**TELEGRAPHIC NEWS**  
**Noon Dispatches.**  
**FOREIGN.**  
**The War Cloud Darkening—The Porte's Answer—Russia's Preparation for Rapid Transportation—Austria Alarmed—2,000 Russian Volunteers for Serbia.**  
 LONDON, Oct. 4.—A Standard's Madrid dispatch says: "Gen Campas will replace Jovellar as Captain General of Cuba."  
 A Times' Vienna dispatch says that Francis Joseph's answer to the Czar was handed yesterday to General Sumarokoff. The same dispatch says that the Porte's answer to the powers are very grave, for it opens the whole question, and strengthens the opinion of those who maintained that mere persuasion was useless.  
 A Reuter telegram from Belgrade says: It is asserted that Russia has ordered her railroads leading to Turkey and Roumania to have sixteen trains daily at her disposal, and has requested Roumania to have her roads similarly equipped.  
 A News' dispatch from Bucharest says: The Pansants in the neighborhood of Batak are starving. The Turks forbid all threshing until their titles are paid.  
 A Times' Vienna dispatch says: 7,000 Russian volunteers, including 1,800 officers are in Serbia. 2,000 more have enlisted.  
 A News' Vienna dispatch says: The Peshier Lloyd, Andrassy's organ, published a warlike article yesterday, showing the necessity of Austria's defending herself against Russia's designs.  
**NEW YORK.**  
**Indians on the War Path—Terrible Outrages Committed—Important United States Circuit Court Decision.**  
 NEW YORK, Oct. 3.—A special from Paris says: The existence of Vulean is confirmed.  
 Texas advices say that 25 Indians struck the Nueces river on the 25th ultimo, and swept down the Sabine river below Frio City, attacking the ranches and sheep camps, killing three whites and seven Mexicans. They are now passing out of the Nueces river in the direction of Fort Clark, with over 100 head of horses. The citizens and soldiers are in pursuit.—This party has committed more depredations than any party for several years.  
 Judge Shipman of the United States Circuit Court has decided the following case in favor of the government: John Hallavan a distiller, made a true return of all spirits distilled by him, was regularly assessed, and the tax collected by distraint. Afterwards, the government brought suit upon his bonds to recover nearly a thousand dollars, which was the tax under section twenty, of act, July 20th, 1868.—Eighty per cent of the producing capacity of his distillery as determined by official survey, less the tax already collected. One Derlin, a surity, was alone served in the case. Derlin set up in defense, the assessment and previous collections of taxes upon true returns of spirits actually produced, and that no lawful assessment had been made. The case was tried by Court upon agreed statement of facts in substance as above.  
**FLASHES.**  
 WASHINGTON, Oct. 4.—The result in Colorado will bring Mr. Chaffee, or other of the Jones-Sharon class, to the Senate.  
 NEWFIELD, MASS., Oct. 4.—D D Curtis & Co.'s straw goods factory, is burned. Loss \$80,000.  
 MEMPHIS, Oct. 4.—The thirty-first annual session of the National Grand Lodge of colored Odd Fellows, opened with forty-six delegates.  
 BOSTON, Oct. 4.—D L Thomas, who left Bridgefield, Connecticut, yesterday morning, was pitched into a tree at Rockland, Mass., this evening, and his balloon floated out to sea.  
**COLORADO.**  
**Republican Gains in Colorado.**  
 DOVER, Oct. 4.—The Las Animas county democratic majority is 300; democratic loss 73. Boss county democratic majority is 1,000; loss 53. The republicans have undoubtedly carried the State by a decided majority, and both branches of the legislature, which elects to United States and three Presidential electors.  
**DELAWARE.**  
**Democratic Victory in Delaware—A Harbinger of November Successes.**  
 DENVER, Oct. 4.—The little election for inspectors throughout the State, is a sure indication of the course of the State, in the big election. It resulted in favor of the democrats. Senator Bayard was serenaded last night.

**WEATHER PROBABILITIES.**  
 WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 4.  
 For the South Atlantic States, rising followed by falling barometer, warmer, southerly to easterly winds, and increasing cloudiness will prevail, except falling temperature in the Carolinas.  
**COLORADO.**  
**The Election Doubtful—Both Parties Claim the State—Latest Returns Favorable to the Republicans.**  
 NEW YORK, Oct. 4.—A telegram was received from Colorado to-day, at the headquarters of the Republican National Committee, declaring that that State had gone Republican, and that the Republicans had elected the Governor and had a majority in the State Legislature.  
 At the Democratic headquarters the following dispatch was received: "Returns come in slowly but most encouragingly. We claim the State officers and Legislature."  
 CHICAGO, Oct. 4.—The Times Denver special says: The election was quietly conducted yesterday, though there was great excitement all over the State.—Gov Runt called out the State militia to suppress a reported outbreak on the Southwestern border. Indications now are that the vote will be very close. Returns favorable to the Democracy come from Colorado Springs. Majorities for the Democrats are reported from Central City, Black Hawk, Trinidad, Boulder, and other places. The State, County and Legislative tickets being successful in these places. The Democratic headquarters at Denver is the scene of the greatest excitement and the Democrats claim the election of Hughes for Governor. Patterson for Congress and the whole Legislative ticket.  
 WASHINGTON, Oct. 4.—Nothing from Colorado through regular channels since 2 o'clock this morning.  
 Later returns are favorable to the Republicans.  
**WASHINGTON.**  
**Cabinet Called—Appointments—Prominent Republican on Florida—Will go Democratic.**  
 WASHINGTON, Oct. 4.—The President and family are expected to-morrow. The Cabinet has been called for Friday. All members will be present except Cameron and Tuff.  
 The President has commissioned Ida Walsh, postmaster at Hot Springs, Arkansas, and Wm S Cannon, at Spartanburg, C. H., S. C.  
 The Star has the following among its political notes: Solon Robinson, for many years the agricultural editor of the New York Tribune, and now a resident of Florida, says, although a staunch supporter of Hayes, that Florida will certainly go democratic, and that he will cast his vote for the Democratic State ticket. It is time, he thinks that Florida had an honest State government. The democratic nominees for Congress will also be elected.  
 The President has pardoned Jos H Hill, sentenced by the Indiana Circuit Court to 2½ years and \$500 fine for whiskey fraud.  
 The agricultural department reports a decrease in the stock of hogs in the pork packing districts in east Mississippi. Small increase in Iowa, and a large increase in west of the Missouri. The average for corn in the Western region is made five per cent less in numbers than last year, with a very small decrease in condition.  
**OHIO.**  
**Grand Son of a President Stabs his Sweet-heart.**  
 CINCINNATI, Oct. 4.—Wm Henry Harrison, a grand son of the famous President entered the residence of John H Moore, of Boone county, Ky., and made a proposal of marriage to Mary, Mr Moore's eldest daughter, and being rejected, stabbed her nine times in the breast and face. Fatal result is feared. Harrison is aged about 40. His last wife died about a year ago. He had been visiting Miss Moore frequently but received no encouragement, on account of his dissipation.  
**GEORGIA.**  
**Democrats Victorious—Radical Vote Hardly Worth Counting.**  
 AUGUSTA, Oct. 4.—The election passed off quietly. About twenty-eight hundred votes were polled, of which Colquitt received twenty-two hundred and Narcross six hundred.  
**MASSACHUSETTS.**  
**Hoar Nominated to Beat Beast Butler.**  
 BOSTON, Oct. 4.—The movement to nominate a candidate to run against Butler in the 7th District was consummated to-day by a meeting of prominent citizens of the District. Judge Hoar accepted the nomination.

**KENTUCKY.**  
**The Postal Commission.**  
 LOUISVILLE, Oct. 4.—The Postal Commission left for Atlanta last night. At their session here a number of prominent business men appeared before the commission and made suggestions concerning postal transportation. A majority declared in favor of fast mails advocating two daily trains from New York, one in the afternoon, one in the morning saying the whole South would be materially benefited thereby.  
**COLORADO AS A RADICAL AGENT.**—Mention has already been made of Gen. Pleasanton's wonderful experiments on the influence of the blue ray in developing plants and animals and curing disease, and it is now stated that a Dr. Ponza, the physician in charge of the insane asylum at Alexandria, Italy, employs color as a remedial agent. He puts melancholy lunatics into red rooms, and violent maniacs into blue rooms. The results are reported to be almost incredible.  
**AN OCEAN CABLE IN THE PACIFIC.**—The Asiatic Telegraph Company, chartered by the last Congress, propose to complete the last link in telegraphic communication around the world by laying a submarine cable in the Pacific ocean to communicate with Asiatic and American lines. The company is required to begin to lay the line within three years from August 15th last. The written acceptance of the terms of the act has been filed already with the secretary of State. These terms exact equal privileges with foreign governments and citizens.  
**A FRIEND IN NEED.**—The Hon. Mr. Leach, of North Carolina, to whose zeal and eloquence we already owe so much, has agreed to join the Democratic canvassers, for a ten days' campaign, in the North and Northwestern Counties of this State, beginning on the 24th inst.
