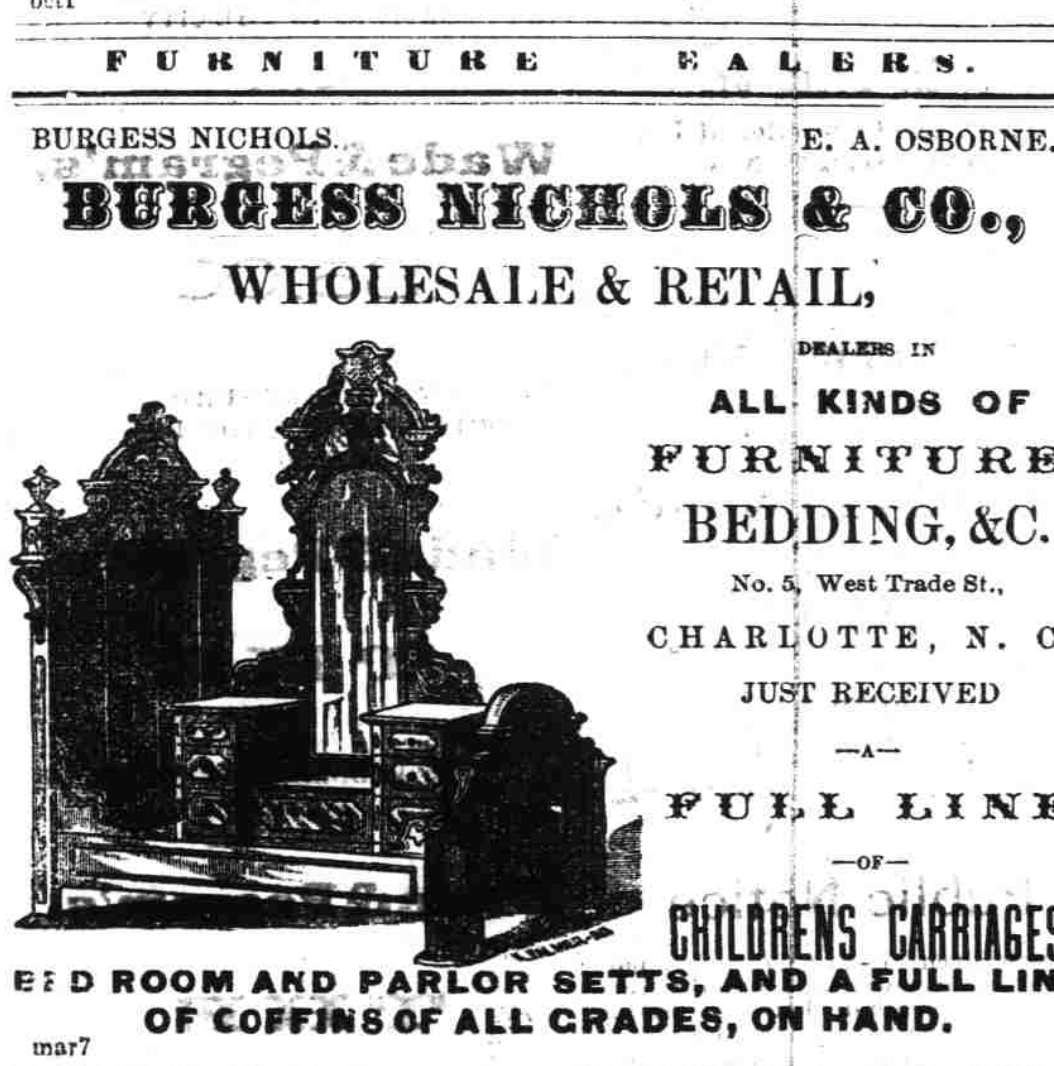

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

Noon Dispatches.

FOREIGN.

Turco-Servian War—Servia an Armistice—Austria and England must Support if Russia Invades Her—The Situation Grows more Perplexing.

LONDON, Oct. 7.—The Standard's dispatch says: Captain General Jovellier has positively resigned. Gen Campas leaves for Havana this month, taking with him several Generals. Campas is entrusted with discretionary powers.

The Times' Belgrade dispatch says: Servia has renewed her application for a month's armistice. This application is probably made with a view of the further prosecution of the war under circumstances more promising for Russia. A month's armistice, means a suspension of fighting for the winter, as operations could not be renewed until the end of November.

The Times' Berlin dispatch says little hope is entertained that Turkey will accept an armistice. Turkey is put on her mettle by the Russian occupation scheme, and will not accept England's programme as long as Russia threatens thus to force terms. If Russia persists in what is a practical dismemberment of Turkey, England and Austria must assist.

The Standard's Berlin dispatch says that Ignatieff, the Russian minister is daily expected at Constantinople, and will make a final effort to induce the Porte to accept Russia's conditions. Should the Porte refuse, he has orders to depart.

The Standard's Constantinople dispatch says: The Turkish government is so exasperated by the entrance of Russians into Servia, that she finds it impossible to accept the terms of the powers. The Sultan favored the terms but would have been deposed had he accepted them.

The Times' Constantinople dispatch says: It is asserted that the Porte has asked Earl Derby, to propose new terms; but Derby refused, advising the Porte to accept unconditionally and immediately the terms already made.

The Times' Belgrade dispatch says: In the battle of the 28th ultimo, a battalion named after Princess Natalia went into action 900 strong, at roll call next day forty answered.

A dispatch the Reuter telegram Company from Constantinople says: The Porte's answer to the proposals of the powers, was formally communicated to the ambassadors yesterday.

The Sheffield telegraph to-day publishes the following: In consequence of the injury to the Sheffield trade by America's heavy protective duties, representatives have been sent to Earl Cornaran, Secretary for the colonies suggesting that heavy import duties be imposed in retaliation on the American producer, both in England and her colonies. To these representatives Lord Cornaran replied on Friday, that as will be seen, on reflecting the proposal is not one which her majesty's government could entertain.

The tone of Lord Derby's dispatch to Sir Henry Elliott regarding the Bulgarian atrocities, issued last night, is very severe. He points out the advisability of placing the disturbed districts immediately under an energetic governor, who should either be a Christian or assisted by Christian counsellors. This arrangement should be provisional, and without prejudice to any future arrangements which may be made, in concert with the powers.

SOUTH CAROLINA.

Chamberlain Growing Desperate—His Last Resort.

CHARLESTON, Oct. 7.—The News and Courier correspondent telegraphs on the 6th inst. from Columbia: Gov Chamberlain has determined to issue a proclamation to-morrow or next day, ordering all the white military clubs or organizations to surrender their arms and disband at once. In case of refusal, he will next proclaim the State in a condition of domestic violence, and inform President Grant to that effect, and call upon him to suppress it.

PENNSYLVANIA.

Additional Centennial Supplemental Awards—Suspension.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 7.—The following are additional supplemental awards: S N Drake, New Orleans, patent cotton ties. Miss Annie T Auerback, Troy, Ala., bed spread of satin and silk; croquet work. Miss Jennie Wettemore, Charleston, S C; worsted work, a picture of Gen Washington.

WASHINGTON.

Appointment.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6.—The President to-day appointed LaFayette McLaws Postmaster at Augusta, Ga., vice Chas H Prince, suspended. The previous appointment of McLaws as Postmaster at Savannah revoked, and Clark was continued in that office.

LOUISIANA.

Quarantine Against New Orleans Removed—Freight Train Collision.

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 7.—A meeting of the medical profession at Galveston resolved that the necessity for quarantine against New Orleans was no longer exists, and that the quarantine should be abolished.

Two freight trains on the Jackson Railroad. Eleven cars, partly loaded with powder, oil and matches, were burned or blown to pieces.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—Dr. J J Jones, formerly of New Orleans, is dead.

DENVER, Oct. 7.—The Republican majority will be about 1,304.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 7.

For the South Atlantic States, higher barometer, northwest to northwinds and decidedly colder clear or partly cloudy weather will prevail, with rains areas in Florida, and heavy frosts from North Carolina to Northern Georgia.

GEORGIA.

Eighty Thousand Democratic Majority—Man Murdered—Sad Accident.

ATLANTA, Oct. 7.—The Democratic majority in ninety-two counties is sixty thousand with forty-five counties to hear from, which will make the majority eighty thousand at least. The Legislature sends 43 Democrats and one Republican. The House all Democratic except six Republicans, including 3 colored.

AUGUSTA, Oct. 7.—Edward H Murphy white, shot Jupiter Grant, colored, to-day, about a chair. Grant died and Murphy fled. The coroners jury returned a verdict of murder.

At a political meeting held at Summer Hill, Aiken county, South Carolina to-day, Theodore Pardue was killed by being run over by a piece of artillery used for firing salutes.

NEW YORK.

Coin Received—Democrats Claim Colorado—Vessel Burned.

NEW YORK, Oct. 7.—Seventy thousand pounds of gold coin and Russian coin were received at the United States assay office to-day making a total of two hundred and thirty thousand pounds to date. Four hundred and fifty thousand dollars of American gold coin was received at the United States treasury last night from Europe.

Another dispatch has received at the National Democratic headquarters to-day from Denver, claiming Colorado by 500 majority.

The German bark Europe, having sides coupled at dock took fire. A quantity of truck was burned. After the fire, five men were found in the hole smothered to death. All the workmen on the vessel, it is supposed could not find their way out on account of the smoke. All leave destitute families. Another workman was fatally and another seriously burned.

MARYLAND.

Locomotive Union Elect Officers.

BALTIMORE, Oct. 7.—The 11th annual convention of the grand international locomotive firemen elected the following officers: Grand Master, Hugh Hoffman, Schenectady, N Y; Vice Grand Master, J C Rowan, Madison, Michigan; Grand Secretary, J Hurban, Chicago, Ill; Grand Treasurer, F Wellows, Clinton, Iowa; Grand Marshall, J Ramba, Philadelphia, Pa; Grand Guide, Samuel Cowan, St Albans, Vt; Grand Chaplain, J A Cockley, Baltimore.

SOUTH CAROLINA.

An Infamous Proclamation and Outrage Upon Liberty.

COLUMBIA, Oct. 7.—Gov Chamberlain issued proclamation to-day. It has become impracticable in this judgment to enforce by ordinary course or judicial process the laws of the State within certain counties, and it having been made known to him that illegal organizations known as rifle clubs exist in the State, and as they are forbidden by State laws he forbids their existence and orders they be disbanded within three days. If disregarded he will exhaust his own powers and then appeal to the United States government.

FOREIGN.

Efforts for Peace.

LONDON, Oct. 7.—A Reuter from Belgrade says: It is stated in diplomatic circles that Mr. Restics, Servian Minister for foreign affairs is making great efforts to obtain peace or an armistice.
