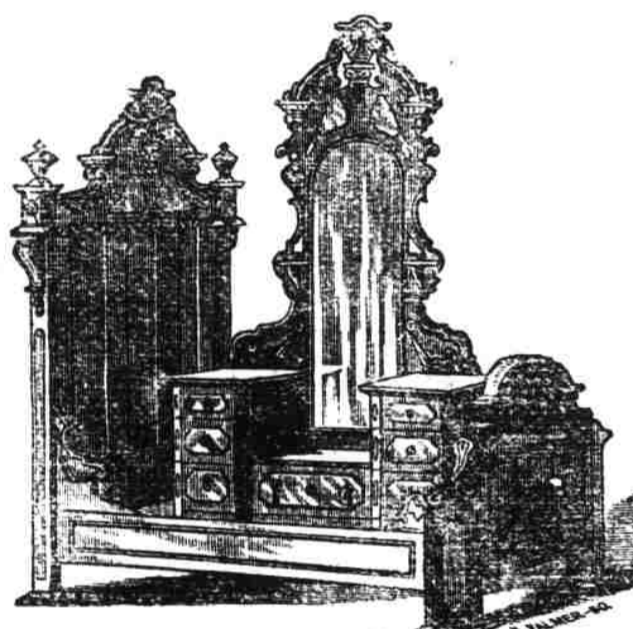

Noon Dispatches.

FOREIGN.

The Eastern War but a Question of Time—Russia Still Preparing for the Worst—Nothing Certain Yet.

LONDON, Oct. 17.—A Times Berlin special says: After spending twenty million rubles in three months attempting to maintain the normal national paper currency...

VIENNA, Oct. 17.—A correspondent of the Daily News telegraphs as follows: I believe the Czar favors peace, but it is known that the Empress and Czar's wife are strongly attached to the national party...

The Times' Belgrade dispatch says: The government states that 4,000 Cossacks arrived, they left Kladova last week, bringing 700 horses. They marched to Deligrade. A thousand more were expected yesterday.

A Berlin dispatch to the Times says: Col Detaskoff's mission in behalf of Russia, will address itself particularly to the military party, in the Austrian Court, who advise making a common cause with Russia...

LONDON, Oct. 17.—The Pall Mall Gazette this evening, in a leading article contends that Russia is at present actually at war with Turkey...

A special dispatch to the Standard from Belgrade, states that the unseasonable heart is causing much sickness. Last week an outbreak of the plague occurred at Agangalavatz, which killed 318 Servians.

A correspondent of the Times at Belgrade, discussing the situation says: Every diplomatic agent here believes we are on the eve of a great eastern war.

The only difference of opinion among them, is as to whether it will commence in the Spring or almost immediately. All outward indications seem to favor the latter idea...

A St Petersburg letter to the Times, dated Oct. 11, says: Doubtless, the general impression here is, that Russia is on the eve of a long wished for struggle with Turkey.

A special to the Times from Vienna states that the English and French governments, especially the former, have decidedly pronounced for the acceptance of the six months armistice.

A Reuter telegram from Bucharest announces that a convention has been concluded between the Roumanian and Russian Railway Companies...

SOUTH CAROLINA.

Black Bands Fire on Unarmed White Men—Two Whites Killed and Fourteen Wounded—Relief for the Helpless People.

CHARLESTON, Oct. 17.—Negroes belonging to the State militia had their arms concealed near the point of meeting at Cainhoy, 9 miles from Charleston...

SYRACUSE, Oct. 17.—The business portion of Jordan Oneida Co is burned. Loss sixty thousand dollars.

KENTUCKY.

Destructive Fire—\$600,000 Worth of Property Burned.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 17. For the South Atlantic and East Gulf States, stationary followed by rising barometer, winds mostly from North to East.

WASHINGTON.

The Royal Proclamation—The Plot of the Conspirators Grows Darker—A Bayonet to be Placed at Every Reformer's Throat.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 17.—Full Cabinet except Fish Chandler leaves to-night for New York.

The President has issued a proclamation. After a long preliminary referring to the State of affairs in South Carolina the proclamation commands all persons engaged in said unlawful and insurrectionary proceedings to "disperse and retire peacefully to their respective homes within 3 days from this date..."

The proclamation is regarded as a mere formality, and no further steps are contemplated. No additional troops have been ordered to South Carolina.

Maj. Gen Chandler will relieve Lieut Col Jas A Ekin as chief quartermaster of the department of the South.

WAR DEPARTMENT. Washington City, Oct 17, 76. Gen W T Sherman, Commanding the U S Army.

SIR:—In view of the existing condition of affairs in South Carolina, there is a possibility that the proclamation of the President of this date may be disregarded. To provide against such a contingency you will immediately order all the available force in the military division of the Atlantic to report to Gen Ruger, commanding at Columbia, South Carolina...

ALABAMA.

Another Journalist Dead. MONTGOMERY, Oct 17.—M M Cooke, for several years past one of the editors of the Montgomery Advertiser died last night, after a long illness, of consumption. He was regarded as among the most brilliant newspaper writers of the country.

KENTUCKY.

Destructive Fire in Louisville.

LOUISVILLE, Oct. 17.—A block valued at \$150,000 was burned; insured at \$50,000. Geo W Wick's loss is small and is covered by insurance; Alexander's hotel, valued at ninety thousand, insurance \$35,000; Carson, Daniel & Co, grocers, loss sixty thousand, insurance \$35,000; Davis & Hadden, liquor dealers, fifty thousand, fully insured. Brandies, Landers & Co, cotton dealers five thousand; Hams & Hick, clothing, sixty thousand, insurance \$40,000. Other losses unknown.

FROM COLORADO.—Saturday afternoon, while considerable anxiety was felt by politicians to hear later returns from Colorado, a young man, having an open newspaper in his hand, boarded a Cass avenue car.

"Anything fresh from Colorado?" inquired a fat man from the front end of the car.

"Yes, sir. A mule fell over a precipice and killed himself," replied the smart young man.

"Did, eh? Well, that's awful. Hadn't I better go on ahead and break the sad news to your family?" bluntly asked the fat man.
