## TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

### Noon Dispatches.

#### FOREIGN.

Russia will be Satisfied if Turkey Accepts the Armistice—The French Commissioner Denies Writing the Letter—Belgrade Retaken by the Servians.

LONDON, Oct. 30.—Nearly every Bishop invited to attend the Pan Anglican Synod, has accepted or replied. Some influential American bishops have stipulated if they attend, all subjects of interests and importance shall be free and open to discussion. The Synod will probably be much occupied with matters affecting the Episcopal Church.

BERLIN, Oct. 30.—A correspondent of the Times telegraphs that Ignatieff at a private conference informed the Porte that if the armistice accorded, Russia will be content and submit the question of autonomy to the conference of the powers. The correspondent adds: Russia certainly desires to exclude Turkey from the conference, but as Austria will persist in opposing any conference, this position of Russia will not embarrass Turkey.

A Times' Belgrade dispatch confirms the reports that Gen. Tchernayeff has been disabled.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 30.—The difference between Turkey and Russia is that Turkey wishes a prolongation of the armistice. It is certain that if peace will not be concluded, Russia only considers a possibility of the prolongation; it is stated however that the Sultan has accepted the armistice without conditions.

LONDON, Oct. 30.—The Daily News has a dispatch from Belgrade, that Tchernayeff has recovered and will hold Belgrade. A change of ministry and a direct appeal to Russia for active intervention is looked for.

PARIS, Oct. 30.—Wagner Geotterdome was performed for the first time at the popular concerts here yesterday, a portion of the audience hissed and protested noisily.

RAGUSA, Oct. 30.—Monkhtar Pasha has sent a force of Turkish troops by way of Duga Pass to endeavor to re-occupy Nicosia.

PARIS, Oct. 29.—The Figaro to-day publishes a letter M. Du Summerard, chief commissioner of France for the American Centennial Exposition, declaring that the letter printed in that journal on Friday, attacking the managers of the Exhibition, and containing other base charges, the authorship of which is attributed to him, is an utter fabrication. M. Du Summerard puts his disavowal of it in most formal and express terms, and adds that if his denial be not sufficient, he is in a position to prove, by unquestionable evidence, the truth of his statement.

#### NEW YORK.

Three Local Tickets to be Put Forward.

NEW YORK, Oct. 30.—The Tribune says it is settled that there will be three tickets in the field this year, for county and city officers. The Republicans have refused all coalition with Mr. Green and his independents. Mr. John A. Dix will be the Republican nominee for Mayor.

#### OHIO.

Five Million More Gone.

CALDWELL, Oct. 30.—The attorney for McCune, Hogan and Hogdon, heirs to the Tioga Company Pennsylvania coal lands, said to be worth five millions, who resides here, announces that he finds the claim utterly barred by the statute of limitation beyond all power of recovery.
