TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

Noon Dispatches.

FOREIGN.

Europe Perplexed over the Turco-Servian Question—Montenegro will act with Servia—The Czar will not Abdicate.
 LONDON, Oct. 14.—The Duke of Abercorn has resigned the Vice-Royship of Ireland. The Duke of Marlborough succeeds him.

The Times, in its leader, declares that if Russia refuses the armistice, or is the means of its refusal, she becomes the enemy of Europe.

A Berlin correspondent of the Times says: Italy in her alliance with Russia has in view, also, the acquisition of Tunis. A recent telegram from Vienna says an understanding between Russia and Austria on the Eastern question is considered certain, notwithstanding contrary rumors.

A Reuter's telegram from St. Petersburg says: The rumors of the Czar's contemplated abdication is officially denied.

A Reuter telegram from Paris says: In consequence of the explanations which have been exchanged between the Powers, it appears probable that the Porte's request for the appointment of commissioners to arrange the details of an armistice, will be acceded to. It is expected that the military attaches of the various embassies at Constantinople, will be appointed the commissioners.

A Daily News, Vienna dispatch announces that the Italian Ambassador in that city has been instructed to express the regret of his government for the boastful and war like language of some of the Italian newspapers.

PARIS, Oct. 14.—A dispatch to the Russian telegraph agency at St. Petersburg, on Thursday night, says the Powers have not been able yet, to agree as to the reception of the armistice proposition, but several of them are disposed to accept it.

CETINJE, Oct. 14.—Montenegro's official journal declares that Montenegro will not accept either an armistice or peace, except in concert with Servia, because Montenegro, like Servia, is bound to continue the war until the liberation of the Christians is accomplished.

TORONTO, Oct. 14.—The schooner Maggie Hunter, of Oswego, hither bound, is reported founded with all on board.

NEW YORK.

Chamberlain's Frantic Cries for Troops Reaches the "Great Sachem"—Dare He Respond?—Desperado Captured.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14.—A special Denver, Colorado says: LaPlatte county, claimed by Republicans, gives 100 Democratic majority. The Republicans elect State ticket by a small majority, but the official vote is required to decide the election of Congressmen.

NEW YORK, Oct. 14.—A Kansas City dispatch reports that Frank James, one of the Clay county desperadoes, was arrested last night at the house of a physician, about ten miles from that city, where he was under treatment for a gunshot wound.

LATER.—The President and Attorney General Taft returned this morning. Secretary Cameron has gone to Philadelphia and will not return until tomorrow.

The consideration of Chamberlain's request for troops for South Carolina is postponed until Tuesday.

The New York Herald's Washington dispatch says: The written application of Governor Chamberlain for troops to aid him in enforcing the law, as chief magistrate of the State of South Carolina, arrived here to-day, and was placed before the authorities. The answer of the Secretary of War after consultation was, that he should await the return of the President, who is expected to-morrow.

KENTUCKY.

Forty-Seven Thousand Drunks Destroyed.

LOUISVILLE, Oct. 14.—H. D. Owings' bonded warehouse in Edmundson Co. is burned, with 400 bbls whiskey. Owings, being absent, the warehouse was in charge of government store keepers.

MASSACHUSETTS.

Terrible Crime—Murdered and Then Burned.

BOSTON, Oct. 14.—The house of a man named Trim, at Bucksport, Maine, has been burned. Trim's remains were found in the ruins. A bloody trace was found leading from the house to the rear of the barn. It is suspected that Trim's daughter, Mrs. Thayer, and her daughter were murdered, though the bodies have not been found. Mrs. Thayer had eight hundred dollars in the house.

FLASHES.

NORFOLK, Oct. 14.—The Bay Line steamer Florida, burst a cylinder and broke the cylinder head and walking beam; no one hurt.

Mid-Night Dispatches.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 14.

For the South Atlantic States, rapidly rising barometer, brisk and high northwest to northeast winds, decidedly colder, cloudy or partly cloudy weather and rain early will prevail, with heavy frosts on Monday morning in the northwestern portions.

Russia, Objects to the Six Month's Armistice—More Russian Officers for Servia—Servia wont Agree to the Armistice.

LONDON, Oct. 14.—A Reuter's telegram from Paris, announces that Russia objects to the six month's armistice, proposed by Turkey, and demands that a fresh six week's armistice be imposed upon the Belligerents.

A Paris correspondent of the Times, takes a sanguine view of the situation. He says, doubtless, in consequence of the Porte's conciliatory attitude, the proposition in regard to the armistice will receive a unanimously favorable reception.

A Belgrade dispatch to the Times says: Fifty Russian officers, some of whom have held high positions on the Russian staff, arrived here yesterday.

A dispatch from Vienna to the Reuter Telegram Company, says none of the great powers have yet given their consent to the conditions of an armistice proposed by Turkey. Russia regards Turkey's reference to the influx of Foreign volunteers, as a direct indictment of her policy. Prince Milan has confidently informed several of the Foreign representatives at Belgrade, that the conditions of the armistice which refer to Servia cannot be taken into consideration.

A Berlin dispatch to the Pall Mall Gazette, says all the Powers, except Russia, have received the Turkish armistice proposal favorably.

BRUSSELS, Oct. 14.—The report that some of the creditors of Turkey have seized 202 krupp guns which were being shipped at Antwerp for Turkey, is without foundation.

WASHINGTON.

\$5,000 Donated to the Library of Virginia—Taft Likely to be Balked.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 14.—W. W. Corcoran has donated five thousand dollars to enlarge the library of the University of Virginia, through Postmaster General Tyner.

The present application comes direct to the President from Gov. Chamberlain, who asserts his inability to prevent domestic violence. Some parties have intimated to the authorities, that trouble will probably arise in the Second and Fourth Districts of Virginia, and suggests that the marines should be held in readiness, and a company of troops sent from Fortress Monroe to Norfolk. In giving this last item, the authorities withhold the names of persons making the suggestions. There are indications that Judge Taft will be overruled in his disposition to act on such a suggestion.

NEW YORK.

Gossam Gossip.

NEW YORK, Oct. 14.—The Atlanta, owned by William Astor, won the Cape May challenge cup, beating the Sam'l. J. Colgate, and Idler two hours and fifty minutes. This is the first time the Idler has been beaten in two years.

Gen Rufus King, formerly Minister to Rome, is dead.

Mrs. Daniel Goldschmidt, arrived on the Abyssinia, had on her person \$20,000 worth of diamonds. Goldschmidt, who arrived previously, had his baggage seized. Goldschmidt had failed in business in Mauiem. The case involved is parties implicated for attempted smuggling.

CINCINNATI, Oct. 14.—The official vote in the First Congressional District is: Saylor, dem. 14,144. Force, rep. 13,474. Saylor's majority 670. The vote in the Second District is: Banning, dem. 14,133. Mathews, rep. 14,058. Banning's majority 75.
