Noon Dispatches.

FOREIGN.

The War Cloud Growing Larger and Darker—Austria's Course if Russia Occupies Bulgaria—English View of the Porte's Answer.

LONDON, Oct 6.—The Times' Belgrade dispatch says: The English policy is a leading factor in Serbian calculations. The war party expects Russia to declare war with the approval of England.

A Times' Berlin dispatch says: Should Russia persist in occupying Bulgaria, Austrian troops will not only occupy Bosnia and Herzegovina, but will operate against the Serbians. The Turkish Generals have resumed operations, but are avoiding Alexinatz and Deligrade, and are penetrating north, into the eastern counties.

The Roumanian government keeps thirty thousand soldiers nearby to protect the country. Preparations are making to transport these troops to the Bessarabian frontier.

The News' Vienna dispatch says: Italian journals freely discuss the gaining of territory from Austria. South of Tyral, should Austria seek territorial aggrandizement in Turkey. It is reported that the Pan Slavist emissaries in Bulgaria, are inciting the Mussulmans to deeds of bloodshed, with the view of causing decisive political action.

PARIS, Oct 6.—Henry Jerome Bertie, a musician, is dead.

LONDON, Oct 6.—A Reuter telegram, the latest from Belgrade says: The Porte's rejection of the peace proposals are received with satisfaction, as hopes are entertained of Russian intervention.

NEW YORK.

England Growing Positive—Train Thrown Off the Track by a Horse.

NEW YORK, Oct 6.—A cable special says: Sir Henry Elliott, the British ambassador at Constantinople, has been instructed to notify the Porte, that unless the English proposals are unreservedly accepted, the British government will withdraw all her support from Turkey, and merely guarantee Constantinople against Russian occupation.

HORNELLVILLE, Oct 6.—The engine, baggage, smoking, and one other car of the passenger train bound West, was thrown from the track on the Western Branch of the Erie Railway, 3 miles East of Genesee, at 11.25 last night by striking a horse. Engineer Clark was killed. The fireman, brakeman, and a tramp were badly injured. Three passengers were slightly injured.

INDIANA.

The Independent Nominations' Muddle.

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 6.—At eleven o'clock to-night, the Independent State Central Committee nominated Judge Henry Harrington of Indianapolis, for Governor, in place of Hon. Anson Walcott, declined. They also passed resolutions denouncing Mr. Walcott as a traitor to the Independent party, and charging him with having been corrupted with Republican money.

Ezro Hays, the Independent candidate for Congress in the Fifth District, to-day also declined to run.

At a late hour last night the Chairman of the Independent State Central Committee authorized the statement, that the action of the committee in nominating Judge Harrington for Governor, vice Anson Walcott, declined, was without official character, and is void; no call for such a meeting having been made.

MARYLAND.

Arrested for Intimidation.

BALTIMORE, Oct 6.—A Supervisor of Registration and three United State Deputy Marshals have been arrested, charged with the intimidation of voters. The arrests caused considerable excitement in political circles.

FLASHES.

NEWARK, Oct. 6.—Miss Dosar, Miss Crane and a boy died from eating toad stools at Connecticut farms. Miss Pool who ate sparingly will probably recover.

BOSTON, Oct 6.—Henry J Sawyer, colored, was arrested to-day charged with beating a woman, supposed to be his wife, to death.

OHIO.

Railroad Collision.

CINCINNATI, Oct 6.—A special passenger train, East, containing soldiers homeward bound from reunion at Indianapolis on the Indianapolis, Cincinnati & La Fayette Railroad, collided with the freight train 6 miles East of Gremsburg, Indiana, this morning. A number of the passengers and employees were injured, and conductor Allen, of the passenger train is not expected to recover.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 6.

For the South Atlantic States, falling followed by rising barometer, brisk and high southerly winds, veering to northerly, decided fall in temperature, and cloudy or raining succeeded by clearing weather.

FOREIGN.

More about the Spanish Insurrection.

HAVANA, Oct 5.—Additional particulars of the capture of Los Tumas by the insurgents under Vicente Gorcin during the night of Sept 22, says about five hundred insurgents headed by Vincente Gorcin attacked Los Tumas on three sides. A portion of the Spanish troops at the front surprised were made prisoners near the fort; the remainder were distributed by Gorcin in various houses, while some citizens and volunteers fortified themselves in the court house. During the confusion attending the attack, Gorcin was assassinated by his own soldiers. Upon capturing the fort the insurgents turned its guns on the court house, disabling fifty-four men, after which they took possession of the city. Vicente Gorcin then sent a message to the Spanish Governor in Haguin notifying him that he had 240 Spanish prisoners and 105 wounded, who would receive proper attention if the Government sent necessary resources. After appropriating everything they needed, the insurgents left the place. This affair was briefly mentioned in the Diario, which ascribes the disaster to the carelessness of the garrison, or connivance of the inhabitants with the insurgents. Commenting on the event it says: It shall henceforth publish unfavorable news, as experience has shown that keeping back former reports produces unfavorable results. The distress in the jurisdiction of Puerto Principe increases and the people of the city of Puerto Principe talk again of its probable abandonment by the Spaniards.

LONDON, Oct 6.—A Reuter from Belgrade yesterday says: It is expected now that Russia will present ultimatum to be followed by declaration war. Ragasa rear guard Monkhtar Pasha's force while returning towards Herzegovina, was attacked by Montenegrins. The Turks being defeated fell back on Garica.

WASHINGTON.

No Cabinet Meeting—Appointments on Monetary Committees—Colorado in Doubt and Probably Democratic.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6.—The President has returned.

Tyner and Morrill were at the white house, but no formal cabinet meeting was held.

General Dix on account of age has declined the place as expert on the monetary committee. The position will be tendered Hon R M T Hunter of Virginia. In 1852 Hunter made an elaborate report. He then favored the double standard. It is stated on good authority that the commission stands four to two in favor of double standard.

B M Hughes, Democratic candidate for Governor of Colorado, telegraphed yesterday, "I think I am elected Governor by a few majority and that Paterson is elected to Congress Returns come in slowly but are satisfactory."

More About the Election.

DENVER, Oct 6.—Deducting from total of Republican majorities which official figures assure to be correct, all that has been claimed by the Democratic State Committee leaves net Republican majorities in the State at 1200. The Legislature will certainly be Republican.

VIRGINIA.

Aid for the Yellow Fever Sufferers.

RICHMOND, Oct 6.—The canvassers appointed at the citizens meeting last week to solicit aid for yellow fever sufferers at Savannah and Brunswick, collected nearly \$2,200. Several of the committee have yet to report. It is estimated that as much again has been sent by private subscription direct.

NEW YORK.

Death from Yellow Fever—Suspension of a Prominent Speculator.

NEW YORK, Oct 6.—It is stated that Hugh McShaw employed on the steamer Charleston, playing between New York and Charleston, died at his home in Brooklyn of yellow fever. He reached here September 22nd, from Charleston and went home ill, dying last Wednesday. The building where he lived has been disinfected and the clothing burned.

H A Patterson one of the most active speculators at the exchange reported his suspension to the board. She was a conspicuous caller of the coal and other stocks. Liabilities unknown.
