

STATE NEWS.

Henry Roland died recently in Yancey county, at the age of 105 years.

Jesse F. Graves was nominated for the House of Representatives by the Democrats of Surry county, by acclamation.

J. Sewell Brown has been nominated by the Conservatives of McDowell for the House, and Jo G. Neal for Sheriff.

Dr. C. C. Covington one of the oldest and most respected citizens of Richmond county, died last Saturday morning after a long and painful illness.

G. S. Ferguson has been nominated by the Conservatives to represent the counties of Transylvania, Haywood and Henderson in the State Senate.

Winston Sentinel: We learn that a fight took place at Nunn's Store, in Surry county, on last Monday, which resulted in the death of a negro man at the hands of John George. We have not learned any of the particulars.

The Salisbury Watchman says: Dr. I. W. Jones, radical candidate for elector at large, said at Smith's school house Friday evening, Sept. 8th, that he would not have supported the radical ticket or accepted the nomination of elector, had he not had assurances that Tom Long and John Ramsey would be removed from the high offices which they disgrace.

Asheville Expositor: I. B. Sawyer, Esq. of this place, who held a position at Washington in the Patent Office, was rash enough on receiving a telegram from C. J. Taylor, that Bob Vance was nominated at Old Fort, to throw his hat about sixteen feet in the air, and forthwith asked to "step down and out." The expurgator of that office saying: "You have been sailing under false colors, sir." Squire Sawyer had his resignation written for the occasion, and forthwith "poked" it at the fellow. Squire Sawyer is for Tilden, Zeb Vance and Reform.

Winston Sentinel: A bold robbery was committed in open day a few miles below Salem on last Saturday, at the house of Mrs. Daniel Reich. Between the hours of 11 and 12 o'clock three white men entered the house and told Mrs. Reich to give up her keys, that they had come for her money, and threatened, if she refused, to kill her. She gave up her keys to the robbers who ransacked her drawers, and got about \$12 in money, all that was in the house at the time. The same parties broke into the house of Mr. Columbus Reich and took something to eat. Although this robbery was committed in daylight, there is no clue as to who the perpetrators are.

All the hands resumed work on the Beaufort side of the Combahee to-day in obedience to the advice, remonstrations and threats of Sheriff Wilson, and have promised him to continue work and to have no more gatherings of a riotous nature. The sheriff will remain in this precinct for a week or ten days to sustain the order which his prompt action has established.
