FOREIGN.

Turko Servian War Items.

LONDON, Sept. 7.—The Standard's Berlin special says: Since Turkey's declaration of an armistice, the outbreak of a Turkish and Russian war is deemed unavailable.

The Standard's correspondent at Nissia states that large numbers of Bulgarians are joining the Turkish army. They show much feeling against the Servians, because the latter brought mischief on them.

Four men killed by a tunnel disaster.

A dispatch from Constantiaope to the News says that the British ambassador made strong representation to Turkey, that if the war continues, the Turks must be prepared to see Russia openly supporting Servia.

Rome, Sept. 7.—The La Liberto says: The minister of war foreseeing fresh Eastern complications, is recalling all furloughed affairs.

NEW YORK.

Fight Over a Flag Pole—One Killed and Several Wounded—Massacre of Egyptian Troops.

KINGSTON, Sept. 7.—The Republican campaign club went to Stony Hollow yesterday, and raised a flag pole. The opposition pulled it down. Stones and pistols were used. Several were shot and one is reported dead. Several of the club were severely wounded, and one has a pistol shot in his head.

NEW YORK, Sept. 7.—A Paris dispatch says: Information has been received from reliable sources, that fifteen hundred Egyptian troops with their commander, Rabib Pacha, have been massacred in Abyssinia. The Abyssinians afterward proceeded to Massoraa, which they seized. The garrison and government officers escaped on board of some ships, which happened to be in port, and have arrived safely in Suez. The Egyptian government is contemplating revenge, and is sending fresh troops to the scene of action. Cavalry and artillery were also being re-organized.

OHIO.

Prize Fight Between Allen and Goss 21 Rounds Fought—Goss Wins by a Foul.

CINCINNATI, Sept. 6.—The second ring was formed it is supposed, near the scene of the interrupted fight. Fifth: Allen receives a terrible blow in the stomach, but got a fearful one in on Goss's eye. Goss down to avoid punishment. Sixth: Allen fights Goss to the grass. Seventh: When time was called, the Covington Light Guards interfered. The Governor's aid was sent for. Eph Holland advised him to stop the fight. Holland said he was a law abiding citizen and opposed bloodshed, and stopped the fight. Holland says they will make the men fight it out before reaching Cincinnati to-night. Neither were much punished.

Scene: A clover field near Walton, Ky., on short line road. Five hundred present. First round: Sparring tedious. Allen got first blood; clinch and fall, Goss on top. Rest. Seven rounds Second: Goss got a bloody mouth, Allen wins fall. Third: Allen seems getting the advantage, when the militia appear, but the fight continues. Fourth: Rapid heavy blows; Goss knocked down.

At 10.45, the referee called the men to appear again in the ring. Eighth round: Goss got in a good one on Allen's face; Allen got one in on Goss's cheek. Allen forced the fighting and the round closed with Allen punishing Goss severely; but the latter threw him. Ninth: Goss forces the fighting, and gets in some good work on Allen's breast and face. Allen finished the round for himself, with heavy blows on Goss' face. Goss won by a foul on the twenty-first round.

PENNSYLVANIA.

Death Warrants of Molly Maguires Suspension of a Bank.

HARRISBURG, Sept. 6.—Gov Hartruff issued death warrants for Thomas Munley, Janus James, Carrill James, Boyle Hugh McGihan and James Roanty, Molly Maguires recently convicted in Schuylkill county of murder in first degree. Executions take place October 31.

City Bank has suspended. The depositors mainly women and laboring men.

PENNSYLVANIA.

Temperance Effort.

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 7.—The international Medical Congress, has received a communication from several temperance societies inviting the Congress to publicly recommend to all persons, total abstinence from alcoholic beverages. It was laid on the table.

A paper on surgery was read by Paul F. Evert, of Nashville, Tenn.; on medical biography, by Dr. Toner, of Washington.

DAKOTA.

An Indian Killed for Refusing to Surrender.

CHEYENNE, Sept. 7.—A courier from Sidney, Nebraska, reports that Sioux Jim, who had arrived from the Red Cloud agency, was shot dead by American horsemen, for refusing to surrender his arms.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 7.

For the South Atlantic States, falling barometer, southerly winds, partly cloudy weather and local rains will prevail, with slight changes in temperature.

SOUTH CAROLINA.

A Bloody Riot Upon the Streets of Charleston—The Negroes the Aggressors—They Rob Stores, Block the Streets and Set Upon the Whites.

CHARLESTON, S. C., Sept. 7.—A serious riot occurred late last night, growing out of a street attack by colored Republicans upon some colored men, who have been taking a conspicuous part in the Democratic canvass. A small body of whites endeavored to defend the Democratic negroes, but were overpowered by the numbers of the rioters. After severe fighting in which pistols were freely used on both sides. The rioters held King street the main thoroughfare, from midnight until sunrise, breaking windows, robbing stores, and attacking and beating indiscriminately, every white man who showed his face. A large number of persons were injured, mostly whites, several of those shot, are in a critical condition. Intense excitement prevails. The general feeling being that the trouble is not yet over.

The riotous proceedings of the rice field strikers on the Combahee have been renewed and the situation is regarded as serious.

WASHINGTON.

Movements of Some of Grant's Conspirators—Large Democratic Gains in Vermont.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 7.—Taft is going to Ohio to make a speech or two. Sherman leaves Saturday for his far Western inspection tour with Cameron. The Star says: "After all the Democrats are able to pick up some crumbs of comfort from the Vermont election, as they have nearly doubled their vote of 1874 and have, in the cities and populous towns in many instances made larger gains than the Republicans. They have carried the Republican town of Bennington, and have made large gains in Manchester, Arlington, Rutland, and Vergennes. Still the fact remains that on a full vote the Republicans are able to carry the State by nearly their flood-tide majorities of the past."

Gen Sherman in publishing Taft's letter to marshalls adds some instructions; among them the following in effect: "Officers commanding troops summoned to aid marshalls or sheriffs must judge for themselves whether the service is lawful or necessary, and compatible with their ordinary military duties. They must limit action absolutely to proper aid in execution of the lawful precept exhibited by the marshalls or sheriff. If time permits every demand should be forwarded to the President for his orders, and in all cases the highest officer whose orders can be given in time, to meet the emergency, will alone assume the responsibility of action."

JEFFERSON CITY, Sept. 7.—The Greenback Convention endorsed Cooper and Cary, and nominated the State ticket, headed by S. P. Alexander for Governor and the full electoral ticket.

ST. PAUL, MINN., Sept. 7.—The Register and distributory clerks of the post office have been arrested for robbing the mail.

FORT SCOTT, KAN., Sept. 7.—Gregg, who had opposed his daughter's marriage, shot his son-in-law and fled, and fired on the pursuing posse. The sheriff returning the fire, killed Gregg.
