SOUTH CAROLINA.

Regro Outlawry-Whites Ambushed The Port Royal Railroad Track Torn up-All Travel Stopped, and the Road Held by Negroes.

August', Sept. 18 .- Mrs Alonzo Harley, who lives near Silverton, Aiken county, S. C., was assaulted at her residence last Friday, by two negro men. Harley was at work on his farm and Mrs Harley was alone with her son, aged nine years, and an infant three weeks old. She was knocked down two or three times, her screams and those of her boy alarmed the negroes who fled. When the report of the assault on Mrs Harley became known, the citizens assembled and made search for the negroes, one of whom was arrested and shot; the other negro escaped. On Saturdry a warrant was issued for his arrest and the warrant was placed in the hands of GIVE US A CALL BEFORE PURCHASING ELSEWHERE AND the constable, who, with the aid of a posse of whites, attempted to make the arrest, which was resisted by a large crowd of negroes, said to be 200, armed with shot guns and Winchester rifles. Sunday, the excitement continued, both whites and blacks were fully armed and watching each other's movements. There are reports of a skirmish during the day, in which two or three persons were wounded. Toward night a compromise was agreed upon. both parties agreeing to disband and retire to their homes. The negroes agreed to surrender the colored man who made the assault on Mrs Harley, and deliver him over to the authorities at Aiken. With this understanding the whites dispersed and while retiring to their homes, it is reported that several of the latter were ambush ed and shot by the negroes. The city is full of rumors as to the number killed, but nothing definite is known,

LATER.-It is ascertained up to this hour, that the passenger train from Augusta for Port Royal, which left this morning at eight o'clock has returned. Proceeding to Jackson Station, the track was found to be torn up, and the freight train which left here at six o'clock this morning, was wrecked, and the negroes had possession of the road. Supt Fleming, of the Port Royal Road, has telegraphed the State of affairs to Gov Chamberlain asking him for troops. He has also applied to Lieut Barahardt of the United States Army, stationed at Hamburg, for assistance, and a number of citizens have left for the scene of the disturbance, which is about 20 miles from Augusta, on the Port Royal Road. News from Crook-Troops Sent Out in Search of Food. WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 18 .- The

Herald publishes a three column elaboration, of the semi-official account telegraphed Saturday night. The details are contradictory and results of the fight seems to have been that the troops were in haste in anxiety to get away from the Indians. The following is the very latest:

CROOK CITY, BLACK HILLS, Sept 12, VIA FORT LARAMIE, WYT, Sept 16'76 "Yesterday morning Gen Crook dispatched a party of the 5th Cavalry, men from his camp on Owl Creek, to press forward to the Black Hills and send back provisions for the hungry troops. Col. Mills was in command, and Lieut Bubb commissary officer was sent to bring food. The dried meat and fruit captured in the Indian village near Slim Butter, was not sufficient as was supposed to sustain the column until it could reach the Black Hills, and on the 10th horses were again

butchered and issued as rations. The advance party was a sort of forlorn hope. The captured Indians had said that many war parties were prowling near the Belle Fourche river and Hothills, especially the braves of Crazy

Horse's band."

Col. Mills gives the following account of the expedition: "The relief party was mounted on captured Indian ponies. We'left the main column in a dense mist and bitter storm, and marched by the guidance of the compass along our trail, describing many eccentricities. During the night following, it was impossible to distinguish any landmark, darkness was impenetrable. Next day we were cheered by the breaking of the mist and a glimpse seen and espied the outlines of the Black Hills. By rapid riding we reached their base at the mouth of Whitewood Congor at dusk. Leaving most of the party there, I galloped on with Captain Jack and Hawaiian Frank, to Crook City. The Indian Black Wolf had hinted it was deserted by the miners on account of the Sioux's persecutions, but we were delighted after

rattling through the timbered gulch to see the lights glimmer in the darkness. Plenty of food is stored here, and Gen. Crook will to-morrow be met at the Belle Fourche by loaded wagons and a herd of beeves. The Black Hills are infected by hundreds of Sioux, and people are killed daily. Milton Provices was murdered ten days ago while hauling hay in Whitewood Congor. The Indians captured three tons of hay. At the same time they attacked another Wierchers train going to Fort Pierre; a teamster brought back the

news but the result of the fight is not Contributions here for Savannah in known, as it was progressing when he Day before yesterday a party of Sioux attempted depredations 200 yards from the main street of Crook City, and were forced to skeddadle by a hot fire from the citizens. At Rapid City, within the past two weeks, five white men have been killed and a great numbers of horses stolen. A party of citizens pursued the Indians, and killed one, losing one of their own number. The war of savage life and civilization is at its height in these mountains, and its nature is horribly
