## TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

### Noon Dispatches.

#### FOREIGN.

**Servian Reports of Victories Disagree**  
—A Marguis Convicted to Eight Years Penal Servitude for Forgery The New Sultan Proclaimed.  
**BOLOGNE, Sept. 1.**—Guissepe Manteyazza, the 6th Marquis of Biscat, has been on trial before the Assize Court here, charged with forgery, fraud and falsification, in forging names of King Victor Emanuel, Prince Humbert of Savoy, and the British Consul at Florence, to a number of bills of exchange has been convicted and sentenced to eight years penal servitude.  
**CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 1.**—The deposition of Mural occasions no excitement or disturbance. The deposed Monarch has been assigned the Tcheregan palace, as a residence, Abdul Hamid, the new Sultan, was yesterday received by the ministers and functionaries at Mapcapon palace, where he was proclaimed, Abdul Hamid the Second.  
**LONDON, Sept. 1.**—The Standard's Belgrade correspondent asserts that General Zuchjanin shot himself purposely.  
The Servian reports of victories, are inconsistent with each other.

#### DAKOTA.

**Crook and Terry in Close Pursuit of Sitting Bull.**

**CHEYENNE, Sept. 1.**—The Indian commission have been engaged here to-day perfecting a plan of operations, on which to proceed on their arrival at the agencies. They leave to-morrow morning. A courier who left the camp of Crook and Terry on the 20th at the mouth of Powder River, arrived at Fort Fettermen to-night. Their command was then on the trail which was estimated at ten thousand ponies. Camp fires indicate that there are seven distinct bands. There is reason to believe that the Indians are almost destitute of food, and trails left in the deserted camps, indicate that they are reduced to extremity, using raw hides for food. All the Snake Allies have gone home, the Crows remaining. Gen Crook fully expects to strike Sitting Bull in a few days.

#### KENTUCKY.

**Mr. Kerr's Will—Advice to His Son.**

**LOUISVILLE, Sept. 1.**—Mr Kerr leaves his property to his wife, in trust for his son. It is conditioned that Mrs Kerr's mother and his own, be cared for. The will concludes by most earnestly advising his son, to cherish always a most sincere love of justice and truth, and to make all his aims in life consistent therewith, and they cannot fail to be high and noble.

#### NEW YORK.

**Gov. Seymour Declines the Nomination for Governor of New York—Ill Health the Cause.**

**NEW YORK, Sept. 1.**—Gov. Seymour in an interview with a reporter at his residence in Utica, last night said: "I have done everything in my power to prevent my nomination being made, and while I appreciate the honor my friends would bestow upon me, I must say now, that the same reasons for refusal to accept this nomination which then existed, still exists. I have this morning received a letter from Dr. Cheerhill, one of my physicians, forbidding me making any mental or physical effort, and declaring that the acceptance of this or any other public position, would be detrimental, if it did not prevent my ultimate recovery. In view of these facts, it will be impossible for me to accept the nomination, and I so informed the gentlemen from Saratoga, who waited upon me this morning, requesting my acceptance. I cannot see how Mr. Faulkner could have been misled into making the statement he is reported to have made. It may be, that what I really said has been misconstrued. There are a number of good men in our ranks, who are eminently qualified to fill the position of Governor. The nomination now rests with the State Executive Committee, which is friendly to Gov. Tilden, and who no doubt will select, one of a number, who will conciliate all interests."

#### FLAESHES.

**LOWELL, MASS., Sept 1.**—Miss F A Martin shot Charles Ricker and took poison, both will recover—Jealousy.

**CINCINNATI, O., Sept 1.**—At Buckley, Illinois, George Sleeper, the groom at the wedding was called to the door and shot dead by a rival.

**PHILADELPHIA, Sept 1.**—Four of the abettors in the prize fights of yesterday in which the youth Walker, was killed, were held to bail as accessories to the homicide. Weeden, the surviving principal, and Arthur Chambers are still at large.

**MORRIS, ILL., Sept 1.**—The Sherwood school furniture factory was burned to-day. Loss 30,000.

## PENNSYLVANIA.

**Chess Tournament Ended—Mason Wins First Prize—Terrible Fire Raging—Efforts to Check it Vain—Prolonged Rain the Only Hope.**

**PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 1.**—The chess tournament has closed. Mason wins first, Judd second, and Bird third prizes. Elson and Davidson divide the fourth and fifth; Robert wins the sixth.

**HONESDALE, Sept. 1.**—The woods are burning fiercely on all sides of this place, and for miles in all directions; and in many localities in the county, the fire has grown to such proportions, as to create great alarm among the farmers, and inhabitants of small valleys. Men are now fighting fire on the Southern boundary of this village and the smoke is so dense, that the sun is almost hidden during the day. In Clinton township, ten miles from here, the farmers are fighting fire in large bodies, the flames having approached dangerously near to several farms. The Moosic mountains are ablaze for miles, and vast quantities of timber, railroad ties, bark, etc., have been destroyed. From all quarters in this region come reports of destructive mountains fires; there has been but one rain in all this section since the 4th of July, streams, springs and wells never before known to fail are dry. Delaware and Lockawana rivers, are fourteen inches below the lowest recorded low water mark and that was in 1836. Rain copious and prolonged, is the only thing that can prevent still greater destruction and suffering.

## GEORGIA.

**Yellow Fever Raging in Savannah.**

**SAVANNAH, Sept. 1.**—There were 12 interments on Thursday. Nine of them were from yellow fever deaths. Five of these latter, were by mistake reported yesterday, on Wednesday's interments for two days.  
The weather very hot.

## MISSOURI.

**Coal Miner's Strike.**

**ST. LOUIS, Sept. 1.**—The suspension of work at St. Clair Company coal mines continues. The workmen at Mount Carbin and Costraville mines have struck for higher wages.
