Noon Dispatches.

FOREIGN.

Turkish Servian War—Turkish Cruelty Towards the Bulgarians—Servians Evacuating Alexinaiz—The Sultan Commands Peace—Failure.

LONDON, Sept 14.—A dispatch from Odessa, reports that the Turks of Philopolis, Tartar and Bazaridjik, have assumed a threatening attitude toward the Bulgarians Christians, ever since the collapse of the insurrection and they have been deprived of their arms. The British ambassador at Constantinople has been informed of the perilous situation of the christian population.

Among the peace conditions proposed, is this: Prince Milan shall go to Constantinople and pay homage to the Sultan. No mention of Bosnia and Montenegro is made in the conditions. The Sultan in rejecting the propositions and referring it again to the Grand Council of the East, said it was necessary to make friends, and show England that no more atrocities would occur. The war should be brought to a close as soon as possible, Turkey giving fair conditions. If his present advisers were unable to effect this, he would find others who could. The effect of this allocation was stunning, especially to the Grand Vizier, who has kept his room ever since. The absence of the Grand Vizier is considered a hint to his younger colleagues to lose no time in acting on the ideas of the Sultan. They will thus avert the danger threatening all. Much dependence is placed on Mahmood Damad, the Sultan's brother-in-law, on whose advice it is supposed the Sultan mainly acts.

A Times' Belgrade dispatch says: All Servian troops have retired from Alexinaiz except eight battalions, who are instructed to withdraw in case of attack. Miller & Sons, calico printers of Glasgow have failed. Liabilities five hundred thousand dollars.

NEW YORK.

The President's Wonderful Foreknowledge.
New York, Sept 14.—A Long Branch dispatch says the President, in conversation yesterday, said that he was in possession of all the facts relating to the efforts of the Government to secure Tweed, and their final success. He also intimated that negotiations for the new extradition treaty between this country and England are pending.

WASHINGTON.

Report of the Cotton Crop.

WASHINGTON, Sept 14.—The September returns to the Department of Agriculture, as was expected, show a decline for the remarkably high figures of July, in all the cotton States except Louisiana. In some of the more Southern counties of the cotton belt, the caterpillar has been more or less destructive, while in a few localities of the extreme Southwest, the boll worm was somewhat troublesome. The conditions of the growth during August were quite varied. In some cases protracted drought with extreme heat injured the crop, while in others complaints of excessive rain were rife. Yet the aggregate reduction is below what ought to have been expected from the extent of local disasters reported. The condition of the crop in North Carolina 91 a decline of 6 per cent; Georgia, 90 decline of 14 per cent; Alabama 88 decline of 7 per cent; Mississippi 87 decline of 5 per cent; Louisiana 86 a gain of 1 per cent; Arkansas 92 a loss of 7 per cent; Texas 87 a loss of 9 per cent; Tennessee 119 a loss of 1 per cent.

FLASHES.

New York, Sept 14.—The Architectural Iron Works have suspended. Liabilities \$200,000. Seven hundred men ousted.

VIRGINIA.

Funeral of Ex Gov. Henry A. Wise—Long Procession.

RICHMOND, Sept 14.—The funeral of Ex-Gov. Henry A. Wise took place this afternoon from St. James' Episcopal Church. There was an immense turnout of citizens of all classes and nationalities. The procession embraced all the military companies of the city, veterans of the Wise brigade, Catholic, Irish and German societies, Masons, members of the legal profession and a large number of other citizens. All along the line of march the streets were crowded with people following the procession to Hollywood Cemetery, where the remains of the deceased statesman and soldier were interred. Floral tributes were numerous and handsome. The State and city officials, including Gov. Kemper and staff also attended, while State and city offices were closed during latter part of the day. Federal and State flags displayed at half mast on the capital.

NEW YORK.

International Rifle Match.

CHESTER, Sept 14.—The wind is quite strong. Five thousand people present. 800 yards; Canadian 492; Australian 532; American 525; Irish 502; Scotch 526, 900 yards—Australian 494 Canadian 466; Irish 485; American 515; Scotch 462, 1,000 yards—Score not given yet. The Americans won by 22 over the Irish. The American total score for both days, 3,120 Irish, 3,104. Totals for the match—Americans, 3,120; Irish, 3,104; Australians, 3,097; Scotch, 3,061; Canadians, 2,023.

The election for officers for the ensuing year resulted as follows: President, Charles Bullock, Vice President, A. D. Shepherd, Gustavus J. Loom and Jacob D. Wells; Treasurer, Chas. A. Taffet; Secretary, C. A. Marsh.

Report of the Treasurer showing the association to be in a flourishing condition, was adopted.

SOUTH CAROLINA.

No Nomination—Money the Trump Card.

COLUMBIA, Sept. 14.—The Republican State Convention, third day. No nominations yet. The time thus far has been occupied in making speeches by the friends of both parties, Chamberlain and Dunn. The object of the delay is stated to be to ascertain who has the most money.

NEBRASKA.

Sheridan and the Indians.

OMAHA, Sept 14.—Lt. Gen. Sheridan passed here this morning en route to Fort Laramie, where he will meet Gen. Crook in a few days to arrange for a vigorous prosecution of the Indian war through the coming winter, and the establishment of a large cantonment in the Powder River country.

THE CONDITION OF THE SOUTH.—At Saratoga, in the social science association recently, Charles Nordhoff read a paper on the condition of the South, showing the ill effects of the continual interference of the general government with the colored race, and contrasting the condition of affairs in Georgia favorably with those in some other States, where affairs are more influenced from Washington.

This was debated and its views generally concurred in by Eliza Wright, Edward Atkinson, George Bradford, Dr. Howe and Prof. Sumner, of Yale College. The latter believed that we in the North should mind our own business severely. He was opposed to the interference by the Federal politicians in the internal affairs of the Southern States.—Ex.
