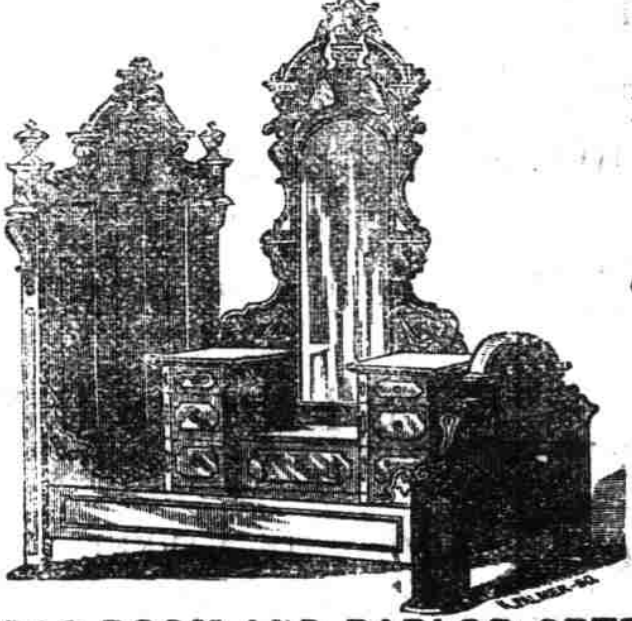

## TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

### Noon Dispatches.

#### FOREIGN.

**Turco-Servian War—Another Conference of the Powers Probable—Montenegro Victory—Russia Continues Arming—Bismarck Supports Andrassey.**

LONDON, Oct. 9.—The Austria desired conference shall consist of ambassadors representing all the signatory powers. Italy and France consent, and Germany's answer is waited for. The Porte's objection to a formal armistice is, that it would virtually accord to Serbia belligerent right. It is reported that ex-Sultan Murad is dying.

Russian emigration to Serbia continues at the rate of 200 to 300 per week. The military preparations of Serbia continue.

Sir John Young, Governor General of Canada, aged from 68 to 72 is dead. It is stated that Bismarck endorses Andrassey's refusal to a joint occupation. Andrassey will resign, if occupation is resolved upon in higher quarters.

The Times' dispatch from Barcelona says: Gen Martinez Campas has not yet accepted the Captain Generalship of Cuba, but Gen Jovellar will be recalled any way.

The new wharf together with the flour and rice mills at Rathfrith were burned on Saturday. Loss, \$450,000.

A dispatch from Ragusa to the Reuter's Telegram Company says: On Saturday night, the Montenegrins having received a reinforcement of 2,500 men, attacked Maakhtar Pasha and compelled him to retreat. It is stated that 850 Turks were killed while the Montenegrins' loss in killed and wounded was 115. The opposing forces are now confronting each other on a line extending eight miles.

A dispatch from Delgrade to the Daily News says: Gen Tchernoyeff has demanded, that all Servians between the ages of 18 and 50 years be called out in anticipation of the renewal of hostilities in the Spring.

A Reuter dispatch from Paris says: According to positive information received here, no power has up to the present, formally proposed a conference.

NOTE.—Though there is generally a mere hopeful feeling, everything is at present in suspense, and the newspapers are filled with nothing but vague contradicting surmises, pending the Porte's definitive answer to the proposals of the powers, which is anxiously awaited.

BUCHAREST, Oct. 9.—The Prince of Roumania has ordered both the standing army, and reserves to assemble for manoeuvre.

#### OHIO.

**Destructive Fire in Cleveland—Grain Elevator and Other Buildings Burned.**

CLEVELAND, Oct. 9.—A large elevator of Otis & York was burned this morning. A total loss.

LATER.—A fire broke out early this morning in the grain elevator of Otis & York, on River street. The building and contents were entirely destroyed. The building was occupied by the Michigan Central Steamboat Line, a railroad hotel and several frame buildings occupied as saloons, were also burned. The origin of the fire is unknown. The loss of Otis & York on the building is \$75,000. It is insured for \$35,000. The Michigan Central Steamboat Line, building, \$25,000, contents \$15,000; uninsured. Loss on other buildings and contents about \$20,000. The co-operative stove company also lose about \$4,000 on stoves stored in the elevator, on which there was no insurance. During the progress of the fire on River street, a fire broke out in the 2nd Presbyterian church on Superior street, between 3rd street and public square, which was almost entirely destroyed. The loss is about \$70,000; insured. It is supposed the church caught from sparks from the elevator fire.

#### NEW YORK.

**More Troops for Cuba—Compas Not to be Captain General.**

NEW YORK, Oct. 9.—A special to the Herald from Madrid says: The draft is proceeding for the 24 thousand soldiers for Cuba. The draft was begun yesterday without disturbance, and these men will soon follow the 16,000 already on their way. Gen. Martin Campas goes out to Cuba as commander in Chief of the Spanish army which is to crush, the insurrection, and tell further. Gen Jovellar is to continue Captain General.

#### FLASHES.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—Cameron left Chicago hitherward last night.

MEMPHIS, Oct. 9.—A private telegram from Peru bluff, Arkansas, says that a fire there last night consumed three business blocks.

## Mid-Night Dispatches.

### WEATHER PROBABILITIES.

#### WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 9.

For the South Atlantic and East Gulf States, slightly higher followed by falling barometer, slowly rising temperature, northeast winds, shifting to southerly or northern portions, and partly cloudy weather will prevail, with occasional coast rains.

#### FOREIGN.

**More about the Cuban and Other Tiresome Wars.**

LONDON, Oct. 9.—In connection with conflicting reports relative to the Captain Generalship of Cuba, a correspondent of the Standard at Madrid, Oct. 3rd explains that General Martinez Campas was summoned to Madrid on the 3rd of Oct., in consequence of the receipt by the Governor of the news of the recent capture of Las Tunis by the Cuban insurgents. General Martinez Campas conferred with the war minister and Senor Canovas del Castillo, prime minister, and stated the terms on which he alone was willing to assume the Captain Generalship. These terms included a draft of 15,000 men from the Spanish army, to be shipped before November in addition to 25,000 already under orders. He also demanded entire power to deal with all questions of reform and taxation without appeal. A cabinet council to which these terms were submitted, raised several objections because of the heavy exactions. The Maderado party particularly do not approve of Gen Martinez Campas leaving Spain, because they desire him to become premier in the place of Canovas del Castillo. This cause and the intrigue of Gen Jovellar's friends are the principal obstacles which still prevent Gen Martinez Campas' appointment. Partisans of Canovas del Castillo are proportionally anxious to send Gen Campas to Cuba.

A Reuter dispatch from Madrid, dated yesterday, says the rumor of Gen Jovellar's resignation of Captain Generalship of Cuba is contradicted. A Barcelona correspondent of the Times of Oct 5, writes: Troops for Cuba are embarking in small bodies. They do not volunteer as before, but are in many cases chosen by lot.

#### WASHINGTON.

**South Carolina Conspirators Interview the President—Departments Close—Appeal from Collector's Decision Denied—Supreme Court.**

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—The President goes to New York to-morrow for several days.

The South Carolina Senators, Robertson and Patterson had an interview with the President to-day.

The departments close the 13th for unveiling McPherson's statue.

The Treasury department has received and considered sundry appeals from the decisions of the Collector of customs at Boston, assessing duty on sugars imported at that port subsequent to the promulgation of the treaty between the United States and Hawaiian Islands, providing for free duty on certain articles including. Importations to which appeals refer are from Dominican Republic and Porto Rico, and the claim for free entry is under treaty stipulations that no other or higher duties shall be imposed than on like articles from any other foreign country. Claims denied.

#### VIRGINIA.

**Governor Kemper Declines to Proclaim a Day for Virginia.**

RICHMOND, Oct. 9.—Governor Kemper in reply to an invitation to name a Virginia day at the Centennial by proclamation has written a letter declining to do so. His chief reasons are the poverty of the people to respond in appropriate manner and that it is not customary in Virginia to use official proclamations for such purposes.

## A Proclamation by the Governor.

### \$400 REWARD.

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT,  
Raleigh, N. C., Aug. 23, 1876.

WHEREAS, Official information has been received at this Department that a colored man, name unknown, of the description given below, late of the county of Mecklenburg, stands charged with the crime of rape, or attempted rape, on Mrs. Mary A. Beatty.

And Whereas, it appears that the said unknown has fled the State, or so conceals himself that the ordinary process of law cannot be served upon him.

Now, therefore, I, CURTIS H. BROGDEN, Governor of the State of North Carolina, by virtue of authority in me vested by law, do issue this my proclamation, offering a reward of Four Hundred Dollars, for the apprehension and delivery of such person as shall be identified by Mrs. Mary A. Beatty, as the party who committed or attempted to commit a rape on her person on the 19th of August, 1876, to the Sheriff of Mecklenburg county, at the Court House in Charlotte, and I do enjoin all officers of the State and all good citizens to assist in bringing said criminal to justice.
