TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

Noon Dispatches.

FOREIGN.

Oh, for the Wisdom of Solomon to Decide the Armistice Question.

LONDON, Oct. 28.—The Times' dispatch from Belgrade, confirms the statement that self wounding is again becoming frequent among the Servians. The dispatch says: During the fight at Kreveta a distinguished officer brought half of a Russian battalion to the front saying he was compelled to leave the other half behind to prevent the Servians from running away. A dispatch from Vienna to the Times states that Prince Aersperg's reply in the Reichsrath yesterday to the interpretation on the Eastern question is not satisfactory. There will probably be an animated debate on the subject in that body.

The Times' to-day, in its financial article, says the feeling that the war is staved off at least for the winter becomes much more prevalent and inclines to stock operations for a rise.

BELGRADE, October 28.—The Servian Cabinet difficulty is in a fair way of being settled. It is probable that Nicolich will consent to retain the portfolio of the Minister of War.

A telegram from the Minister of Interior at Belgrad, to the Prime Minister at Rastich, in reply to his inquiry, says: The Turks have not taken Djunis.

LONDON, Oct. 28.—All the members of the expedition declare the impossibility of a closer reach nearer the North pole than 400 miles.

The Post reviewing the situation says: It only remains for all the powers to concur in recommending the six week's armistice with a prolongation as proposed by the Porte. All correspondents concur in the Pacific change of Russian attitude, but Russia's motives are variously construed.

NEW YORK.

Edward S. Stokes Again at Liberty—Terrible Charge against Centennial Judges—Dynamite Work.

NEW YORK, Oct. 28.—Edward S. Stokes' sentence expired to-day, and he was released.

A New York Herald's special from Paris says: The Figaro prints a letter translated from a German newspaper, written by M. Du Sommerard, chief commissioner of France at Philadelphia, to a friend in Germany, in which M. Sommerard says: Accounts transmitted to me from my Department, are of a most grievous character. The Americans themselves set fire to the buildings containing the empty cases of the French goods, hoping to destroy French merchandise, and articles for exhibition, stored in the galleries. A second attempt of the same kind has been made within the last month. Worse than all this, the police employed by the Centennial Board are purposely chosen from the worst and most degraded elements in the United States. The keepers are thieves without exception. They steal openly from exhibitors in the French Department, and all others. There exists an understanding between these knaves and judges. The judges call up rogues for a hearing, where complaints are made at all hours, unknown to the complainants, and as the result is, no witnesses of the criminal's guilt being present, they are acquitted; even worse than this—if such a thing be possible—thieves count on the judges themselves to give them a signal when a discreet moment has arrived to begin the pillage. The correspondent says the article concludes with an attack upon the virtue and manners of American women.

An Insurance Agent has brought suit against the United States Life Insurance Company, in the Supreme Court of Kings county, before Judge Gilbert, alleging in his complaint great and various irregularities, chiefly against John E. Deveritt and James Buell. They are charged with a conspiracy to transfer the reserve funds of the company to other companies, for their own advantage. Judge Gilbert has granted a temporary injunction, in order for the examination of Buell and Deveritt for trial by referees.

The free for all races at Fleetwood, was concluded yesterday. Forins won the fifth deciding heat in 2:20.

An easterly storm, accompanied at the beginning with slight fall of snow, set in here this A. M.

Anti-Tammany heard the report of the Committee of Conference with the Republicans who would not combine with anti-Tammany, unless they throw Greene and Brun off the ticket. The report was received with indignation, and a resolution was adopted, deciding to hold no further conference the Republicans.

The trunk, said to have been loaded with Dynamite, exploded in the baggage car of the Philadelphia train yesterday afternoon, destroying the trunk and setting fire to the others, and destroying about \$400 worth of baggage. The remains of the intricate clock-like machine were found in the ruins. The train was stopped to prevent a possible destruction of the other cars which were filled with Centennial passengers.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 28. For the South Atlantic and Gulf States slowly falling barometer, with southeast to southwest winds. Warm and clear, or partially cloudy weather will prevail, with probably rain in North Carolina and the southwest.

MISSOURI.

Three Ministers Taken for Detectives and Shot.

St. Louis, Oct. 28.—A special to the Globe-Democrat from Little Rock says: Three Methodist ministers, while riding their circuits in Pope county were shot by Dinges and Hale from the brush, who are illicit distillers. It was supposed that the ministers were Revenue officers coming to arrest them. One is dead and the other two are dangerously, if not fatally wounded. A large number of illicit distillers live in that section, seven of whom were convicted this week.

WASHINGTON.

Indian Commission Adjourned.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28.—Charles H. Hurley, Secretary, telegraphs from Yankton that the Indian Commission has accomplished its mission and adjourned to meet in Washington, on December 9th.

NEW YORK.

Bold Attempt at Blackmailing.

NEW YORK, Oct. 28.—The officers of the United States Life Insurance Company denounce the injunction proceedings against them as an attempt to blackmail them.
