TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Noon Dispatches.

FOREIGN.

Large Purchase of American Eagles in London Austria Oppos s the Proclamation of Prince Milan as King, and Russia Won't Support it-Peace Restored Between Holland and Venezuela.

London, Sept 25 .- A Berlin dispatch o the Post, says: The Porte has given Mr Baring, the Secretary of the British legation, a seat on the mixed commission, to try persons implicated in the Bulgarian atrocities.

The Prince of Montenegro has ordered a suspension of hostilities until October 2nd.

A Renter telegram from Madrid, says: Before the end of October, six battalions of infantry, and a regiment of cayalry will arrive in Cuba. Foureen batteries will be sent in November. sd saturoteen parent buil'

A Reuter telegram from Constantinople says : There is every reason to believe that the Porte will reply favorably to the peace propositions. It is decided that an elective counsel consisting of thirty Christians, and thirty Mussulmans will be appointed to carry into effect the reforms demanded by the powers.

The Financier says: 60,000 pounds worth of American Eagles were purchased yesterday from the Bank of England at 76 shillings, 31 d per ounce. for transmission to New York, Further remittances are expected, because shipments of wheat and cotton from America are large and absorptive. The new United States funded loan in Europe is steadily increasing.

VIENNA, Sept 27 .- A political correspondence at this place concludes an official article on the proclamation of Prince Milan asking, as follows: "The Austro Hungarian Government cannot allow any doubt to be entertained on one point, that is, that it would be inclined to recognize the title of king, if it were conferred on Prince Milan; and that all political consequences that might be drawn from such an act would encounter its opposition."

St. Petersburg, Sept, 27 .- The Russian consul at Belgrade has been instructed to declare that Russia can in in no case support the proclamation of Prince Milan as King,

THE HAGUE, Sept 27 .- The Dutch foreign minister has announced in Chambers, that there has been a reconciliation between Holland and Venezuela, and that nothing now is wanting, but a formal resumption of diplomatic relations.

DAKOTA TERRITORY.

Whereabouts of the Western Troops

CHEYENNE, Sept 27 .- Col. Stanton Paymaster, U.S. A., who commanded the Volunteers and Scouts in Gen. Crooks recent campaign, and Maj. Randall, who commanded the Snake Indians both returned to this place today. The latter goes at once to Sydney to take charge of one hundred Pawness, who are to go to Fort Fetterman, and take part in the movement Northward. Col. Stanton returns with funds to pay off the expedition and troops at the Northern posts, in this department, about 60 companies in all. Gen Crook remeins at St Laramie, organizing a new campaign against the Indians, and will not leave for the field, until the work is done. Fresh troops consisting of the Fourth Cavalry and Gen McKenzie, and Infantry under Captain Pollock, will be put in the field atonce. Illill

A department of supply is established at Old Fort, Reno's troops of the recent expedition, are now at Custer City; under the command of Gen Merritt and will await new suppl es of clothing and equipments.

Lieut Luettwitz of the 3rd Cavalry and one or two others who were badly wounded, were left at Crook City in the Black Hills, with medical attendance and will come out as soon as they can bear removal.

WASHINGTON.

Aid From Chicago and Memphis for Savannah and Brunswick-Yellow Fever in New Orleans. A.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 27.-The Chicago board of trade have been active in raising relief money, and subscriptions are still going forward. The Howard Association of Memphis, Tena. have sent a thousand dollars to Brunswick, and have committees at work. There have been 26 cases, and 17 deaths at New Orleans. The disase is confined to a few squares in the upper part of the town. Only one case has

been reported since Saturday.

In a meeting of the associated press, it was resolved that the schools closed by the board should be re-opened, as there is not sufficient cause to justify their closing, and thereby causing unnecessary apprehensions.

Heavy Battle -Peace Negotiations,

PANAMA, Sept. 27 .- The battle in the Causa in which thousands were killed and as many wounded, resulted in favor of the Government. The Conservatives fled to the State of Antiaquia. The government troops occupied Cartaga.

London, Sept 27 .- A Reuter's telegram has the following from Belgrade: M Ristics, the Servian foreign minister last night sent a note to the English and Italian consuls recapitulating the complaints made against the Turks for breaches of the armistice, and pointed out that collisions would continue to recur if hostilities were merely suspended for eight days, as proposed by the Porte. The note of M Ristics concludes as follows: "I take the liberty of requesting you to make known that the Prince's government regret that it is unable to order the prolongation of a state of things which experience has shown to be impracticable." The government at the same time expresses an earnest wish for the conclusion of a formal armistice under such conditions and of such duration as would lead to the attainment of the end in view, namely:

Peace." A Reuter dispatch has also the following dispatch from Belgrade: "At a council of mmisters held yesterday over which Prince Milan presided. It was unanimously decided to reject the conditions of peace recently elaborated by the Powers, and the Porte. The council also resolved that Servia should not submit except in the event of foreign occupation, and to fight a outrance until the independence of Servia and Bosnia is secured.

NEW YORK.

Interesting News from the Boss.

NEW YORK, Sept. 27 .- - A special dispatch from Vigo says Tweed was removed at half past nine last evening from his fortress prison to the Franklin. Tweed offered very little objections to his removal. He was treated with every consideration, and the quarters of Rear Admiral case were assigned to him. Tweed's companian Wm Hunt was taken on board the Franklin, but almost immediately set at liberty. Hunt looks like a mechanic. In an interview with Hunt after his release. he was very reticent-refusing to give the history of their wanderings and still maintains that his friend Secor was not Wm M Tweed. Hunt after leaving the Franklin went immediate ly to see an American friend at the

Hotel Europe, was registered there under the name of R Sands. Sands is considered here to be Tweed's son by a Spaniard who professes to have known him in New York City. There was much opposition here to the surrender of Tweed to the American authorities and the action of the government was almost universally condemned. The hour for the departure of the Franklin is set for two o'clock this afternoon.
