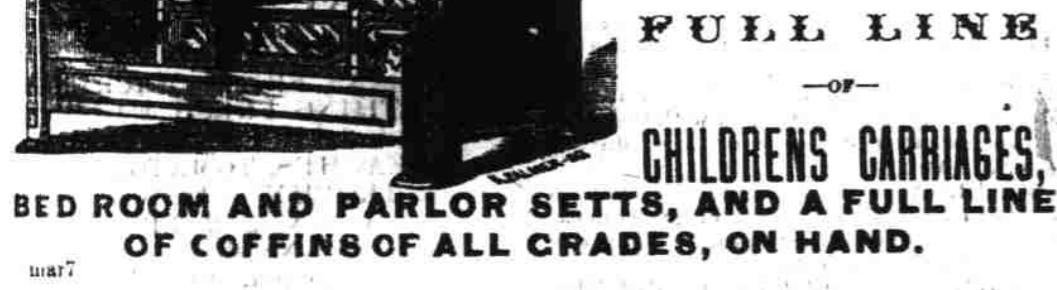

FOREIGN.

More About the Turko-Serbian War.
BELGRADE, Aug. 31.—The Turks keep attacking Alexina, hoping to capture that place before mediation. The Serbian infantry have been worsted, but the artillery behave well. Russian influence stubbornly interposes obstacles to peace. Russians are swarming into Serbia. Should six weeks armistice occur, the Serbian army will be fully re-organized and will be stronger than at the beginning of the war.
CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 31.—The council of ministers to the great dignitaries of the empire have proclaimed Abdul Hamed, Sultan, vice Murad, deposed.

NEW YORK.

Meeting of the Independents—Horatio Seymour Accepts—Dorshelmer Re-nominated.
NEW YORK, Aug. 31.—A grand ratification meeting of the Independents was held to-day. Mr. Lowder presided. Cooper and Cary spoke.
SARATOGA, Aug. 31.—Hon. Wm. Dorshelmer was re-nominated for Lieut. Governor by acclamation.
Ex-Gov. Seymour has accepted the nomination for Governor.

FLASHES.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 31.—Loss by fire \$780,000. The supposed incendiary intention being to burn the factory for employing Chinese.
TRENTON, N. J., Aug. 31.—At the Prohibition Convention, twenty delegates were present, and endorsed the nomination of Green Adams, and selected an electoral ticket.
DENVER, Aug. 31.—Four miners were suffocated by foul air in mining a shaft near Central City. A father who descended in search of his son and other victims, was suffocated before relief could reach him.
DES MOINES, IOWA, Aug. 31.—The Democratic Convention nominated H. H. Stubbs for Secretary of State.
DENVER, COL., Aug. 31.—The Democratic State Convention nominated B. M. Hughes for Governor, and T. M. Patterson for Congress.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 31.
For the South Atlantic States, slightly lower barometer, southerly to westerly winds, nearly stationary temperature and partly cloudy weather are probable with rain areas.

FOREIGN.

More About the Servo-Turkish War—Heavy Failure.
BELGRADE, Aug. 31.—Official intelligence received to-night, announces that the Turks were defeated at points on the right bank of Morava and subsequently taken in the flank were put to flight. Their bridges over Morava were destroyed, the Servians occupied the Turkish intrenchments on right bank of Morava.
LONDON, Aug. 31.—The liabilities of Messrs. Vaughan & Co., is one million sterling.
A dispatch to Reuters, Telegram Company, from Ragusa says: "Der-vishe Pasha has reached Padgoretz with a strong detachment of Egyptians and Arabians. The Turkish force at Padgoretz is now formidable and has 54 guns. The Prince of Montenegro's headquarters and army are between Daniligrade and Grakhorn."

WASHINGTON.

Naval Review—Steamship Arrived in Arabia—Ladies Dismissed From the Treasury.
WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 31.—The naval review at Fort Royal will commence early in October. Robeson will take a pleasure party there, leaving about the first of October. The steamship Alert arrived at Aden, Arabia, Aug 1st, the heat in crossing the Red Sea at times being so oppressive as to have bad effects on the crew.
The Chinese Commission leave Chicago for San Francisco on the 18th of September.
Sixty-five ladies of the Treasury offices opened letters of dismissal at their houses when they reached there from work this evening.

MISSOURI.

Horrid Butchery.
St. Louis, Aug. 31.—Advice from Decatur, Texas, say, Rev. W. G. England, a Methodist minister and his wife, step-daughter and four step-sons were murdered at their home, six miles from Montague, last Saturday night, by a party of disguised men. No particulars of the fiendish affair has been received, but it is supposed the butchery was committed for money as the family was rich.

NEW YORK.

Robbery at Poughkeepsie—The Democratic Convention.

POUGHKEEPSIE, Aug. 31.—Four masked men bucked and gagged the station keeper at Hudson River station and robbed the office. Two arrests have been made.
SARATOGA, Aug. 31.—The Democratic Convention re-assembled this morning. Mr. John Kelly made a brief personal explanation of conciliatory remarks, yesterday with reference to the liberal party. He had no intention to give offense to any liberals who were acting with the Democratic party. Hon. Wm. Dorshelmer, the present Lt. Governor, was placed in nomination for that position by a delegate from Westchester. He announced that Horatio Seymour had accepted the gubernatorial nomination.
Clarkson Potter and Manton Marble were also put in nomination, but Dorshelmer was re-nominated by acclamation. The Committee appointed to wait on Gov. Seymour and apprise him of his nomination, reported that he feels constrained to obey the call of the people and accept the nomination. DeWitt C. West was declared the nominee for elector at large in place of Seymour. Robert Earle was nominated for Judge of the Court of Appeals. Darius A. Ogden and Coner Robert Anderson, State Prison Inspectors.

GEORGIA.

Yellow Fever Decreasing—Lynchers Jailed—Killed by Railroad Accident—Posses of South Carolina Negroes Murder a White Man—Great Excitement.
SAVANNAH, Aug. 31.—The official report from cemeteries show that there were 12 yellow fever interments yesterday. The report of the committees of benevolent associations to-day, show that the disease is on the decrease and is confined entirely to the suburbs.
AUGUSTA, Aug. 31.—Parties arrested for lynching Robert Williams in this city Saturday night had a preliminary examination before the County Court to-day, and were committed to jail charged with murder in second degree, to await trial before the Superior Court.
Joseph Goldsmith of Charleston, was killed in a railroad accident on the South Carolina Railroad near Aiken this morning.
The negro posse who killed a white man named Porter, at Windson, S. C., on yesterday, were not summoned by the Sheriff. They were arrested and jailed at Aiken to-day. Great excitement prevailed; timely interference of prominent citizens saved them from being lynched.

NORTH CAROLINA.

Touree Sues the Raleigh News for Libel for Calling Him an ex-Penitentiary Convict—Quarantine Enforced in Wilmington.
RALEIGH, Aug. 31.—The Raleigh Daily News, Democratic, was sued today by A. W. Touree, ex-Judge and carpet-bagger, for styling him "an ex-penitentiary convict." This charge has been current 7 or 8 years, and this is the second libel suit brought by Republicans against the News within the past six months.
WILMINGTON, Aug. 31.—The Mayor has issued a proclamation under advice of the Superintendent of Public Health forbidding all persons from Savannah entering this city. Officers will meet all Southern trains six miles from the city for the purpose of requiring rigid adherence to the provisions of the proclamation.

NEBRASKA.

Indians Kill More Whites.
OMAHA, Aug. 31.—Private telegrams from Sidney, Nebraska, says: "Jones has just come in with Clark's pony express, and brings mail from North Deadwood, which was corralled by Indians four days ago. Fifteen men were killed by the Indians last Sunday. The bodies of four dead men are lying in Buffalo Gap."
