A correspondent of the News and Courier, writing from Columbia, under date of the 23d inst., says: "A week has elapsed since the first intimation of the outbreak at Ellenton was received in this city, and yet, strange to relate, nothing whatever of an official or definite nature has been roceived from the scene of the reported disturbance. The authorities at the Statehouse seem to be as much in the dark as are other people, and it is not even known by them how many persons have been killed and wounded."

The annual report of the News on the trade of Greenville shows that during the past fiscal year the sales amounted to \$1,350,420, of which the 20,000 bales of cotton brought \$1,000,000; \$429,000 worth of groceries, \$249,000 of staple dry goods, \$127,000 of shoes, \$52,000 of clothing and \$65,000 of liquors were sold besides other articles. Eighteen hundred tons of fertilizers were sold at \$50 a ton. The prospect of the coming trade is very good, the factories offering high prices for cotton. Greenville enjoys the wagon trade of Greenville, Pickens, Laurens, parts of Abbeville Anderson, Oconee and Spartanburg, besides a considerable amount from North Carolina.
