Noon Dispatches.

FOREIGN.
CELEBRATED CAPTAIN DROWNED—TURCO-SERVIAN WAR.—The czar's letter to Austria—Russia soon to assume the responsibility of the war—Turkish success.
HALIFAX, Oct 2.—Obed Smith, bowman of the champion crew, and his brother are drowned. Their boat was run down by a steamer.

LONDON, Oct 2.—The Standard's Belgrade dispatch says: The Servians again furiously attacked the Turks, but were repulsed with a loss of fifteen hundred men; another battle is imminent. The Standard's Belgrade dispatch says: The Russian inundation is steadily crowding out the Servian element. The preparations at Belgrade and on the Russian border, are inconsistent with the pacific declarations of the Russian Cabinet. There are good reasons for believing that Russia will soon take the responsibility for the war, which has been waged under the flimsy cover of the Servian flag.
 A Reuter's Madrid dispatch announces a public adjudication made on Saturday, for a loan of fifteen million piasters for the Cuban war.

PARIS, Oct 2.—It is stated that the czar's letter to Francis Joseph, after describing in detail the dangers of the situation, proposes the immediate occupation of Bulgaria by the Russian army, and the occupation of Bosnia and Herzegovina by the Austrian army, and the watching of the Bosphorus by both powers. Servia to retain her independence, now admitted by the powers, and that conference alone can settle the dispute between Turkey and her vassals.

CORK, Oct 2.—A foreign boat was swamped in Young's harbor; 14 were drowned, mostly farmers and their wives.
PARIS, Oct 2.—At the election held yesterday to fill the vacant seats in the Chambers of Deputies, M. M. Chavaux-Firmin, Firrare and Mecliet, all Republicans, were chosen from the Left, Paul, Embran and Tron. The Bouaspartians whose previous elections were annulled by the Chamber of Deputies, were re-elected from Auch and St. Gaudes, respectively.
MADRID, Oct 2.—The contract for the Cuban loan of 15,000,000 piasters, has been awarded to the Bank of Costill.

RAVUSA, Oct 2.—The Montenegrin government is understood to be prepared to accept terms of peace based on an extension of Territory, although the Porte favors a continuance of the war.

LONDON, Oct 2.—The Times' correspondent at Turkish headquarters says, Thursday's battle, both as regards losses and numbers engaged was decidedly the greatest of the war. In the front, toward Morava, the Servian attack was merely directed against the Turkish bridge. The main attack was against the Turkish left army, under Hafiz and Alepasha, in order to cut off the Turkish retreat to Nisch. Sixteen Servian battalions also crossed the Morava at Dracheac, and advanced by way of Jelic against the Turkish right, under Felsepe Pasha. This double flanking movement completely failed, and the Servians by noon were driven back at all points with great loss. The Turks having acted on the defensive, their loss was only 350, the wounded having been brought in. Among the dead Servians are many Russian officers. The officers had to drive the Servian soldiers to the attack at the sword's point.

OMAHA, Oct 3.—On Saturday night water froze to the thickness of about an inch. Yesterday the weather had moderated considerably.

FOREIGN.

The Turco-Servian War.
LONDON, Oct 2.—A telegram to the Times from Belgrade says: Dispatch from headquarters army of Morova announces on Friday the Turks from Schijegowatz attacked the Servians on two sides, fighting continued all Friday. On Friday evening, both sides maintained their positions. Fighting resumed on Saturday, the Servians sustained considerable loss, the Russians displayed great bravery. Two Servians and thirty Russian officers were killed. The same dispatch says: "A rumor reached Belgrade that Turkey will accept peace conditions provided Serbia be made to do likewise." 400 Russians arrived at Belgrade on Saturday.
 A special from Berlin to the Times says, considerable portions of the Russian army have received orders to be ready for immediate concentration. The cavalry and field artillery are now on a war footing and the infantry are ready to march. The Times' Berlin correspondent gives substantially the same account of the czar's letter to the Emperor of Austria, as that given by its Paris correspondent. He also says: "The Czar proposes that Servia shall retain her present independence under Russia generals, notwithstanding serious steps taken by her. There is a pretty general conviction that Russia does not wish to go to war. The Austrian government will probably refer the question of military occupation to joint discussion of guaranteeing powers in parity, which preceded Czar's letter. The Russian diplomats left no doubt as to the kind of independence she wished accorded to Christian provinces. The provinces are to be like Servia and Roumania, all but independent under a Christian government, supported by Christian soldiers, having no connection with Portes, except financially. The Porte has threatened to hold Roumania responsible for permitting passage through her territory of Russian volunteers. The Roumanian Premier intends shortly to proceed to the Russian Court. Porte has informed its Representatives abroad that the Turks because of incessant attacks of Servians will resume the offensive."

NEW YORK.

Suicide—Jewelry Store Robbed—Riot at Church—Beecher.
NEW YORK, Oct 2.—Julius Blance, a Frenchman, by profession a musician, shot his wife and infant child, and blew his own brains out. Blance was totally blind and supported his family by giving music lessons.
 The jewelry store of Fenslin Horton, 42 Fulton street, was robbed of twenty thousand dollars worth of goods. No clue.

MEMPHIS, Oct 2.—A heavy frost last night. Little damage. It relieves all anxiety regarding yellow fever here. The attempt to arrest Moonshiner in Henry county, Tenn., resulted in killing the deputy marshal T. H. Tarbett. Another shot went through Marshall H. McAlexander's cloak. Giles the Moonshiner escaped.

CHATTANOOGA, Oct 2.

On Saturday night, the County Court House was set on fire in the office of Register of Deeds, but was extinguished with some damage to the buildings. Two books missing entirely. To-day Dr. J. S. WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, Oct 2.—The disturbance of September, are 124 millions exclusive of the interest on the public debt. The return of unemployed letters from dead letter boxes will be discontinued.
