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

LONDON, Oct 25 .- A correspondent of the Turkish army in Servia reports that the Turks took Djunis after 10 hours hard fighting.

The Times' correspondent at Vienna says Porte is willing to accept six week's armistice if recommended by all the powers. While affairs look bets ter at Constantinople, one can trace all around Turkey the iron ring prepared by Russia.

As the Senate now stands forty-two Republicans, twenty-nine Democrats and two Independents, the change above noted would, if no others were made, leave it very nearly balanced—thirty-eight Republicans, thirty five Democrats and one Independent. But the following States also elect new Senators this winter: Illinois, Iowa, Kansas, Maine, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, Nebraska, New Hampshire, New Jersey, Rhode Island and Wis-consin. Of these, New Jersey, Wis-consin, and perhaps Michigan, are among the doubtful ones. If two of these should send Democrats, the Senate would stand thirty-seven Democrats and thirty-six Republicans, with one Independent. It will be seen, therefore, that it is by no means impossible that the next Senate shall have a small Democratic majority. If the Republican managers continue to make arbitrary arrests in the South, they will probably so greatly alarm the North as to fling even the Senate into Democratic hands .- N. Y. Herald.
