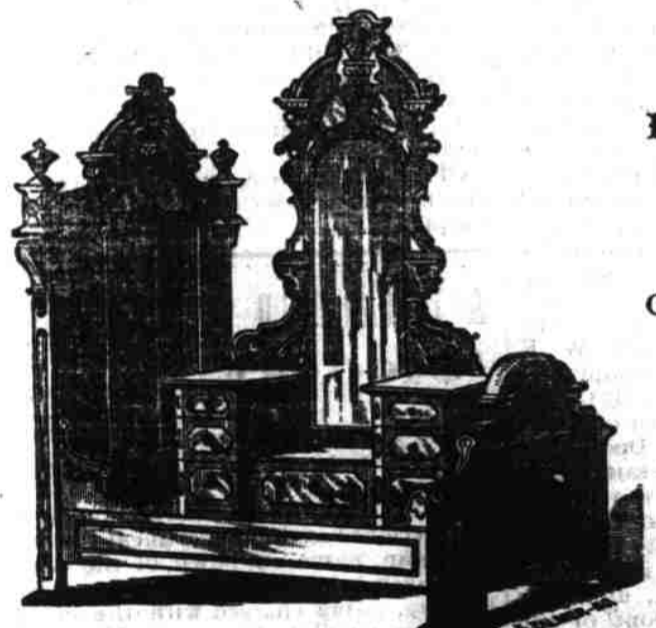

WASHINGTON.

Irish People's Centennial Address— Important Supreme Court Decision on Insurance Contracts.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 23.—Chandler and Tyler have returned. There is no solution yet as to the reception of the Centennial address of the Irish people to the American people.

The Supreme Court of the United States to-day decided several important life insurance cases. The parties were the New York Life Insurance Company, and the Manhattan Life Insurance Company, against William O. Statham, Charlotte Scymms and the Executor of Charles L. Beech, of Mississippi.

The Court delivered the following opinion: A policy of life insurance which stipulates for the payment of annual premiums by the assured, with a condition to be void on non payment is not an insurance from year to year like a common fire policy, but the premiums constitute an annuity, the whole of which is the consideration for the entire assurance for life, and the entire assurance for life, and the condition is a condition subsequent, making void the policy by its non-performance.

FOREIGN.

Russia Insists on a Six Week's Armistice—Attempted Murder of the Grand Vizier.

BRUSSELS, Oct. 23.—A special from Vienna to the Lenord, the organ here of the Russian government, announces that Gen Ignatieff, ambassador at Constantinople, will insist on a six week's armistice. He is instructed to explain Russia's motives to the Porte.

LONDON, Oct. 23.—A Reuter's telegram from Constantinople announces that the Government has discovered a conspiracy to murder the Grand Vizier and Midhat Pasha, and has arrested two Ulemas of high rank, and Ramiz Pasha. The culprits have been exiled to various islands. Other arrests are expected.

SOUTH CAROLINA.

Negroes Still Riotous in Charleston County—Probable Outbreak at Mt. Pleasant.

CHARLESTON, Oct. 23.—Riotous demonstrations of negroes, supposed to be the result of the Cainby affair, is reported from various portions of Charleston county. A riotous demonstration of armed negroes at Mount Pleasant village, opposite Charleston is causing great alarm to the white residents, who will petition Gen. Ringer for troops.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 23.

FOREIGN.

Cotton Spinner's Troubles Adjusted— Paul Girard Fatally Wounded in a Duel.

LONDON, Oct. 23.—Operative cotton spinners have decided to withdraw their notices. Practically, the labor dispute in North and North-eastern Lancashire has ended.

PARIS, Oct. 23.—In a political duel fought in Switzerland by Vicomte Barne des Roches and Paul Girard, Girard received a probably fatal sword thrust.

FLASHES.

NEW YORK, Oct. 23.—Honored bound: Yarra Yarra for New Orleans, and Kathinka for Savannah.

NEW YORK, Oct. 23.—President Orton of the Western Union Telegraph Company, has been ill some days, and his physicians report his condition much improved—has already passed crisis of his illness.

Outrageous Abuse of Power.

Have the people of the country any conception of the way in which the Deputy Marshals and United States Commissioners abuse their power in South Carolina? Three specimen cases were reported yesterday.

1. A colored Democrat named White was speaking at a Democratic meeting at Blackville on Thursday. A Radical negro attempted to pull White from the stand, and was pushed aside by some white Democrats who were near by. For being molested by the Radical negro, the Democrat, White, was arrested under the Enforcement Act. The Radical intimidated the Democrat, and the Democrat was accused of the intimidation!

2. A white man named Chapman, at Blackville on Tuesday, hurraed for Hampton. He was immediately captured by a colored United States Marshal and dragged before the United States Commissioner. His attorney was denied admittance to the place where he was confined, and on Thursday night Chapman was still in custody. It is so made a crime to be a Democrat, and express a preference for the Democratic candidate!

3. S. S. Williams and others were arrested in Blackville under the Enforcement Act. An examination was had before United States Commissioner Eaton. The counsel for the defendants showed that there was not a tittle of evidence in support of the charge of intimidation, and that, on the contrary, the mutual threats of violence were founded upon personal animosity and ill-feeling, entirely apart from political considerations, and culminating in the threats of Bill Bull, the complainant, to proceed to Ellen and throw his "weight and man-hood" into an insurrectionary movement, aimed against life and property. Mr. Commissioner Eaton, in reply said: "I may as well state to you and save further discussion, that I am acting under instructions, and by these I must be guided. The United States authorities are informed by testimony before them that a conspiracy exists in Barnwell county against the lives and political privileges of the colored men. This conspiracy is to be ferreted out and bring before our courts for punishment; and although the evidence is weak, it makes a part of a great whole, and, as such, feel bound in duty not to reject it, and I shall, therefore, require of these parties to find surety for their appearance at Court in the sum of \$1,000 each." Can there be anything more monstrous than this? Upon the ex parte statements of Governor Chamberlain and his willing witnesses, the United States decide that there is a conspiracy in Barnwell, and, because of that imaginary conspiracy, arrest and hold to bail any citizen who is accused of conspiracy, even when the evidence is admitted to be weak? Why, during the examination by Commissioner Eaton, the complainant, Bull, varied his testimony in presence of the defendants, from what he gave Mr. Eaton in private, and the Commissioner said to him with considerable asperity: "You people must stick to the statements you first make to me, and be more careful what you say to me, and reading from his notes, I whereupon Bull taking the cue repeated his original story. Bull told the lie, and Mr. Eaton taught him to stick to it. The three instances we have cited are fair samples of the character of the arrests, for political purposes, under the Enforcement Act in this State.—Charleston News & Courier.
