#### Noon Dispatches.

##### WASHINGTON.

**Sherman Declines being Considered a Partisan.**

WASHINGTON, September 9.—At a meeting of the south ward Hayes and Wheeler minute men of Brooklyn on Wednesday night, the following letter from Gen. Sherman was received:

HEADQUARTERS OF THE ARMY OF THE UNITED STATES, Washington, D. C., Aug. 30th, 1876.

E. R. Kennedy, Esq.

My Dear Sir:—I thank you for the compliment conveyed in your note of the 29th, and regret that a proposed trip to California prevents my being in Brooklyn on the day you name. Of course, I am pleased to note the honor in which you hold the national emblems which we followed to the sea, and that you number among your members some of the men who composed that army. I feel every possible interest in the honor and glory of our national government, but trust you will not use my name in a party connection. I must not be a partisan, because I have chosen to dedicate my few remaining years to my profession, which is eminently national, leaving every citizen free to choose his own course in life, and to ally his civil fortunes to any of the parties into which a free people always divide for the varied interests that always do arise.

##### FOREIGN.

#### Heavy Turkish Loss.

LONDON, Sept. 9.—No new military movements are reported from the seat of war to-day but report telegraphed from Deligrade to Daily News and published this morning, is of the movement of Turks to outflank Servians—at Deligrade corresponds with information received from other sources—Moukhta Pasha has done nothing important on the Northwest of Montenegro. Special dispatch to the Times from Oettingen, says Derwish Pasha's attack on the Southeast on Wednesday, was made by several columns which crossed Zeta and Moratcha, where the repulsed portion of the Turks were cut off from the fords. They were driven into an angle between two rivers and pushed into Maratscha which runs between perpendicular rocky banks. The Turkish artillery posted to protect the crossing was ineffectual to check the pursuit and the slaughter was great. Eight hundred Turks were left dead on the field and upwards of a thousand drowned.

##### FLASHES.

CHARLESTON, S. C.—Midnight.—The city quiet, the streets being patrolled by detachments of white clubs. The colored Democrats held their meeting to-night under the protection of a strong guard.

NORFOLK, Va., Sept. 9.—Calvin L. Gardner, postmaster at Suffolk, Va., is held on \$5,000 bond, charged with embezzlement.

NEW LEBANON, N. Y., Sept. 9.—Moses Y. Tilden, brother of Gov. Tilden, died this morning.

LONDON, Sept. 9.—The steamer Arbetrahl, from New Orleans for Liverpool, struck an iceberg. The crew safe. Loss, \$350,000.

CINCINNATI, O., Sept. 9.—L. H. Lyon & Co's. sash and door factory burned to-day. Loss, \$50,000.

NEW YORK, Sept. 9.—Traphagan, Hunter & Co., Tailors, failed to-day. Their liabilities are not given.

CHICAGO, Sept. 9.—In accordance with instructions telegraphed agents by their managers, who held a convention at Erie yesterday, rates on all kinds of coal are reduced fifty cents per ton.

SAVANNAH, GA., Sept. 9.—Passengers for Florida and Southwest Georgia, coming via Charleston are transferred three miles from this city to Southern bound trains.

HARRISBURG, Sept. 9.—Gen Sherman is here, and was met by Secretary Cameron, and both left for the West.

##### WEATHER PROBABILITIES.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 9. For the South Atlantic and Eastern Gulf States Southerly winds, stationary temperature, lower pressure and occasional local rains will prevail.

##### WASHINGTON.

What is Transpiring at the National Capital.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 8.—Chandler returns Tuesday.

Headquarters do not credit Trapper Ridgely's account of Custer's fight.

It is understood that Robeson will have Chief Engineer Wood court-martialed for his letter to Congressman White. The letter was calculated to provoke a challenge from a gentleman. White is a Republican member of Congress and Wood took umbrage at words used by White in debate.

Caleb Cushing, minister to Spain is in Limerick on the month's leave.

##### MASSACHUSETTS.

Decision in a Celebrated Case—The Republican Majority in Vermont.

BOSTON, Sept. 9.—The Supreme Court to-day rendered a decision in the famous Sear's will case. The will provided for the payment by the trustees, of certain stated income to the testator's son, but made no provision for the ultimate disposal of the balance of his immense estate. The court decides that it devolves to the son by way of resulting trust.

A carefully revised summary of the gubernatorial vote in Vermont, gives Fairbanks 23,732 majority.

##### NEW JERSEY.

#### Prominent Banker Jailed.

NORRISTOWN, Sept. 9.—John H. Talmage, of the banking firm of Talmage of New York, arrested here Thursday evening still remains in jail trying to secure bail, but it is understood the creditors of the firm, have created an organization to punish if possible, the Talmages to the utmost, and that if bail is forthcoming, there are other warrants ready for serving.

##### VIRGINIA.

Reports of Cotton Prospects in North Carolina and Virginia.

NORFOLK, Sept. 9.—Cotton exchange has fifty replies from North Carolina, and four from Virginia. Thirty-three report weather less favorable; four favorable, nine better than last year; the remainder complain of rain or drought or cold nights; forty-five reports stand not so good with some shedding. Picking will not commence generally until the 15th or 20th. Complaint of the month is from the excessive rains, causing shedding and rust.

##### PENNSYLVANIA.

Adjournment of the International Medical Convention.

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 9.—At to-day's session of the International Medical Congress, reports were received from several sections and referred for publication. The delegates from Great Britain and Canada presented separate papers signed by each delegate from three separate countries, congratulatory to the President and officers for the success of the congress and on the high value of the various papers presented, and on the forward impulse it has given to the progress of medicine in the widest sense of the word. They expressed in the strongest and warmest terms, their sense of and their thanks for unmeasured kindness and courtesy and the unbounded hospitality with which they have been received on this centennial occasion, and added that they would all carry back with them a most grateful recollection of that warm right hand of fellow-ship which has been so invariably extended to them by their brethren of the United States. After adopting resolutions of thanks to the officers of the University of Penn., and of Jefferson Medical College of this city, the Congress adjourned sine die.

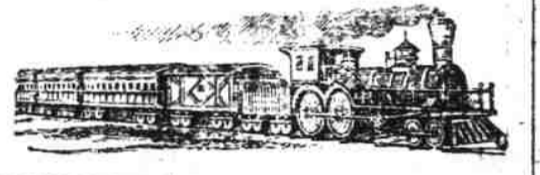
