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

FOREIGN.

Turko-Servian War.

LONDON, Oct. 26.—The Times' Vienna dispatch confirms the statement that the Porte informed Ignatieff of its willingness to accept a six weeks armistice if all the powers wished it. But the Porte still insists that the powers guarantee a continuance of the armistice if peace is not completed within six weeks. In spite of Ignatieff's conciliatory tone, there is little hope that Russia will accept this condition. It is expected however that the Porte has not said its last word.

The Times' Belgrade correspondent says: There has not yet been such depression in Belgrade and throughout Servia. All ranks would welcome peace.

The Times' special from Barcelona, says: The republican conspiracy appears more important than was at first supposed. Fifty more people have been arrested, including two ex-ministers.

Leonard Aliblain, who murdered the officer who was extraditing here, has been captured at Lille.

A Reuter telegram from Constantinople says: It is believed here that some understanding will be reached on the armistice question. Ignatieff, the Russian minister had another special interview with the Sultan on Saturday.

Advices from Tiflis say, that the Turkish Consul General and wife, whose assassination was reported yesterday, were murdered by robbers.

Fighting continues around Alexinatz and Delgrad.

RAGUSA, Oct. 26.—The Montenegrins have cut Mokhtar Pasha's communication with Trebinje, and have invested Nisic. Distress prevails in Montenegro notwithstanding the military successes, on account of the necessity of maintaining a large number of refugees.

WASHINGTON.

More About the Irish Letter

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 26.—John L. Cadwallader, acting Secretary of State, wrote Messrs. Powers and Parnell, the bearers of the Irish Address, that it was customary to make such presentations through the Minister of the country. A copy being sent to Sir Edward Thornton, he declined to participate, not having received instruction from his government, on the subject, and also said that the contents of the Address itself were objectionable. Cadwallader, under the circumstances, regrets his inability to assist them in the matter. The objection raised by Powers and Parnell, was, that the intervention of the British Minister was not necessary, as the Address was from the Irish people, and not from the British Nation.

PENNSYLVANIA.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Oct. 26.—A committee of engineers employed by the Central New Jersey Railroad, offer a reward of \$1,000 for the person who misplaced the switch.

NEW YORK.

NEW YORK, Oct. 26.—Miss Willson has arrived on the Scythia.

Anti-Tammany of the 15th District have re-nominated Abraham S Hewitt for Congress.

Frank McConochie has confessed the murder of little Maggie Baner, after an attempt to outrage her. He was with difficulty saved from lynch law.

Boston, Mass., Oct. 26.—During an attempt to re-nominate an old feud between two brothers, Frank and Salton Woolley, Salton shot Frank fatally.

Lowesville, Oct. 26.—At a large meeting of the Methodists, Bishops Foster, Mass and Kavanagh of Kentucky, and others delivered addresses, thanking God for their reunion, after thirty-two years' separation.

Mid-Night Dispatches.

WASHINGTON.

The Busted Freedman's Bank Sues a Member of Congress—Mum about the Correspondence of Tweed's Capture—President Proclaims a Day of Fasting and Prayer.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 26.—The Commissioners of the Freedman's Bank have sued Jas. Pike, a member of Congress in 72, from New Hampshire, for \$5,000, borrowed from the Bank.

There is little prospect of the present publication of the correspondence regarding Tweed's capture. Hints regarding the correspondence on the Irish Address were furnished by the Postmaster-General and Second Assistant are absent. The President designated Second Assistant Postmaster-General to act as Chief.

FOREIGN.

Austria's Position the Same as Count Andrassy's—Germany's Reticence—Turkish Defeat—Trial of Conspirators.

BRUSSELS, Oct. 26.—Advices have been received here from Vienna to represent the positions of Count Andrassy, minister of foreign affairs, as that of the whole empire.

The students of the University of Pash, who have been forbidden by the police to make a contemplated torch light demonstration in honor of the Turkish Consul, have determined to disregard the prohibition. No conflict however is apprehended.

BERLIN, Oct. 26.—A controversy has arisen between German and Austrian newspapers. The consequence of the latter's criticisms, Germany's attitude. The National Zeitung to-day replying to the article in Pesther Lloyd says: The attitude of the Hungarian press only tends to confirm Germany's continuous reserve and justify its expediency.

BERLIN, Oct. 26.—General Hovasse-loff has asked for reinforcements for the Servian army of the Ibar, and Colonel Backer has been ordered there with fresh troops. An official bulletin states that the Turks on Saturday made a desperate attempt to break Novasala's lines, but were repulsed with great slaughter.

MADRID, Oct. 26.—All persons implicated in the recent conspiracy will be tried before the ordinary tribunals. Among the documents discovered by the government are decrees signed by Racz Zorilla, conferring the public appointments upon the intended leaders of the insurrection, and bonds redeemable after the success of the movement. All the military men arrested were on the half pay list.

NEW YORK.

Pools on the Presidential Candidates, Tilden 2 to 1 Against Hayes—Miscellaneous Items.

NEW YORK, Oct. 26.—Pools at Morrissey's last night on the general result stood for Tilden 200; Hayes 185.

ILLINOIS.

Excitement over a Murder Case—The Judge asked to Resign.

CHICAGO, Oct. 26.—The jury case of Alexander Sullivan, charged with the murder of Francis Hanford, was discharged, being unable to agree, standing 11 to 1 in favor of acquittal.

There is much feeling against Judge McAllister for alleged partisan rulings. Petitions are circulating, asking him to resign.

WEATHER FORECASTS.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 26. For the South Atlantic States, slight changes in pressure and temperature, light to fresh and variable winds and clear weather are probable.

A FANTASTIC MURDER.—A man named Courbalon is before a Paris court charged with the murder of his wife under extraordinary circumstances.

He discovered an intimacy existing between herself and one Joseph Partridge. Partridge, fired, impelled by several vigorous kicks, and the lady, implored pardon. "Pardon, oh, yes," replied Courbalon, in a sinister tone. The next day, at noon, the servants put on the table six roasted partridges, which, in France, are much larger than in the United States. As soon as his wife sat down, he locked the door, and drew from his pocket a revolver. "Madame," he said, "the hour of your punishment has come. You have dishonored me by means of a man named Partridge, and there are six of his namesakes for you to dine on. You will please to eat them to the last morsel. If you cannot do so, or if you attempt to give an alarm, I will blow your brains out." The unhappy woman, feeling the impossibility of accomplishing the task without killing herself, fell on her knees, and implored his pity. Courbalon's only reply was to cock his revolver, and aim it inexorably at her head. In two hours and a half the six birds were eaten, and at 9 o'clock that night the woman died of indigestion.
